

AGRICULTURAL VIEWPOINT

I was listening last week to Paul Harvey on the radio as I often do, and he began to talk about farmers and agriculture in the United States. He made some comments on economics and importance of agriculture to our national economy and the importance of the upcoming 1995 FARM BILL.

Let me attempt to put in context his statements. "Today there are less than 2 million American farmers feeding our nation of over 260 million, plus many parts of the outside world. Though smaller in number these farms are larger in size and more efficient in production. These 2 million farmers in turn directly employ 21 million other Americans. Agriculture in the United States is big business, in fact it is the largest sector of business in the United States generating more than 71% of our entire national economy. With the 1990 Farm Bill about to expire the new Congress has the important job of developing a new 1995 FARM BILL. With all due respect it should be called the 1994 Consumer Bill, because that's who's receiving the benefits of the Program, Consumers, ... Page Two"


