Father receives 20 years for Sexual Assault of a Child and 10 years for Prohibited Sexual Conduct

A father was sentenced to a maximum sentence of 20 years behind bars for the sexual assault of his teenage daughter after State District Judge Steven R. Herod of the 91st District Court found him guilty and set punishment after hearing testimony in the punishment phase of the trial. Cisco resident James Don Grumbles, 41, was formerly sentenced Wednesday for the deviant sexual acts by Herod after entering a plea of guilty and asking the Court to hear evidence on punishment.

Sexual Assault of a Child is a second degree felony carrying a possible sentence of two to twenty years confinement if the act occurs against a child younger than seventeen but fourteen or older. Prohibited Sexual Conduct is a third degree felony carrying a punishment range of two to ten years confinement.

Grumbles was arrested for the offenses of sexual assault of a child and prohibited sexual conduct after authorities at Cisco High School reported their suspicions to the Cisco Police Department. The teen is now 18 and reportedly living outside the area. Defense attorney Robert A. McCleskey of Eastland represented Grumbles against the prosecution team of Brenda Seale Gray and Russ Thomason.

New Passport Rules Require Planning Ahead

As Texans prepare for family trips and summer vacations, many are having difficulty getting the passports they need to travel. Under new federal requirements, more Americans will need passports to re-enter the United States after traveling overseas. Therefore, it is important to know if you will need a passport for your trip, to be familiar with the application process and to make your arrangements well in advance.

To help prevent undocumented persons from entering our country new travel guidelines within the western hemisphere are in place. Although well intentioned, the new passport requirements are proving inconvenient and cumbersome. Additionally, the U.S. Department of State's delay in processing passport applications has caused great frustration.

Traditionally, our hemisphere has offered safe travel destinations and friendly neighbors. It is clear, though, that terrorists are anxious to infiltrate our nation through other countries. Further, a few rogue dictators in Central America have sought alliances with nations that harbor terrorists. As a result, a passport or other appropriate documentation is now mandatory for all air travelers re-entering the U.S. from Canada, Mexico, Central and South America, the Caribbean and Bermuda. Beginning January 1, 2008, land and sea travelers will also need a passport to return from these countries. A receipt showing that you have submitted your passport application and a government issued ID will be sufficient for travel to these destinations until the end of September.

With these additional requirements in place, the State Department has received a record number of passport applications and is experiencing a sizable processing backlog. In order to avoid delays, I encourage you to complete and submit your application with all proper documentation as soon as possible.

If you are applying for your first passport, you must go in person to one of 384 Passport Acceptance Facilities in Texas, most of which are post offices, county clerks' offices or federal office buildings. Please take the following with you, and be prepared to pay the appropriate application fee:

A completed "Application for Passport" (Form DS-11)

 Proof of citizenship (certified birth certificate, naturalization certificate, etc.)

Proof of identity (such as a driver's license or government ID)

• Two passport photos (commercially available)

A full list of acceptance facilities and further details about the passport application process can be found online at http://travel.state.gov. Please remember that each traveler must have a passport, including children and infants. The process for passport renewal is similar and can also be found on the above website.

The State Department reports that routine applicants should receive their passports within 10 to 12 weeks of applying and can track the status of their request online within 3 to 4 weeks. However, my office has heard from people who have waited over four months for their application to be processed. I recommend that you apply months before you are scheduled to leave the U.S., just to be sure. If you must have your passport in hand quickly, expedited service is available from the State Department for a fee.



Drug Defendent Sentenced To Prison With Multiple Sentences

Jonathan Eusbio Perez, 21, formerly of Grand Prairie, is now an inmate awaiting transfer to state prison to serve two (25) twenty-five year sentences for possession of Methamphetamine and Cocaine. He was also handed a (10) year sentence for Evading Arrest with a Vehicle and an (8) eight year sentence for Tampering with Physical Evidence. Perez also received misdemeanor convictions for Possession of Marihuana and Possession of a Dangerous Drug. The sentences were part of a plea bargain agreement negotiated with the Eastland County Criminal District Attorneys Office.

Public Safety State Troopers on Interstate 20 when the Troopers noted that Perez was following other vehicles in traffic too closely. The DPS Troopers attempted to stop the vehicle but it accelerated, reaching speeds at over 100 five ladies. Hostesses for this event was Helen Grimshaw and Carol m.p.h. in heavy traffic. The pursuing Troopers observed the driver dumping a white powdery substance out of the car windows as it traveled and began to pass other vehicles by driving into the center median. Eventually the driver overcorrected and ended up rolling his car over 2 1/2 times. The driver was ejected through the windshield and ended up just north of the vehicle with only minor cuts and scratches. DPS Narcotics Agents out of Abilene also assisted in the arrest.

The District Attorneys Office enhanced the Evading Arrest charge by deeming the vehicle to be a deadly weapon. The Tampering with Physical Evidence charge was a result of Perez's attempts to get rid of the Controlled Substances by dumping a portion out of the car windows.

Sentencing was done by Judge Steven R. Herod of the 91st District Court. Attorney Bob McCool of Baird represented Perez at trial.



Process Begins For Heavy Equipment Operator Training

A cooperative partnership between the West Central Texas Workforce Center, the Cisco Development Corporation, Cisco Junior College, and the Eastland Development Corporation has made possible the introduction of a 6-week training course in Heavy Equipment Operation. Upon successful completion of this course, students will have a basic knowledge of equipment operations, equipment safety, preventative maintenance, and job site safety. Operation of a skid steer loader, backhoe/loader, dozer, excavator, and rubbertire loader will be included in the training. At the conclusion, students will receive a certificate of completion from the Texas Engineering Extension Service, as well as an OSHA-recognized safety certification for heavy equipment operators. In addition, students completing the training will be invited to an interview with area employers.

The 160-hour training class will be limited to ten students, and classes will begin on July 9th and run through August 9th. Training will be held Monday-Friday at the Cisco Junior College campus in Cisco, and daily attendance is mandatory. Keffer Concludes Successful Session, Prepares Run for Speaker

"Despite an often turbulent atmosphere, the 80th Session of the Texas Legislature accomplished much for the State of Texas," said Representative Jim Keffer (R-Eastland). "I look to build upon the positive aspects as I prepare to run for re-election in House District 60, and for Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives during the 81st Legislative Session."

Last special session, the state took a greater role in funding education, establishing an \$8 billion fund to buy down local property taxes, and allocating an additional \$6 billion from surplus general revenue. This session, the legislature transferred an additional \$14 billion to local school districts. Furthermore, legislators voted to expand property tax cuts to elderly and disabled homeowners whose taxes were previously frozen.

Perhaps the most significant accomplishment for Rep. Keffer was the passage of his House Bill 14 and House Joint Resolution 90 which establishes - with voter approval - the Cancer Prevention & Research Institute of Texas. This historic initiative will make Texas the world leader in cancer research by creating an institute that will work to reduce the prevalence of cancer in Texas and the world by distributing up to \$300 million per year in cancer research grants and loans, not to exceed \$3 billion over 10 years, with up to 10 percent of those dollars used for cancer prevention. The state would also receive a portion of royalties, patents and licenses that could potentially provide additional funding for this initiative. "This is a wise investment that will reduce both the human and financial costs of cancer," said Rep. Keffer. "Voters who approve this measure will be making a profound commitment that will benefit all humankind."

Another issue of vital importance to survival of the State - water - was given significant attention this Session. The Legislature passed Senate Bill 3 that strengthens Texas' water policy by protecting in-stream flows, encouraging conservation of existing water resources and allowing new water projects identified by the State Water Plan to meet our future water needs. "As the population and the economy grow, the state must adapt to the growing water needs, "said Keffer. "SB 3, which is the first water plan in a decade, will allow the state to meet those needs for future generations."

After much concern was raised about the condition of the state's park system, the Texas Legislature approved significant new funding for state parks that will provide approximately \$182 million in additional funding for state and local parks in the 2008-2009 biennium. The funding includes the hiring of additional staff, land acquisition, purchasing equipment, and minor repairs. In November, Texas voters will have the opportunity to approve additional funding of \$27.1 million in bonds that will go towards major repairs.

Through his service on the House Pensions and Investments Committee, Rep. Keffer helped craft legislation to reform the Teacher Retirement System to improve fiscal solvency by increasing the state's contribution with a goal to give retirees a benefit increase starting with a 13th check by the end of this year. "We were able to add \$635 million in state funds to the Teacher Retirement System which will get it closer to actuarial soundness," said Keffer. "This will allow us to give the first substantial benefit increase in six years for retired teachers who worked so hard to educate our children and desperately need this funding."

The General Appropriation Act (HB 1) for the 2008-2009 biennium totaled just over \$152 billion, an increase of 7.0 percent from the previous biennium. A few of the highlights:

Education funding (public and higher education) received \$60.952 billion, a \$3.9 billion funding increase. This
amount covers the Teachers' Retirement System, financial aid and additional funding for public schools and higher
education.

• Health and Human Services funding totaled \$51.077 billion, \$2.2 billion in additional funds for increased Medicaid and CHIP costs, improved provider rates for physicians and other healthcare professionals, and a major increase in new mental health crisis services.

Public Safety and Criminal Justice agencies received an increase of \$677 million to meet projected correctional
population increases and to provide increased funds for rehabilitation programs and border security operations. Border security received \$103 million for enforcement operations and additional law officers.

• \$2.5 billion will remain unappropriated to carry forward to the following biennium, and the state's Rainy Day Fund will accumulate \$4.3 billion by the end of FY2009. This total of \$7.0 billion ensures that homeowners will continue to benefit from the property tax reductions enacted during the 79th Legislature.

The Legislature continued to address the controversy over eminent domain power used for economic development purposes, sparked by the U.S. Supreme Court's Kelo decision. House Bill 2006 defines what constitutes a "public use" for which eminent domain proceedings may be initiated. It gives guidance on what evidence may be included when adequate compensation is being calculated in an eminent domain proceeding. The bill also establishes that a condemning entity must make a good faith effort to acquire a property through voluntary purchase. This is an attempt by the Legislature to further protect property owners in condemnation cases.

"This session we were able to establish a landowner 'Bill of Rights' that will inform a property owner of their legal protections if they face condemnation, as well as, allow owners of property that was taken through an eminent domain proceeding the ability to repurchase the property if it was never used for its intended purpose," stated Rep. Keffer.

FOOD Serve Versatile Egg Salad

(NU) - Is there such a thing as comfort food, convenience, fun and good nutrition all wrapped up in one? Yes. It's egg salad. Just keep hard-cooked eggs on hand in the fridge and you can quickly and easily whip up a soothing salad whenever you like.

Depending on your mood, you might prefer to make the simplest of all egg salads — just chopped eggs and mayo — or you might find a colorful, multiingredient salad more appealing.

Start with a moisturizing ingredient. If you're out of mayo, consider plain or lemon-flavored yogurt, sour cream or your favorite creamy salad dressing. Stir in a dash of herbs or a seasoning blend, lemon juice, mustard, pickle relish or anything else that goes along with the flavoring ingredients you've chosen.

To flavor your egg salad, you can add almost anything you like — chopped or shredded veggies fresh from the garden or market, shredded cheese, chopped nuts or olives. Maybe you'd prefer an egg-potato, egg-rice, egg-chicken or egg-tuna salad. For an economical combo, inexpensive eggs plus leftovers are a good choice. See what's on hand in your fridge and cabinets to decide.

Simply stir everything together, then dish up the salad on lettuce leaves, in tomato or bellpepper cups, between slices of toast or bread, stuffed into pita pockets or wrapped in tortillas.

No matter what you use to flavor your salad, the eggs provide the highest quality protein of any

food along with lots of vitamins and minerals. To round out a balanced meal, enjoy your egg salad with whatever food groups aren't already in the salad. If you serve this Vegetarian Egg Salad as a sandwich, you need only a glass of milk and some fruit. What could be easier?

Vegetarian Egg Salad 2 servings

- 2 tablespoons reduced-fat mayonnaise
- 1 teaspoon Dijon-style mustard
- 1/8 teaspoon dried dill weed 2 hard-cooked eggs,* chopped
- 1/4 cup finely chopped zucchini
- (about 1/4 medium zucchini) 1/4 cup shredded carrot
- (about 1/2 medium carrot)
- 2 tablespoons finely
- chopped celery
- 1 tablespoon sliced green onion with top
- 4 slices whole wheat bread, plain or toasted
- Lettuce or baby spinach leaves

In small bowl, stir together mayonnaise, mustard and dill. Add eggs, zucchini, carrot, celery and onion. Toss until evenly coated with dressing. Cover and refrigerate to blend flavors. Spread about 1/2 cup egg salad on each of 2 bread slices. Top with lettuce leaves and remaining bread slices.

*To hard-cook: Place eggs in single layer in saucepan. Add enough tap water to come at least



1 inch above eggs. Cover. Quickly bring just to boiling. Turn off heat. If necessary, remove pan from burner to prevent further boiling. Let eggs stand, covered, in the hot water, 15 minutes for Large eggs (about 18 minutes for Extra Large eggs, about 12 minutes for Medium). Immediately run cold water over eggs or place them in ice water until completely cooled.

To remove shell: Crackle shell by tapping gently all over. Roll egg between hands to loosen shell. Then peel, starting at large end. Hold egg under running cold water or dip in bowl of water to help ease off shell.

Texas' volunteer fire fighters and emergency responders perform heroically in protecting their neighbors and communities. In addition to often going uncompensated for their work, these men and women have also been responsible for the costs of healthcare incurred as a result of job-related injuries, either paying out-of-pocket or using existing health insurance. This session, lawmakers voted to release funding to provide healthcare coverage for volunteer emergency service providers. Also, Rep. Keffer's HB 3315 doubled funding to the Texas Rural Volunteer Fire Department Assistance Program from its current \$15 million to \$30 million. This funding can be used for fire departments to acquire firefighting vehicles, equipment, protective clothing, communication devices and training.

"The available money will assist many more volunteer fire departments across the state who took a direct hit during last year's wildfires," said Rep. Keffer. "Also, legislation was passed to provide job protection for volunteer emergency responders and to help identify non-functioning fire hydrants."

Representative Keffer joined in a bipartisan effort to make improvements to Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). House Bill 109 restores several aspects of CHIP that were cut during previous sessions in order to contend with a \$10 billion budget deficit. The bill extends the eligibility period from six months to twelve months, decreasing bureaucratic inefficiencies associated with more frequent re-enrollment. It eliminates the 90-day enrollment waiting period, except for children previously covered by another insurance plan. It revises income eligibility by using net income rather than gross income, and it eliminates the assets test. Also, it reinstates community and school-based outreach programs to increase awareness about CHIP among potentially eligible children and their families. "For each dollar that the state invests in CHIP, the federal government provides approximately \$2.60 in matching funds," said Keffer. "This federal match is considerably higher than the federal match provided for other programs, such as Medicaid, which only pulls down \$1.56. Since Texas has the highest percentage of uninsured children in the nation, it makes sense that we should improve a program that helps working families obtain health insurance. Otherwise we pay much higher costs when the uninsured go to an emergency room for care."

Another measure sponsored by Rep. Keffer helps all Texas families by abolishing the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) tax. "The TIF had completed its purpose of funding infrastructure upgrades, but it was still being used for other purposes, a practice which I strongly disagree with," said Keffer. "In all fairness to the taxpayer, it was time for the TIF tax to go."

On May 15th, Representative Keffer announced his candidacy for Speaker of the Texas House for the 81st Regular session in January 2009. "During the next 18 months I will continue representing my constituents of the district while also visiting with my fellow legislative colleagues about the future of Texas," said Keffer.

The Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives is the presiding officer of the Texas House whose main duties are to conduct meetings of the House, appoint committees, and enforce the Rules of the House. The speaker is elected from the body of the House, by a vote of its fellow members on the first day of each regular session. The members may nominate a fellow member, and a record vote is held to determine who the speaker will be. The Secretary of State calls the House to order, and presides over the chamber until a speaker is elected.

The following is a list of key bills carried and passed by Rep. Keffer:

HB 1205 - Relating to the prohibition of certain employment discrimination regarding an employee who is a volunteer emergency responder. Protect emergency responders from being terminated, demoted, or discriminated against due to the employee being absent from or late to work in order to respond to an emergency. Applies to businesses with 50 or more employees.

HB 1573 - Relating to the creation, administration, powers, duties, functions, operations, and financing of the Fort Griffin Special Utility District. Converts the current water supply district into a special utility district so that it may have the advantages of being a political subdivision of the state, including liability protections, ability to issue taxexempt bonds for financing, and better insurance rates.

HB 1920 - Relating to the remedies available in connection with certain disputes between producers of natural gas and persons who gather or transport the gas. Creates a process by which natural gas producers may obtain information from someone who gathers or transports their gas to determine what happened to the natural gas while the natural gas was in the custody of the gatherer. The process would make the information necessary to determine what caused the loss of the natural gas and to determine whether some portion of any unaccounted for gas belongs to the producer. Every cubic foot of gas that is recovered translates into additional severance tax and royalty being paid.

HB 1921 - Relating to the use of certain devices in a polling place. Places a law that clarifies a memorandum from the Secretary of States on the use of cell phones in election places. The law would prohibit the use of wireless communication devices as well as any devices with mechanical or electronic means of recording images and sounds within 100 feet of a voting station and authorizes the presiding election judge to require violators to either turn off such devices or to leave the polling place.

HB 1930 - Relating to gifts and grants for financing or assisting the operation of the office of county attorney in Brown County.¹ Allows for the acceptance of gifts or grants from individuals, partnerships, corporations, trusts, foundations, associations, or governmental entities for the purpose of financing or assisting the operation of the office. HB 2061 - Relating to the acquisition or disclosure of the social security number of a living person by a governmental body, including by a district or county clerk. Provides that a county or district clerk is not liable for the disclosure of an SSN contained in a document filed with the county or district clerk. It requires, upon written request of an individual, the redaction, from documents specified by the individual, of all but the last four numbers of an SSN unless

another law requires the full SSN to be maintained on the document.

HB 2400 - Relating to membership in, contributions to, benefits from, and administration of the Texas Emergency Services Retirement System. Continues the process, begun by the 79th Legislature and continued during the interim by the state board of trustees, of modernizing and improving the operations of the Texas Emergency Services Retirement System and the state and local boards of trustees for the purpose of making clear and uniform the procedures for the delivery of the benefits promised by the pension system.

HB 3928 - Relating to technical changes to the revised franchise tax. Made technical changes to the revised franchise tax. Created a sliding scale discount for small businesses with receipts up to \$900,000. Added a bonus deduction for small employers who provide employee health benefits for the first time. The bonus deduction is 50% of the health care costs the first year they are provided and 25% for the second year. Created a simplified calculation for taxpayers with less than \$10 million in total revenue.

SB 1877 - Relating to the determination of compensation under the Teacher Retirement System of Texas. Allows for any additional salary supplements to be calculated towards TRS.

HB 3315 - Relating to the imposition and collection of certain insurance taxes, the adoption of certain reciprocal or multi-state agreements relating to those taxes, and the adoption of rules relating to those taxes. Provides guidance and clarification about the collection of insurance taxes Raises the Texas Rural Volunteer Fire Department Assistance Program funding from \$15 million to \$30 million.

HB 3319 - Relating to the sales and use tax. Updates and clarifies the state sales and use tax. Updates the "Back to School" sales tax holiday to coincide with the new school start date to take place on the third Friday in August. Includes a new exemption on school backpacks at a sales price of under \$100 in the "Back to School" sales tax holiday weekend.
