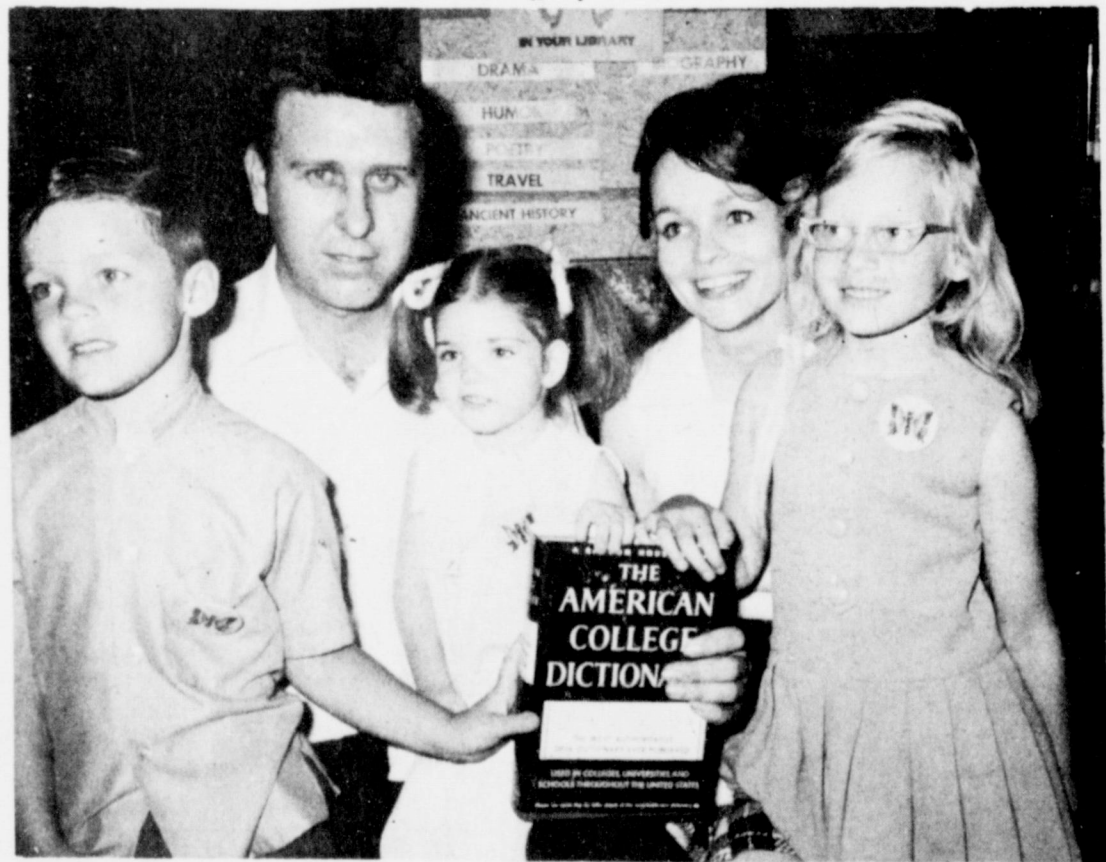
### Guadalupeans Sell Tickets To Help Center

of wires down, gas lines broken from snapped meters, trees and tree limbs broken, fences down and other debris in Muleshoe, flocked in to the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center.

Slight damage was sustained at Morton from high winds, Dimmitt reported extensive damage from the wind, Pettit, Whitharral, Whiteface, Cotton Center, Kress, Plainview, Hale Center, Claytonville, Silverton and Clarendon, all reported tornadoes with damages, deaths and injuries.

Plainview was hit hard, with much of the damage in the downtown area and the Seth Ward Addition in northeast Plainview. Several injuries were reported at the hospitals as law enforcement officials and civil defense moved into the area.

By mid-morning Saturday, the death toll from the Friday night and Saturday morning tornadoes was around 20, with some persons being reported as missing and officers continuing to search through demolished homes.

With telephone lines down in the Muleshoe area, no rain check could be made by press-time.

Captain Pitts said "the one thing that is the best morale builder that the Army cannot supply is a letter from home. If you know anyone in Vietnam please write. Your boy may not write home but believe me he will carry your letter until it wears out."

# WTSU Military Ball

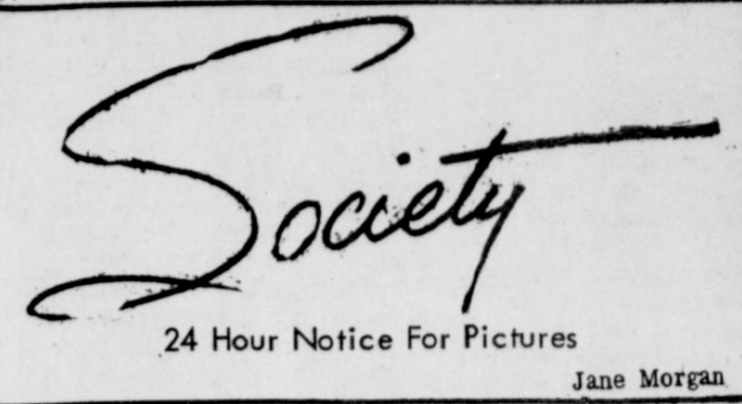

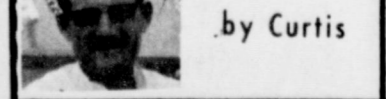

### Ben Franklin Set Up First Library

The earliest libraries in the colonial era were privately owned, although in 1731 Benjamin Franklin projected the first subscription library in Philadelphia. Endowments helped to set up many of the large libraries although many of these institutions are now receiving state or municipal support.

The largest library in the United States is the Library of Congress, established in 1800 by Congress. Its extensive collections, totaling about 43,526,000 items in 1965, are universal in scope. They include more than 13,752,000 books and pamphlets in a multitude of languages and manuscript collections of more than 18,610,000 items relating to American history. The Library extends services to members of Congress and other government departments, and also offers excellent facilities for persons en-

gaged in scholarly research. The growth of libraries attached to colleges and universities in the United States has been phenomenal, and some of the university libraries are among the largest in the country. --1970 World Almanac

Not so many years ago a library was thought of as only a warehouse for books. Many considered a school library as only a place to get assignments. Today we consider it much more than that. It is a place where students may come and exchange ideas as well as these other things. Since most students do not hunger or thirst after righteousness after books it is a librarians job to guide them in the way of good reading.

Margaret Edwards states in her book, The Fair Garden and the Swarm of Beasts, "that work with young people is as simple as ABC; (A) a sympathetic understanding of all adolescents; (B) firsthand knowledge of all books that would interest them; and (C) mastery of the technique of getting these books into the hands of the adolescents. Simple," the Muleshoe High School tries to observe these three rules. The library is kept open from 8 to 4 five days a week for the convenience of the students. Regular class schedules for the library are prepared where every student will be given an opportunity to use the library. Students are welcome in the High School library both before and after school. The library is also used by the orientation classes during the week. We hope that every week will be library week at Muleshoe High School.

Jeff won district championship in golf.

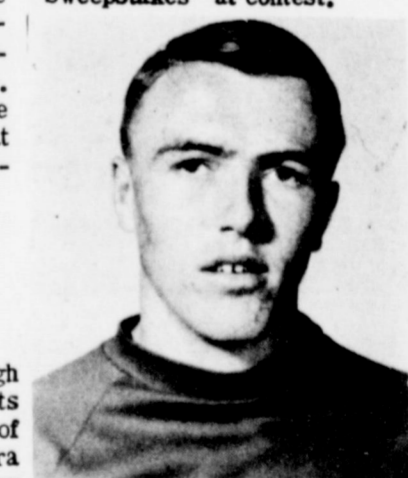

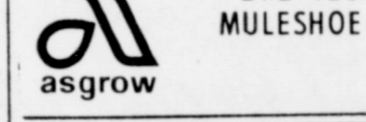

### Indians Say White Man Heap Loco

DALLAS—The famous 30-year-old words of an imaginary Indian, who scorned the waste of the white man, returned this week for a new generation still concerned about the destruction of natural resources.

The Indian's letter of disgust first came into print in The Farmer-Stockman magazine in May, 1940. It has since been frequently and widely quoted.

The Texas Farmer-Stockman reprinted the letter in its May, 1970, issue.

The letter was originally written by O.E. Enfield of Arnett, Oklahoma as an entry in a contest conducted by the magazine. Readers were invited to write a story to go with two photographs: one of a dilapidated farmhouse, the other of an eroded field. Enfield's letter follows:

"Both pictures show white man crazy. Make big teepee. Plow hill. Water wash; wind blow soil. Grass gone, land gone, squaw too, Papoose gone. No chuckaway, no pig, no corn, no cow, no hay, no pony.

"Indian no plow land, Keep grass. Buffalo eat, Indian eat buffalo. Hide make teepee, make moccasins, Indian no make terrace, no build dam, All time eat. No hunt job, no hitch-hike, no ask relief. No shoot pig. Great Spirit make grass, Indian no waste anything, Indian no work. White man heap loco."

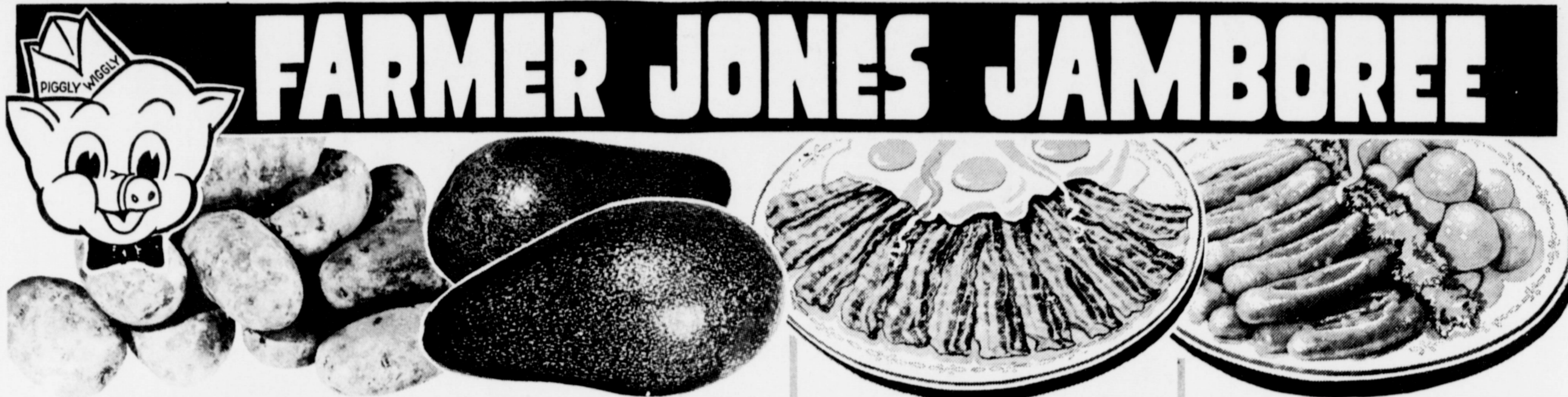
