Neugebauer Praises Passage of Abortion Parental Notification

Congressman Randy Neugebauer supported Tuesday's passage of a bill to protect the health of minor girls and reaffirm parental rights.

The Child Custody Protection Act (S. 403) makes it a federal misdemeanor to transport a minor across state lines to have an abortion with the intent of evading parental consent or parental notification laws in the minor's home state.

"By reinforcing widely-supported parental notifications laws, this bill respects the rights of parents who, through the democratic process, have said that they want to be involved in the medical decisions of their children," Neugebauer said. "More importantly, it helps protect the health of young girls who may be exploited dation during October 2006. or forced into making an uninmedical procedure."





EDC Talk





AGRICULTURAL VIEWPOINT

FALL FERTILIZATION FOR LAWNS

Fall is the ideal time to fertilizer both warm season turfgrasses and especially the cool season turfgrasses. Early to late October is the ideal time to apply your fall application of fertilizer. It is in the fall that turfgrasses are producing and storing the largest amount of carbohydrates. The longer the grass stays green and growing in the fall, the longer the turfgrass plants will be able to produce these stored carbohydrates.

Unless you have a soil test report that indicates a different need, I still recommend using a 4-1-2 type ratio fertilizer for the fall application. However, I think most people are aware that many of our native soils are very high in phosphorus as well as potassium. For these soils, you do not need to apply phosphorus in the fall application.

If the application is made in mid to late October, there is no need to use a slow release nitrogen source. First, you do not have that much growing time left to use the nitrogen fertilizer and secondly, due to the cooler night time temperatures and the longer hours of dark, you cannot force rapid vertical growth on the warm season turfgrasses at this time of the year.

If a warm season turfgrass is overseeded with one of the cool season turfgrasses such as perennial ryegrass, then it will be necessary to fertilize the ryegrass in late November to early December and then again in late February with a nitrogen only fertilizer source. Apply approximately 1.0 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet using an all soluble nitrogen fertilizer.


