decision is made. "Although recovery is slow, cotton can recover when all the leaves are destroyed provided the bark and stem is free of bruises and breaks below the

point of the first leaves. Recovery is very doubtful if the stem is broken below the first leaves because no buds are left for renewed growth. Also, recovery is unlikely if the stem was shattered and the bark was loosened and broken to points

below the first leaves. Lubbock is upon us. Depending on when you can get back into the fields, replanting to soybeans may be advisable in northern counties. However, in the Lubbock area southward. cotton is still the best bet. It should be pointed out that soybeans will require irrigation into September, while it is most likely that replanted cotton planted this date will require
