Jack Graham Seeks Re-Election For Justice of Peace - Pct. 1

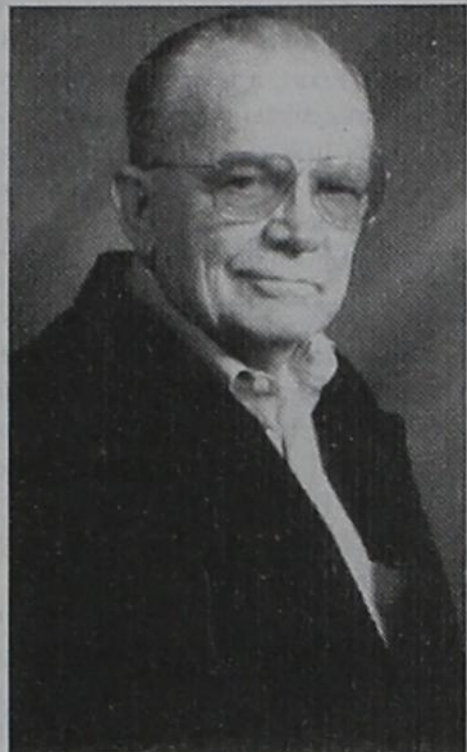

USDA Rural Development Announces Availability of \$82 M For Home Loans No Down Payment Required

TEMPLE, TEXAS, February 10, 2006 - Bryan Daniel, USDA Rural Development State Director, announced today that more than \$82 million is available to assist rural Texans become homeowners through the Agency's Guaranteed Rural Housing loan program.

"With mortgage interest rates continuing near their lowest levels in recent history, now is the time to stop paying rent and purchase your own home," said Daniel. "Our Guaranteed Rural Housing loan program is the best option for eligible low and moderate-income applicants to move into a home without a down payment."

In many cases most of the closing costs associated with purchasing the house can be financed into the loan. Loans can be made to purchase new or existing homes that meet Agency requirements. In addition to allowing a Maximum Loan to Value ratio of 102%, another very attractive feature of this loan program is that the borrower is not required to pay mortgage insurance. Other zero down programs charge an up front mortgage insurance premium that is due at closing, with monthly mortgage thereafter. In comparison, the Guaranteed Rural Housing Program offers a significant savings to borrowers by charging a one-time only, two percent (2%) guarantee fee that is due at closing, and no monthly mortgage insurance. Typical savings for a family can range between \$20.00 and \$50.00 per month. A loan comparison calculator is available on our website at www.rurdev.usda.gov/tx/loancomp.htm.

Without expensive mortgage insurance premiums, homebuyers can qualify for a "better" home, which could mean the additional bathroom or bedroom that they may desire. Also, homebuyers may include their two percent fee in the loan. This will have a minimal impact on their payments yet maximize any cash reserves they may have. They can put down \$2,000 toward a home loan or keep their \$2,000 and pay roughly \$12 more per month.

USDA Rural Development housing programs target communities with populations of 10,000 or less and locations not closely associated with urban areas. Under certain circumstances loans can be made in towns and cities between 10,000 and 25,000 in population. Never assume an area is not eli-

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Leon Bosque RC&D Council Reps Attend Leadership Forum, Make Calls On Capitol Hill



Mills County Judge Rob Lindsey of Goldthwaite, Dr. Joe McFarland of Stephenville, Jane Crouch of Hamilton, and Gorman EDC Director Lori Dodd represented Leon Bosque RC&D at a national meeting of RC&Ds in Washington DC last week.

The Leon Bosque delegation, along with more than 200 RC&D council members representing every state including Hawaii and Alaska, expressed extreme concern about proposed budget cuts for RC&Ds to the five congressmen and two senators from this 13-county district. At the same time, Congressmen Chet Edwards, John Carter, Michael Conaway and Randy Neugebauer were thanked personally for their support that restored funding last year. The group met with staff members at the offices of Senators Kay Bailey Hutchison and John Cornyn and Congressmen Henry Bonilla, Mac Thornberry and Silvestre Reyes.

Dr. McFarland, a former president of the Texas Association of RC&D Councils and currently a Leon Bosque board member, told the legislators about projects administered by RC&D councils including several Leon Bosque projects: a grant program for Volunteer Fire Departments, a Community Improvement Grant project, a revolving loan fund for small businesses and a compost project that utilizes dairy waste for improvement of athletic fields.

McFarland said, "Our request this year is for level funding for RC&Ds in the amount of \$56 million that will continue the effectiveness of the councils by maintaining the coordinator position that is vital to our efforts to support conservation and economic development in rural communities across the US. Last year, RC&D councils leveraged the federal appropriation 8 to 1—that means jobs, businesses, cleaner lakes and streams, improved conditions for wildlife and the support rural areas need to help both local government and citizens."

The National Association of RC&Ds compiled a list of last year's numbers. They found:

- more than 550 new businesses created with RC&D assistance;
- 3,704 businesses expanded by RC&D councils;
- 4,104 businesses financially assisted;
- approximately 5,900 jobs created;
- councils helped improve 1,861,191 acres of wildlife habitat, 550,750 acres of lakes and 9,835 miles of streams;
- more than 8,950 workshops and training sessions held; and
- RC&D projects assisted at least 5,341,375 economically or socially disadvantaged people nationwide.

McFarland went on to say that, "Leon Bosque RC&D conducts community assessments such as the 2000 Gorman assessment that many residents will recall as the catalyst for several local initiatives. Dodd commented that the Keep Gorman Beautiful highway clean-ups, the downtown beautification projects and increase in school/community involvement were among the suggestions at the Assessment listening sessions and follow-up town hall meetings.

Judge Lindsey said, "RC&D is a great resource for rural counties—the coordinator can give technical assistance and advice and the council administers federal grant programs including grant searches that no other governmental or non-governmental organization provides. Mills County has taken advantage of most of the opportunities provided by Leon Bosque. We wouldn't have even known about these resources if RC&D hadn't told us."

"In the Capitol offices, we provided a lot of information, statistics and personal knowledge about the value of RC&D to the rural areas of Texas," said Lindsey. "As a county judge, I can tell you that the RC&D council is a valuable resource available to us for help with issue or funding needs that affect our rural counties. Both council and staff of Leon Bosque RC&D understand our rural challenges, are willing to initiate projects and lead the process as no other entity, government or otherwise, can or will do."

Leon Bosque RC&D, made up of 13 central Texas counties, is led by a council of volunteers from Bosque, Brown, Callahan, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Somervell, Hamilton, Mills, Palo Pinto, Shackelford, Stephens and Hood Counties. Headquartered in Glen Rose, the council is assisted by Coordinator Lee Standley of the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service.

"RC&D councils exist in every state in the union," according to Jane Crouch who chairs the Leon Bosque Council. "Rob, Joe, Lori and I met in DC with other board members from Texas who interacted with board members there from across the US. We had been invited to come to the Leadership Forum, a 2-day training session on budget and issue matters related to rural problems, after which we visited with our home state congressmen, their staff and senate offices."

Leon Bosque RC&D's stated purpose is to help people care for and protect natural resources in a way that improves the local economy, environment and living standards.

Crouch talked about the Leon Bosque RC&D's newest federal grant project: the revolving loan fund for emerging or expanding small businesses. "USDA Rural Development awarded Leon Bosque a \$100,000 Rural Business Enterprise Grant. We wrote a proposal that provides for the Small Business Development Center at Tarleton State University to accept applications, screen and make recommendations that are then reviewed by a professional banking committee. After a USDA environmental evaluation and approval by the state Rural Development office, a business may receive up to \$20,000 in a low interest, long term loan agreement. This new program will encourage business start-up, growth, job creation and retention by making available funds to businesses that have problems with costs of start-up as well as cash flow," she said.

Lori Dodd, Vice Chairman of the Leon-Bosque Council, told the legislators about the devastating grassfires she saw in Eastland County that sparked the interest of the Leon Bosque Council. Dodd invited the whole council to Carbon so they could see firsthand the damage to homes and businesses. She expressed her pride in her council's reaction to that visit saying, "I was impressed that the RC&D came to Eastland County quickly and immediately figured out a way to help Volunteer Fire Departments with their damaged or nonexistent equipment. The council coordinator designed a grant program, wrote letters and notified all our county judges of the available funds in one week's time. That's the kind of problem-solving the RC&D is doing in North Central Texas!"

"Leon Bosque RC&D administers programs and projects, supports existing activities and brings people together to learn about matters of importance to rural areas and, perhaps as important, to learn from each other how progress can happen," Crouch said. Lindsey added that Texas RC&D councils leverage approximately 28 times the federal investment. "Given our track record, return on investment and the opportunities ahead of us, I believe funding ought to be continued for RC&Ds. Hopefully, Congress will agree and restore the funding," he said.

Attorney General Abbott Cracks Down On Three North Texas Companies For Taking Advantage Of Seniors Ploys used to lure senior citizens across the U.S. into giving their personal information

DALLAS - Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott today sued three North Texas companies for bombarding seniors in Texas and across the country with deceptive, unsolicited mailers designed to dupe them into sending the companies their personal information. The Attorney General's lawsuits allege the companies then use the information to develop sales leads for insurance, financial and other companies.

Named in the three lawsuits are American Senior Alliance Inc. and owner George R. Katosic, America's Recommended Mailers Inc. and owner Tina Hennessy, and Lead Concepts Inc. and owner Christopher Weir. The lawsuits allege the companies induce seniors to fill out information cards under the pretext of promising updates on Social Security or Medicare laws or new investment developments regarding prepaid funeral plans, annuities and living trusts.

"Tricking senior Texans into turning over their personal information is one of the lowest forms of fraud," Attorney General Abbott said. "These companies are fooling senior citizens into believing they have to respond to these mailings or risk losing their Medicare, Social Security or other government benefits. These businesses are operating this nationwide deception from Texas, and Texas will be the state to stop them. Seniors should ignore these fraudulent mailings."

The Attorney General alleges the three are violating the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act by not disclosing in their mailers which companies or individuals are using the returned personal information. They also use deceptive association names that give a false impression of endorsement by legitimate nonprofit or senior advocacy groups. The companies also do not indicate to seniors that their personal information may be used as leads for insurance agents, telemarketers or others who may later persuade them to buy insurance or other products.

The three companies operate independently and even compete for business, but their misleading methods to induce seniors to act are

similar, according to the Attorney General's investigation. The deceptive pieces feature bold typeface and use all-capital letters to convince seniors to send their personal information.

The mailers purport to help educate seniors about financial planning or new developments in health care and the law. Announcements such as "Medicare supplemental coverage update" and "legislation that standardizes entitlement provisions for persons 65 and older" are deceptively crafted as attention-getters, prompting seniors to quickly reply with their personal information.

Other mailers urge seniors to act quickly to obtain "free hard facts and straight answers" regarding prescription drug benefits and how several changes in laws affecting the elderly can affect them or their heirs. The mailers trumpet new congressional legislation allowing seniors to avoid paying estate taxes or taxes on investments or Social Security. Others suggest ways to exempt assets from government collection in the event of an illness.

The Attorney General is requesting penalties of up to \$20,000 per violation, plus an added penalty of up to \$250,000 for acts that harm anyone 65 or older. In addition, the lawsuit requests penalties of up to \$10,000 per violation of the Texas Insurance Code, as well as attorneys' fees and investigative costs.

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Texas Wildfire Disaster Recovery Aid Exceeds 900,738

AUSTIN, Texas — As of close of business Feb. 9, families and individuals who suffered damage from the recent Texas Wildfires have been approved to receive more than \$900,738 in assistance.

On Jan. 11, 2006, President George W. Bush declared nine counties stricken by wildfires as major disaster areas in the State of Texas. The presidential declaration made individual assistance available to affected individuals and businesses in the counties of Callahan, Cooke, Eastland, Erath, Hood, Montague, Palo Pinto, Tarrant and Wise.

Recovery Services Summary as of close of business Feb. 9, 2006:

- 371 individuals have registered for Individual Assistance.
- \$900,738 has been approved through the Individuals and Household Program. Of that, FEMA has provided \$506,640 in Individual Assistance and \$394,098 in Other Needs Assistance.
- 358 applicants visited two mobile Disaster Recovery Centers (DRCs) that operated throughout the nine declared counties until Feb. 3, 2006.
- 209 home inspections have been requested. 204 have been completed. Three inspectors are in the field.
- Texas workers who lost their jobs due to the recent wildfires may be able to claim disaster unemployment benefits. To file a claim or to talk with a representative, eligible applicants should call the Texas Workforce Commission Hotline at 1-800-939-6631, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Individuals located in the nine counties and who sustained losses should register with FEMA by calling 1-800-621-FEMA (3362) or TTY 1-800-462-7585 for the hearing- and speech-impaired. Registrations also can be made online at www.fema.gov.

Big Country Area Plagued By Suspected Arson Fires

Firefighters in the Eastland, Stephens, Comanche and Shackleford counties have not only been dealing with the worst winter fire season Texas has seen, but they are also battling fires that are suspected arson starts.

"We're extremely concerned that we may have an arsonist working in the Eastland County area," said County Judge Brad Stephenson. "Not all have been arson fires, but we've had more than 40,000 acres burned in Eastland County alone since New Year's Day. The population is scared. We've lost more than 50 homes, countless other structures and at least \$4 million lost just in fences. That doesn't take into consideration the loss of income and revenue. It is a miracle that we haven't lost a life."


Investigators are looking into multiple fires that occurred between Feb. 12 and 17 that appear suspicious. The cluster of suspicious fires includes the Olden, West Eastland, Cisco, Gunsight and the Rising Star fires on Feb. 12. Investigators are looking into several fires that ignited on Feb. 16 in Comanche County, including the Clendon and CR 285 fires, as well as four small fires in along Hwy. 16.

Arson is a 2nd degree felony, punishable by up to \$10,000 and two to 20 years in prison. That is enhanced to a 1st degree felony if an arson fire injures or kills someone.

"If anyone sees anything suspicious, please contact the local authorities or the arson hotline, which is 1-800-364-3470," said Chief Law Enforcement Officer Gary Bennett with Texas Forest Service. "We need folks to be observant."

A reward of up to \$2,000 is offered for information leading to the arrest and grand jury indictment of the person or persons responsible for these fires.

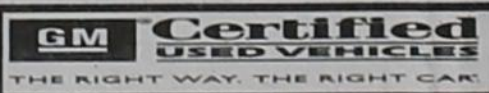
