I, however, am not afraid to put my name on any of my statements because they are all factual and not hearsay or fabricated. During the summer of 1990, I was contacted by the school board of the Sidney ISD and was hired as their principal and vocational agriculture teacher and worked for those fine people for ten years before I retired in June

During the thirty-seven years in education, the last thirteen as an administrator, I saw many changes in public eduction, some good and some not so good. My ultimate goal has always then to improve the quality of education for our students, be it college or a vocational school and to improve our facilities along with the working conditions of our teachers. It is also important that we educate our students in critical thinking skills, how to become positive leaders and to be good role models to the peer and to the community.



## **Army Sgt. Brandon Y. Thomas Has Returned From Iraq**

Army Sgt. Brandon Y. Thomas has returned to Alaska after beis assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 509th Parachute Infantry Regiment, a subordinate unit of the 4th Brigade Combat Team (Airborne), 25th Infantry Division at Fort Richardson, Anchorage.

Operation Iraqi Freedom is the official name given to military operations involving members of the U.S. armed forces and coalition forces participating in efforts to free and secure Iraq. Mission objectives focus on force protection, peacekeeping, stabilization, security and counter-insurgency operations as the Iraqi transitional governing bodies assume full sovereign powers to govern the peoples of Iraq.

Members from all branches of the U.S. military and multinational forces are also assisting in rebuilding Iraq's economic and governmental infrastructure, and training and preparing Iraqi military and security forces to assume full authority and responsibility in defending and preserving Iraq's sovereignty and independence as a democracy.

In addition, Sgt. Thomas has been decorated with the Purple Heart Medal as a member of the U.S. Armed Forces. The medal is awarded to individuals wounded in war or armed conflict while engaged with an enemy or opposing armed force in defense of the United States. It is also awarded posthumously to the next of kin of military members who are killed in action, or who died of wounds received in action. During peacetime, it is awarded to individuals wounded or killed (posthumous award) while part of a peacekeeping force serving with a friendly foreign force, or as a result of terrorist acts.

The decoration was established by Gen. George Washington in 1782 and was known as the Badge of Military Merit. The decoration was revived as the Purple Heart Medal in 1932 by Gen. Douglas MacArthur, and the medal is the oldest U.S. military decoration in use.

Sgt. Thomas also has been decorated with the Army Commendation Medal, and awarded the Combat Infantry Badge. Thomas, an infantry team leader, has served in the military for eight years.

He is the son of Teresa M. Syers of Expo Lane, Carthage, Mo., and Leslie M. Thomas of W. North St., Coffeyville, Kan. His wife, Brandy, is the daughter of Tim and Vonda G. Streiff of Carbon, Texas.



# News From Eastland Co. District Attorney GRAHAM MAN GETS FOUR YEARS FOR UNAUTHORIZED USE OF A MOTOR VEHICLE

Jesse Dale Gardner Jr., 23, formerly of Graham, was convicted and sentenced to four years confinement after entering a plea of guilty to Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle.

Gardner was arrested on October 6, 20078 after committing the offense in Eastland. The investigation was conducted by the City of Eastland Police Department.

Unauthorized use of a motor vehicle is a state jail felony carrying a punishment range of up to two years confinement in a state jail facility. Because Gardner had previously been twice convicted of a state jail felony, the Eastland County Criminal District Attorneys Office used these priors to enhance the punishment to that of a third degree felony.

## MULTIPLE PROBATIONERS GET REVOKED

Steven R. Herod, presiding judge in the 91st District Court revoked the probation of Marcus Antonio Duffie, 25, on April 28, 2008. Duffie, formerly of Ft. Worth had previously been placed on four years probation on March 10, 2005 for tampering with physical evidence. The Court sentenced Duffie to 2 years in a state prison for violating the terms and conditions of his probation.

Herod also revoked the probation of **Amanda Lynn Evans**, 31, on April 28, 2008. Evans, formerly of Ranger, had previously been placed on five years probation on March 20, 2006 for a felony drug offense. The Court sentenced Evans to 16 months in a state jail facility for violating the terms and conditions of her probation.

The following day on April 29, 2008, Herod revoked the probation of **SHANON DON LITTON**, 31. Litton, formerly of Coleman, had previously been placed on four years probation on October 20, 2006 for a felony drug offense. The Court sentenced Litton to 4 years in prison for violating the terms and conditions of his probation.

That same afternoon, April 29, 2008, Herod revoked the probation of MISTY NICOLE MOODY, 28. Moody, formerly of Ranger, had previously been placed on four years probation on May 22, 2006 for a felony drug offense. In February 2008, Moody was ordered to submit to a Court Ordered Residential Treatment Center but failed to remain there. The Court sentenced Moody to 18 months in a state jail facility for violating the terms and conditions of her probation.


