

She was preceded by her husband, Henry L. Killen in 1996; and one sister, Nelda Fay Rauch.









This consists of State residents 55 years of age or older. The program promotes projects that enhance the environment. Seniors have the ability and desire to remain active in their communities. This program is administered by Green Thumb Inc., a national, not-for-profit organization. Under this law, the income limitation has increased to \$14,258 and to \$10,948 for individuals living in someone else's home, an increase from previous \$10,691 limit. Couples living on their own can now earn up to \$25,031 up from (\$24,444) and still participate in the program. The living for couples living in another person's home has also been raised to \$18,775 from the previous \$18,335.

This program not only helps supplement the incomes of low income seniors, but is also gives them a chance to remain active and productive in society.

Older workers are more substantial than before they are valued by Americans because they are described as more experienced, better judgement, stronger commitment to quality and a lower turnover rate.

Thus employers need to thank about the retention of older employees. Retaining older workers will save on recruitment and training of hiring a new employee.

She spoke on issues of concern to representatives of Texas' more than 225,000 farms and ranches, including extension of the 2002 Farm Bill and disaster relief.

"The passage of a new farm bill that is good for Texas is one of my top priorities for the new congress," Sen. Hutchison said. "The 2002 Farm Bill successfully addressed the goal of producing a safe, abundant domestic food supply, while also protecting the interests of our agriculture industry. We must continue these policies as we craft new legislation."

In March 2006, Sen. Hutchison led efforts to direct over \$12 million in relief funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to farmers impacted by the single largest wildfire in Texas history. She is also a co-sponsor of the Emergency Farm Relief Act of 2006, which provides over \$2.5 billion in relief for crop losses in 2005 or 2006 and over \$1.7 billion for livestock losses due to wildfires. "Between drought, hurricanes, and wildfires, this has been a tough year for farmers and ranchers," Sen. Hutchison said. "Farms and ranches are a vital component of our state and national economy. When the farmers and ranchers suffer, we all suffer." Prior to the devastating Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, Sen. Hutchison advocated for the establishment of a "rainy day fund," emergency funding set aside to aid in recovery from natu-



Tax Relief Heads This Week's Agenda

The House will likely finish its 2006 legislative business this week and making sure important tax relief measures are enacted are at the top of the "to-do" list. These measures include extending the college tuition tax credit and the teacher tax deduction. In addition, we will likely vote to extend a tax relief item of particular interest to Texans: sales tax deductibility. Enacted in 2005, sales tax deductibility gives Texas taxpayers the option of deducting state and local sales taxes from their federal income tax returns. Taxpayers in states with a state income tax can deduct their state taxes from their federal returns. However, because Texas curred, with the last ending in the late 1970s. doesn't have a state income tax, in the past, Texans have been forced to pay more. The "Sales Tax Deductibility" option makes this situation fairer to Texans. Other important items that the House will take up this week include preventing a decrease in reimbursements to physicians who treat Medicare patients, authorizing increased exploration for oil and natural gas off our nation's coastlines, and ensuring that the federal government has the funds to operate through the beginning of 2007.

Controlling the Burn

Wildfires are always a concern in rural Texas, but these days, fire threatens life and property throughout our state. While weather-related fires are largely out of our control, there is much that individuals can do to protect. themselves, their neighbors and the Texas landscape.

We have just endured the most damaging and prolific wildfire season in Texas history, and more fire-related deaths have been reported this year than any other on record: between January 2005 and September 2006, 19 Texans died in a record 31,000 wildfires that burned upwards of 700 homes and 2.2 million acres.

Fires in these last 18 months have cost property owners some \$628 million in damage. The burden of containment usually falls on local firefighters backed by state crews, but recently we've needed outside help. Last year, nearly 4,000 firefighting personnel and 500 pieces of equipment from all 50 states were called on for assistance.

Our situation is so dramatic that The Weather Channel sent a TV crew to Texas last April to document the wildfire epidemic for its program, "Stor Stories: The Worst of Nature-The Best of Man."

The TV crew arrived a month after a wildfire packing 50-foot flames claimed 11 lives and burned an estimated 850,000 acres in the Texas Panhandle. The blaze ignited when electrical lines snapped in wind gusts of 50-60 mph.

Our increasing state population is a central focus as the incidence of wildfires increases. New housing subdivisions are being developed right next to rural grasslands, and we're using larger areas of fire-prone vegetation, which further contributes to the problem.

For example, residents of Cross Plains last year found themselves in the path of a massive wildfire. The source of the blaze is undetermined, but investigators did establish that it began on the "roadside."

The Texas Forest Service (TFS) at Texas A&M University has identified more than 14,500 communities, in every area of the state, that are at risk for wildfire damage. In fact, 85 percent of wildfires occur less than two miles from a community.

But the primary reason for the increased incidence of wildfires is likely due to changing weather patterns; and Texas A&M researchers say we're well into a drought that could potentially last two to three decades.

Several years ago, analyzing weather data from the last 100 years, the Forest Service identified a distinctive cycle of wet and dry periods, each lasting some 25-30 years. Three separate drought periods of this duration oc-


Then a relatively wet period followed. We entered the current drought period in 1996, and we can expect it to last at least 15 more years, the A&M research indicates. Even with rain, we can expect sustained increases in the number and severity of wildfires over that period.

Keep plants like holly, mistletoe, poinsettias, and lilies out of animals' reach-they can cause nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain, diarrhea, and even death if eaten.

Cover your tree stand with a decorative skirt to prevent animals from drinking pine needle- and preservative-filled water.

Guests coming and going provide more opportunities for animals to slip out. Make sure they are wearing collars and I.D. tags, just in case.

Public resources devoted to firefighting have not kept up with the increasing threat. State and local authorities need more manpower and more equipment. Forestry authorities will be seeking additional funding in the next state legislative session.

"By making a moderate investment up front-instead of after Texas starts burning-to reduce the factors which cause wildfires, the lives and properties of Texans can be protected and saved from catastrophic loss," says James B. Hull, who doubles as State Forester and director of the TFS.

Individuals play a major role. Remember "Only you can prevent forest fires"? It's not that different with wildfires in Texas. The Forest Service recommends:

• Watch for burn bans in your county. Updated lists may be found at the Texas Wildfire Information page found at the website http://tfsnews.tamu.edu; · Don't throw cigarettes out of your car windows;

· Avoid parking or driving where dry grass and weeds can come into contact with the hot pollution control equipment under your vehicle;

· Before burning household trash, brush piles or other debris, establish firebreaks down to bare soil around the intended fire site, including burn barrels; and

· Keep fires small and extinguish them cold to the touch before leaving them unattended.

Experts say that with care, and proper planning, some 90 percent of wildfires can be prevented. We should all do our part to protect the beauty, the property and-most importantly-the lives of those in our great state.
