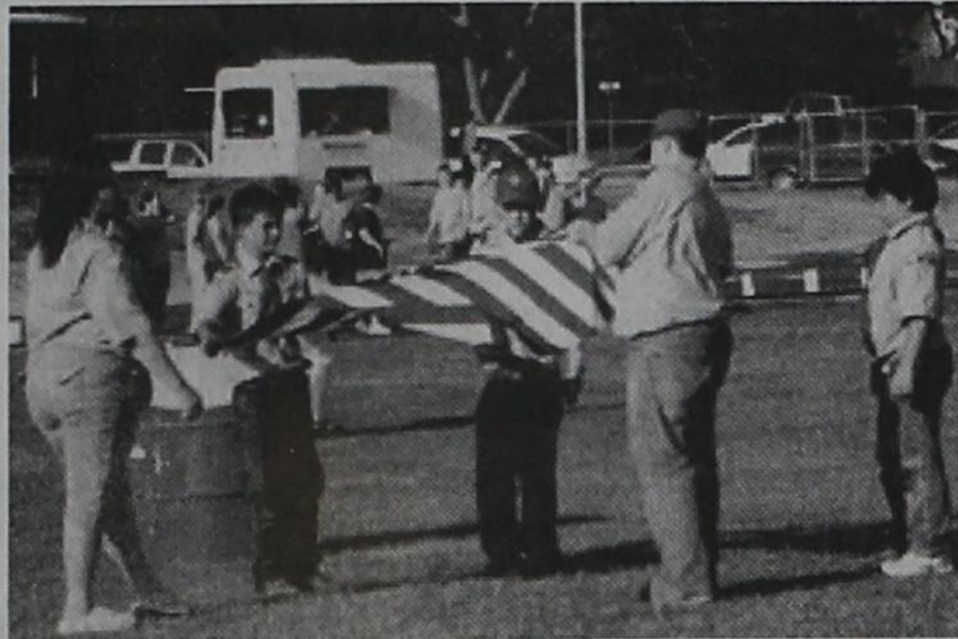

Joe led the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge.

Mayor Ervin called the meeting to order @ 5:31 p.m.

Nathan made the motion to approve the minutes as read. Charlie made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

Joe made the motion to approve the bills for payment. Don made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

At 6:00 p.m. Charlie made the motion to go into Executive Session. Nathan made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

At 7:00 p.m. Don made the motion to adjourn from Executive and return to regular open session. Charlie made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

Ray Adams was present to place an application with the city and have an interview. Mr. Adams and the Commission agreed that a position in Gorman wasn't what he wanted.

Billy Carson and David Stanley had both been an employee 90 day probation period. The Commission felt as if everything was on a positive note and Nathan made the motion to raise Billy to \$14.00 / hour and David to \$13.00 / hour. Don made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

Application Process Begins for Second Certification Class in Manufacturing

Abilene, Texas--The West Central Texas Workforce Development Board, in partnership with the Development Corporation of Abilene, the Workforce Center, and Texas State Technical College, are pleased to announce that applications are currently being taken for the next MSSC certification course, which is a newly-developed training program in basic manufacturing. The seven-week curriculum will culminate in the awarding of a certification as a "Manufacturing Production Technician." The nationally-recognized credential is awarded by the Manufacturing Skills Standards Council (MSSC), and having this credential demonstrates competency in basic skills required to enter any type of manufacturing environment in any geographical location. Each trainee must complete a 140-hour course, which will consist of five to six weeks of manufacturing skills training at TSTC and one week of basic employment skills training at the Workforce Center.

Ten local manufacturers, including Bandag, Abtex Beverages, Coca-Cola, Tige Boats, Martin Sprocket & Gear, Fehr Foods, Peerless Manufacturing, Rentech Boiler Services, PWP Industries, and Zoltek, participated in a series of meetings and a survey process during the months of October and November 2006 to determine their interest in hiring workers with the MSSC certification. A significant shortage of entry-level workers and an immediate hiring need of 90-105 additional workers was identified. Targeted manufacturers have voiced their overwhelming support for the MSSC training, and have agreed to participate in a job fair and provide interviews to any job-seeking student who completes the training and certification process.

Funding for the training and the certification assessment fee for each participant will be covered by the Development Corporation of Abilene and the Workforce Development Board. The application and screening process is currently in progress for the second MSSC class, which is scheduled to begin on June 4, 2007. Interested individuals may pick up an application packet at the Workforce Center, 400 Oak Street, in Abilene, or download an application at www.workforcesystem.org. The deadline to submit completed application forms is May 11th. For additional information, contact the Business Services Unit at the Workforce Center at (325) 795-4200.

Former Local Youth Minister's Probation Revoked

Presiding Judge Steven R. Herod of the 91st Judicial District Court revoked the probation of JONATHAN MARK HART, 29, Monday morning after having heard a day and a half of testimony in the 91st District Courtroom at the Eastland County Courthouse.

Hart, now a Henderson County resident, had previously been placed on ten years probation in February, 1999 after an Eastland County Jury convicted him of three counts of sexual assault on three youths he had pastored at the United Pentecostal Church of Eastland. In July, 1998, an Eastland County Grand Jury had returned 19 indictments, some with multiple counts, for sexual assault against Hart. A jury heard the cases in February, 1999 and returned only three guilty verdicts, assessing punishment at ten years confinement probated for a period of ten years and a \$1,000 fine.

Criminal District Attorney Russ Thomason, who prosecuted the case, filed a Motion to Revoke Community Supervision on December 19, 2006 alleging among other things, that Hart had failed to abide by all rules and regulations of the sex offender treatment program.

Judge Herod set punishment at ten years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the maximum sentence allowed by law in these cases due to the 1999 jury's verdict.

Sex Offender Convicted Of Failing To Register

On Friday, May 4, 2007, Presiding Judge, Steven R. Herod of the 91st District Court handed down two eight year sentences of confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to Timothy Jaymes Langley, 20 and formerly of Cisco, for failing to register as a sex offender.

Langley had entered a plea of guilty on two charges of Failure to Comply with Sex Offender Registration Requirements to the Court on Monday, April 23, 2007 and asked that the Judge Herod determine punishment after having rejected a plea offer involving confinement from the District Attorneys Office. Langley had been on parole from the Texas Youth Commission for Indecency with a Child in 2002.

Criminal District Attorney Russ Thomason presented evidence from two different witnesses during the punishment phase of the plea. Abilene Attorney Jenny Henley represented Langley during the trial.

Texas law requires that a person who has a reportable conviction for a sexual offense must register with the local law enforcement authority in the municipality where the defendant resides.

Thomason stated, "Our local law enforcement agencies are very diligent in monitoring sex offenders in this community and the Judge's sentence should send a very strong message to any sex offender who might fail to strictly comply with the state's registration requirements - don't."
