### **Desdemona Man Dies in Auto Collision North of Gorman**

A Fatal two-vehicle crash occurred Sunday, April 8th at 2:05 p.m. on Farm Road 8, 3/10 mile East of Gorman that left a Desdemona man dead and sent a young woman from Desdemona to a Fort Worth hospital, according to the Department of Public Safety in Eastland County.

David Lane Lewis, 45, was traveling East on Highway 8 in a Jeep when it drifted into the westbound lane and collided head-on with a car occupied by Kelsey Menzel, 18 and her sister Kristen Menzel, 21, both of Desdemona, according to DPS. Authorities do not know how fast the cars were traveling.

Lewis was pronounced dead at the scene by Eastland County Justice of the Peace D. J. Walker.

Kelsey Menzel, the driver of the mustang, was flown to John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth. Kristen Menzel was not seriously injured, according to DPS.

DPS authorities say this crash is still under investigation by Highway Trooper Brandon Smedley and was assisted by several troopers in East- have going. land County.

## **Panther Track Has Good Showing At District 15-A**

This past week in Stephenville on the TSU Campus both the boys and girls teams of Gorman High School competed in the District 15-A Track and Field Meet. Competed they did with 14 student athletes qualifying for the Area Meet this Tuesday in Graham. The Panther Track team competed in 5 relays for both the Boys and Girls and all five of the teams made it to the Area Level. The Girls 400 relay or Sprint Relay was 4th in the meet with Megan Lewis, Nicole Cogburn, Tecia Jones and Audrey Johnston running in that order. Cogburn also qualified in the 100 meter dash. Tecia Jones also ran a leg on the Girls 1600 Relay. Joing her on the 1600 relay are Brandy Carlton, Crystal Thackerson and running a scorching 1:02:04 on the anchor leg was Audrey Johnston. Johnston also made it out in the 200 meter dash. Audrey ran a 28.22 in the 200. Brandy Carlton qualified in the 400 and 800 meter dash as well. Carlton along with Johnston also qualified in a field event with Carlton in the High Jump and Johnston in the Triple Jump. The 3200 meter run for the 3rd straight year saw Mary Powell qualify. Powell took home the Bronze and Senior leader Crystal qualified with a fourth place finish. The top four finishers in each event will be traveling to Graham. At the Area Meet they must qualify in the top three to advance to the next round or Regional Competition. The Girls finished a strong Third Place in the Meet. Megan Lewis qualifed in both her individual events the 100 and 300 Hurdles. Lewis finished with a Silver medal in both events.

The Boys team was highlighted with all three relay teams qualifying for Area. The Spring Relay of Tony Perez, Reji Sanchez, Matt Underwood and Zack Fox claimed Silver medal. Perez after qualifying in the 100 meter finals strained his quad muscle and pulled out of the 800 Relay. The alternate was senior Tye Vaugh. Vaughn stepped in and did an outstanding job with Gorman taking another Silver Medal. The other three on the 800 relay are Fox, Underwood and Sanchez anchoring the relay team. Then in the final event of the night the Boys 1600 or Mile Relay the Team of David Ibarra, Underwood, Tyson Swanner and Fox took the Bronze Medal in the 1600. Ibarra ran a inspiring 1st leg with Underwood and Swanner picking up where he left off. But when Fox got the anchor leg nobody real knew that he was about to run a 51.5 split on his leg. Both Fox and Swanner qualified in the Triple Jump. Vaughn qualified with a fourth place finish in the 100 meter dash. The Field Events at the Area Meet will begin at 10:45 with the Boys Triple Jump. Mary Powell and Crystal Thackerson will be running the 3200 meter run at 10:00. Carlton will be triple jumping at 11:45. The running events will begin with the 400m relay at 2:45. Hope to see some Blue and Red in the stands supporting all of these fine student athletes.

#### Farm Bill Forums Get Underway

The first of this week's Farm Bill Forums was held in Plainview today. Approximately 75 people attended, and we covered a number of issues ranging from payment limitations to storage fees. This was a successful event, and I look forward to the two remaining forums later this week. The next forum will be held Tuesday, April 10, in Seminole at 10:00 a.m. at the Old City Hall. At the beginning of every month, the Labor Department releases its latest report on the economy, including job growth and unemployment rates. For the past 42 months, each of these reports has shown that the economy has added jobs. Like clockwork, last week the Labor Department reported that nearly 200,000 jobs were created in March. When added to previous reports, 7.7 million new jobs have been added to the economy since August 2003. At the same time, the unemployment rate of 4.4% continues to remain at historically low levels. This economic success underscores the importance of keeping in place sound policies, such as tax and regulatory relief, that help small businesses prosper.

#### **Good News for Dyess**

Last year I reported in the Roundup that the Air Force was considering the possibility of moving its B-1 Intermediate Engine Maintenance Facility from Dyess Air Force Base to another location. Along with Abilene civic leaders and other members of the Texas congressional delegation, I urged the Air Force to keep the facility at Dyess. Because the Air Force's largest fleet of B-1s calls Dyess home, it makes strategic sense for the facility to remain in Abilene. The Air Force has finished its analysis, and it has decided to keep the facility at Dyess. This is good news for Dyess and for the Air Force as the facility is the only one in existence in Air Combat Command


