Edward Rodgers Awarded Honorary Membership In NTHA

Edward Rodgers was awarded "Honorary Membership" in The Northwest Texas Hospital Association on July 13, 2006 in Abilene at the Annual Convention' for this past contribution to the Hospital Industry throughout his career. This lifetime appointment allos his annual participation in the organization that began in 1929.

Edward began his 39-year career as hospital administrator at Blackwell Hospital and Clinic in Gorman on December 20, 1962. From Gorman he moved tot he Medical Arts Hospital in Brownwood. Ed worked with community leaders as they began consolidating two old hospitals into what is now Brownwood Regional Medical Center.

His next destination was Seminole in September 1966. During this 12-year adventures in Gaines County, he was instrumental in forming a hospital district, overseeing the building of a 49-bed hospital and additional clinic space. He also helped restart Seagraves Hospital that had been closed during an era of critical doctor shortage in Texas.

After a stay in Falfurrias and Alpine, Ed ended is career in Denver City, Texas. During those 19 years he served as president of Northwest Texas Hospital Association, Rotary Club President, and Texas Hospital Association Division Chairman. Again Ed was involved in building a new hospital and a new clinic. In 1996 Ed was promoted to a Vice President position with The Covenant Hospital System of Lubbock while serving as CEO in Denver City.

Ed seemed to always be involved with Church, youth activity including Boy Scouts and Little League. He was a Lions Club member for 15 years, a Rotarian for 21 years and was a member of the Chamber of Commerce in Seminole and Denver City. In February 2001 he retired back to hometown of Gorman. He and his high school sweetheart will celebrate their 48 wedding anniversary in March of next year. Ed has 2 children. When not spending time with his 3 grandchildren, he is till involved in church, ranch work, photography, hunting, fishing, retrieving his home site from nature and other hobbies.

Upcoming Sales Tax Holiday 2006

Consumers across the state will soon be able to take advantage of the upcoming back-to-school sales tax holiday, announced State Representative Jim Keffer (R-Eastland). The annual Sales Tax Holiday is set for the first full weekend in August.

"Texans have the opportunity to save millions of dollars during this program," said Representative Keffer. "I strongly encourage the citizens of District 60 to invest in their community by shopping locally, and parents can then focus their resources on their children's education, healthcare or whatever they deem most necessary."

From Friday morning to midnight on Sunday, August 4-6, shoppers will be able to purchase most clothes and shoes without paying any sales taxes. The holiday will help expand parents' spending power to more easily obtain much needed items for their children's education.

The tax break will apply to both state and local sales taxes adding up to a large amount of savings. Retailers have seen an increased number of shoppers during the holiday comparable to the days after Thanksgiving and Christmas.

During the period, clothes and shoes, including boots that sell for less than \$100 will not be taxed. However, tax will still be due on athletic and protective clothing that is not normally worn except for their intended use. For example, items such as metal baseball cleats, rarely worn except for when playing baseball, will still be taxed. Additionally, taxes will still be due on sales of accessories, jewelry, handbags, luggage, umbrellas, wallets, watches, and similar items.

One of man's greatest achievements occurred 37 years ago this month On July 20, 1969, two American astronauts guided their landing craft to the moon's surface. Neil Armstrong's historic radio transmission on that first lunar visit began simply with the words, "Houston, Tranquility Base here. The Eagle has landed."

Since that time, America's space exploration program - not yet even 50 years old – has enjoyed astounding success. It has also experienced a handful of breathtaking tragedies. Through it all, our country has remained steadfastly committed to the exploration of space: an enormous expanse of unvisited territory, our final frontier.

It's entirely fitting that Texas, with its pioneering spirit and frontier traditions, helps lead our country in these endeavors. We take pride that our astronauts train in Houston at the Johnson Space Center, and that every space mission is commanded from "Space City,"

A good number of U.S. astronauts have been Texas natives: Navy Capt. Alan Bean of Wheeler was the lunar module pilot on the Apollo 12 mission, man's second lunar landing. The late Navy Capt. Edgar Mitchell of Hereford walked on the moon in January, 1971, on the Apollo 14 mission. Kenneth Cockrell of Austin, John Blaha of San Antonio and Robert Crippen of Beaumont each completed five shuttle missions. Dr. Bernard Harris of San Antonio, Elliot See, Jr. of Dallas and David Scott of San Antonio have also made history in space.

And some of the American space program's fallen heroes were native Texans, such as the late Col. Rick Husband and the late Lt. Col. Ed White II.

Husband, an Amarillo native, was crew commander of the 2003 Space Shuttle Columbia, which exploded over his home state during re-entry into the earth's atmosphere, just 16 minutes before its scheduled landing.

White, born in San Antonio, was the first man to walk in space. He died in 1967 in the Apollo spacecraft flash-fire during a launch-pad test at Kennedy Space Center, Florida.

Exploration - surmounting any barriers to greater understanding of our world - always involves risk. Space exploration is no exception: there will always be the potential for physical danger. We Americans owe a great debt of gratitude to those who have sacrificed their lives in these pioneering pursuits.

Space exploration is our destiny. Man is born with a natural desire to explore and solve the puzzles before him. We will eventually navigate our entire universe, and go beyond it. The only questions are when, and how.

Our National Aeronautic and Space Administration (NASA) programs are indeed expensive. But the hard science the programs produce are key to our country's engineering and technological research - work that keeps the U.S. at the leading edge of the world's technology

House Ag Committee Heads to Virginia

The House Agriculture Committee's tour of the country made yet another stop this week. This time, the destination was western Virginia. As with the previous stops on the tour, including the visit to Texas in May, the Committee heard from producers in the region to gather input on what the 2007 Farm Bill should look like.

Farmers in Virginia had insights and concerns similar to producers in Texas. They believe the current Farm Bill is working well and sang the praises of certain programs, such as the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). There was also strong support for ethanol research and production. I am glad to hear that both EQIP and ethanol production have garnered support across the country. Both of these issues are important to the 19th District and should remain a part of U.S. farm policy.

The Virginia hearing marks the fifth full committee field hearing I have attended this year (I also attended a subcommittee hearing in Georgia). These hearings have been very informative and should prove beneficial as we begin our work in the Ag Committee next year to shape the future of farm policy in America.

Stem Cell Research Debate Comes Front and Center

This week, President Bush and members of Congress will turn their attentions to the issue of stem cell research. As the stem cell debate unfolds, it is important to understand what exactly is being debated. Most if not all - members of Congress and much of the American public support ethical stem cell research. Furthermore, all types of stem cell research are legal at this time. The differences in opinion arise over what types of research are funded by the federal government. I support using federal funds to back adult stem cell research which treats all human beings - even the smallest among us - with the dignity and respect they deserve and has the best track record of improving the lives of the sick and impaired. In the past few months alone, more and more adult stem cells are demonstrating the same flexibility as embryonic stem cells. For example, studies show that bone marrow stem cells can turn into most tissue types. Stem cells taken from an adult's nose can develop into heart cells, liver cells and even brain cells. As a result, I will vote in favor of S. 2754, the Alternative Pluripotent Stem Cell Therapies Enhancement Act. This bill has protections to prevent funding from going to any techniques that would harm or destroy human embryos. In addition to this bill supporting adult stem cell research, another bill is currently making its way through Congress that would use taxpayer dollars to fund research on embryonic stem cells. This type of research crosses ethical boundaries since it inevitably results in the destruction of a human life. Unfortunately, this bill has already passed the House and is likely to pass the Senate. However, President Bush has signaled that he will veto the embryonic stem cell legislation if it reaches his desk. If the president does veto the bill, the House will then vote on whether to sustain that veto. I support President Bush's stance and will vote only for ethical stem cell research.



Math and Science Requirements Benefit Our Future

America is the undisputed leader in the global economy because of innovations in science and technology. Our dominant strategic position, economic advantages, and high standard of living are driven by our leadership in these areas. To maintain our competitive advantage and keep our economy strong, however, we must prepare our children to compete in the global market of tomorrow by improving science and math education.

Beginning next year, Texas high school students will be required to complete four years of both math and science. The Texas Legislature established these standards in the recently passed House Bill 1, which increased the previous level of three years of science and math. I strongly applaud this effort to improve our students' understanding of math and science, as America's continued leadership in scientific research and education is critical to the future of our economic and national security. It is imperative that the state follow this measure by providing teachers and school districts with the necessary support to expand math and science programs across Texas.

For many years, I have worked in the United States Senate to provide additional resources to support math and science education. I co-sponsored the Protecting America's Competitive Edge (PACE) Act, which authorizes the National Science Foundation to provide four-year scholarships of up to \$20,000 a year to students who major in math and science in college and pursue concurrent teacher certification. The PACE Act also supports continued education for current teachers by providing funding for three-year master's degree programs in math and science. An extra year of math or science in high school will lead to more students entering college with a passion for these subjects, which in turn will lead to more passionate teachers for the next generation of Texans.

High school students currently acquire a well-rounded understanding of science by completing biology, chemistry and physics, while fulfilling math requirements by studying algebra, geometry and algebra II. Students will now have an opportunity to complete additional courses in areas of interest that may not have previously counted for credit towards graduation. Students who are interested in a particular area of math or science can choose an additional year in that subject, perhaps in an Advanced Placement course to prepare for college. Or they can study a less traditional subject, such as meteorology or statistics. Additional math and science exposure will provide students options to pursue their passions in these areas. Teachers will also be able to teach classes at a higher level or in their areas of expertise.

Under these new requirements, high schools will be in a position to develop new math and science courses that will lead to long-term benefits for our state. For example, our state's population is projected to double by 2050, which will strain our water resources. Students taking earth science courses could develop an interest in solving water constraints, which would benefit all Texans.

Many commercial applications already have been harvested from space research. As former NASA official Michael Lembeck recently noted: "It's about far more than Teflon, Velcro and Tang."

One small example: A computer chip originally designed for the Hubble Telescope is now used in a digital imaging device that screens for cancer. The camera within can detect the difference between a malignant or a benign tumor - no invasive surgery is necessary.

Many other medical advances have been brought to us thanks to space technology, including the cochlear implant, an electronic device that can select speech signal information and send electrical pulses to the ear. This technology can actually reverse severe hearing loss.

What's more, the ultimate commercialization may come in the form of space tourism. Last year, American Mike Melvill became the first person to reach space aboard a privately funded, winged spacecraft known as "SpaceShipOne." Melvill's space plane was developed without government funding. This achievement may well hold for the future of flight the same promise as the Wright Brothers' feat at Kitty Hawk .

In centuries to come, when space travel is commonplace and America has tapped the resources of other planets, these first years of our space program will be remembered as the most significant.


With Rep. John Culberson of Houston, I've sponsored legislation to commemorate our first 50 years in space. Our bill would direct the U.S. Mint to create a \$50 gold coin with an image of the sun, and nine \$1 silver coins, each representing a planet in our solar system. Some proceeds would assist a need-based fund for surviving family members of the NASA personnel who died while performing their official duties.

Texas once appeared to our forefathers as vast as space appears to us. Texas was founded by courageous men and women who braved the unknown - despite the hardship and danger lining their trails. So Texans have always shared a particular empathy for our pioneers and explorers.

To the seven Discovery shuttle astronauts flying above me tonight: I salute you. You are all Texans in spirit.

Our greatest discoveries are yet to come.

I will continue to work to secure federal aid for math and science in Texas. One project I am proud to support is the Math and Science Partnerships Initiative, which provides federal funds to school districts to partner with local universities and community colleges to offer more rigorous math and science courses.

We must do a better job of preparing our children today for the jobs of tomorrow. Recent scores on standardized tests show that 82 percent of American 12th-graders are not proficient in science and 72 percent of eighth-graders are not proficient in math. These figures are unacceptable, and we must address these deficiencies.

During the next decade, the U.S. demand for scientists and engineers is expected to increase at more than double the rate for all other occupations. The National Academy of Sciences reports that foreign-born students currently receive nearly half of all engineering and computer science doctorate degrees awarded in the United States. The jobs that will fuel our economy for years to come will be in groundbreaking areas of science and engineering. Encouraging additional math and science education in high school will help provide a pool of qualified American workers for these jobs.

Increasing high school math and science requirements today prepares students for rewarding careers in related fields to solve the problems of
