Both Panthers and Lady Panthers Qualify For Regionals


In just a little over a week the Gorman Panthers will be sending fifteen athletes to the Regional Track and Field Meet in Abilene. These fifteen athletes will be competing this Friday in a Qualifiers Meet in Glen Rose. This meet is basically a practice meet in preparation for the upcoming regional meet in Abilene. The seven girls all qualified this past week in the Area Meet in Graham. Brandy Carlton a junior qualified in three events. She took a First Place in the High Jump and 800 Meter Run. Brandy also will compete in the girls 1600 Meter Relay. Audrey Johnston qualified in the girls Triple Jump with a Third Place finish. She took second in the 200 Meter Dash. Audrey qualified in four events with to great legs on both the 400 M Relay and the 1600 Relay as well. Nicole Cogburn will be in the 100 Meter Dash. Cogburn will also run the second leg on the Spring Relay. Tecia Jones a junior will be running on both relays, the Sprint and the Mile Relay. Megan Lewis finished second in the 100 Hurdles and finished 4th in the 300 Hurdles. After what appeared to be a sure 2nd place finish in the 300 race Megan clipped the final hurdle and went down hard. Lewis showed great heart and got up off the track and dove across the finish line to capture the last qualifiers spot. Mary Powell will go to Regionals for her third straight year in the 3200 Meter run. The 3200 will be one of the toughest areas to qualify for state with several of the top runners in the state from this Region. Senior Crystal Thackerson did not make it out in the 3200 but has done a very good job running one of the legs on the Mile Relay.

The Panthers qualified seven last week and have another going as an alternate. Zack Fox and Tyson Swanner will both be competing in the Triple Jump. Fox finished 3rd and sophomore Swanner fourth. Fox will also run legs on the 800 Relay and Mile Relay for the Panthers. Senior Reji Sanchez will be on both relays. Sanchez ran an impressive leg on 800 Relay. Senior David Ibarra will be running the first leg on the 800 relay. Tony Perez has competed on the Sprint and 800 Relay but has been experiencing muscle pulls in his quads and will probably be an alternate for the Qualifiers Meet in Glen Rose this week. Hopefully he will be ready to go for the Regional Meet next week in Abilene. Junior Matt Underwood has qualified in both the 800 Relay and the Mile Relay. Underwood on his second leg in the Mile Relay ran an impressive backstretch this past week in Graham. Orlando Valenzuela a junior will be competing for a spot on both the relays. The top four will be running the relays in both events and two other sprinters will be listed as alternates. If you get a chance please come out and support these young men and women as they represent Gorman school and community



Others present were Glenn Scitern, Curtis Gilder, Bill Barrentine, Lori Dodd, and Billy Carson, three representatives from Rapid Cable and approximately eight citizens.

Mayor Ervin called the meeting to order @ 5:30 p.m.

Neugebauer Concludes Successful West Texas Farm Bill Tour

Abilene, TX - Congressman Randy Neugebauer, who sits on the House Agriculture Committee, concluded his three-day swing through the 19th District to get feedback on farm policy. Neugebauer believes these forums were successful, and he will take the views of West Texas producers back to Washington for the upcoming negotiations on the 2007 Farm

"The current Farm Bill has worked very well for producers in the 19th District," said Neugebauer. "The message I heard during the past three days was that Congress should keep in place many of the programs that have provided a safety net for American agriculture. This input will prove very helpful to me as I work to represent the views of local agriculture during 2007 Farm Bill discussions."

The three-day tour included stops in Plainview, Seminole, and Abilene. In all, more than 300 people attended the forums. A range of topics were addressed, but perhaps the most often cited issue was the proposal by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to make farmers whose adjusted gross income (AGI) exceeds \$200,000 ineligible for commodity payments. Such a shift would represent a drastic change from current policy. Neugebauer believes this would be bad policy and opposes its inclusion in the 2007 Farm Bill.

"As American producers face increased input costs and increased foreign competition, the federal government should not be putting in place policies that penalize efficiency and growth," said Neugebauer. "As we craft agriculture policy, we should be strengthening the farm safety net, not cutting holes in it."

Many of the provisions of the current Farm Bill begin to expire in September. The House Agriculture Committee has set an ambitious goal of completing its version of the 2007 Farm Bill by mid-Summer so that the final bill can be put in place by September.

Tax day is here again. As you reflect on your 2006 tax bill, realize that there are many in Congress who believe what you paid is not enough. Despite a record level of tax revenue taken in by the federal government last year, the House recently approved a budget blueprint that paves the way for a \$393 billion tax hike. I voted against this blueprint because I believe American workers and businesses are taxed enough. Instead of raising taxes, the federal government should focus more of its attention on using the tax dollars it does collect in a wiser, more efficient manner.

Wildfire **Preparedness Begins At Home: Are You Ready?**

Spring is the perfect time to do

steps to improve the chance of your home surviving a wildfire. Texas Forest Service wants to remind citizens that "Wildfire Awareness Begins at Home," which is the theme of Texas' Spring Wildfire Awareness that begins March 24 and runs through the month of April.

The 2005-2006 fire season in Texas was not only record-breaking, but also devastating to many Texans and entire communities. Wildfires blackened 2.26 million acres, destroyed 734 homes and took the lives of 19 people. Of more than 29,000 wildfires reported in Texas, 85 percent of the large fires occurred within two miles of a community.

"Homeowners have the power to greatly increase their homes' chance of surviving a wildfire," said Texas Forest Service Director Jim Hull

you plant, where you place your plants and how you maintain the landscaping can determine whether a wildfire reaches your home, and simple improvements on your home policy should look like in can significantly decrease its ignitability."

While doing spring gardening and the most attention. This issue is yard work, do a quick survey of your property. Does wildfire have a direct path to your home? Create a break in the vegetation with a sidewalk, rock path, French drain, driveway or other non-flammable path to slow the spread of a wildfire. Are flammable plants creating a ladder to the eaves of the home? Do firefighters have enough room around your home (at least 30 feet) to safely protect it? > "Homes and lives do not have to be lost to wildfire," Hull said. "Texans can be proactive by ensuring they've done everything possible to make their home safe from wildfire.'

With the funding from TWPP, Texas Forest Service will create 15 Wildfire Protection Refirefighters who will be responsible for fire prevention, structure protection, wildfire risk reduction, vegetation modification, and fire department training. WHEAT FREEZE UPDATE

As of April 10, 2006, there are a lot of unanswered questions regarding the freeze damage to the state-wide wheat crop.

Can I assess the freeze damage to my wheat crop right now?

Despite the pressure to immediately evaluate the impact of the freeze damage to wheat crop, freeze damage to wheat can not be accurately assessed until 6-9 days after the freeze occurred. Therefore, management decisions should be deferred until an accurate assessment of the damage can be made.

How will this freeze impact the Texas wheat crop?

The impact of these freezing temperatures on wheat yield loss is dependent on several factors, including the low temperature, duration of low temperature, and crop growth stage. Wheat is the most susceptible to freeze injury during the flowering stage, where 32 degrees F can sterilize some or all of wheat flowers. The next most susceptible growth stage is at heading and at early grain fill, when the wheat plant can handle temperatures down to 30 degrees F. It usually takes 26-28 degrees F temperatures to damage wheat in the boot stage. The big question is how long did it stay this cold in the actual wheat canopy. The wheat canopy temperature, at least for a little while, will stay warmer than the air temperature. Can the wheat crop compensate for some freeze damage?

If temperatures dropped below the critical level for the growth stage, gions that will house wildland some yield loss should be expected. However, wheat is a very resilient crop and has some degree of ability to compensate for adverse conditions, such as freeze damage. The level of compensation will be dependent on numerous factors including the growing conditions (moisture and temperature) for the remainder of the season, adequate fertility, and disease pressure.

How to assess the freeze damage.

Remember, the diagnosis is only as good as the samples collected and evaluated. So, representative samples for the various growth stages should be collected from numerous areas within a field.

If wheat was in the jointing or early-boot stage, the stem should be sliced open to look for the immature wheat heads. The wheat head should be just above the last node (joint) and hollow part of the stem. If the wheat head and/or the flag-leaf is brownish or has a water soaked pearance, then that tiller will not produce grain. Usually this tiller quit growing, but many stay green for several weeks.

If the wheat is heading or flowering, the flower parts will need to be inspected for damage. Healthy female flower parts (stigma) will have a feather appearance and should be a rich white color. The male flower parts (anthers) will be a light green to yellow depending on the flowering stage. Any off-color or water-soaking appearance of the stigma or anther, means that wheat seed will not develop. Also, remember that the wheat flowers from the middle of the head outward to the ends. So, depending on the portion of the head that was flowering at time of the freeze, there may be blanks in only a portion of the head.
