Dear Editor/ Publisher:

I was privileged to attend the Gorman Homecoming and wish to publicly express my gratitude to a host of people who made it a very joyous reunion for a great number of people. I am not a Gorman School System Ex-student but my oldest daughter, oldest brother, three younger brothers and two younger sisters were. The association of family members including the girl I married being part of the Gorman system I have a great affinity for those among you who have contributed to the precious memories that make me wealthy. Monetary wealther I do not claim. My riches are composed of the memories of those who by their loving deeds furnished comfort to a broken heart when a love was nothing but a broken dream.

Those who were my contemporaries were affected by the Great Depression and the greatest conflagration of all time. Even though some the finest young men and women from this community and other of kindred minds as a national community gave their honor, love and years of their lives there was no guarantee their effort would be successful. An entire generation grew up during those horriblef years of depression and global war who because of those conditions found it necessary to hold on to each othe rin order to help make it through the night and day. No matter how bad the heartache there was joy and comfort knowing that another heart was struggling with your grief also. Becuase there was no assurance America and the free world would survive World War II those who passed through the fires of that furnace found it necessary to hold on to family, each other and God.

graduating classes. Many of those present have suffered a lifetime of broken dreams and lived daily with a broken heart but they came and made the roll call. Their presence was sheer joy to those who remembered the helping had the smile of encouragement the restraint of laughter at a most embarrassing moment. Maybe those who have been through great tribulation still recognize the need of community, especially a caring community. Each person of each class who had a representative present not only drew from their bank account of precious memories - they also added to their account and that of others present as memories of a yesteryear were recalled. A bank account that was established as they met someone's need in troubled times.

I was concerned by the absence of anyone in so many classes as I listened to the roll call of classes. I believe this was a issue that needed to be addressed. Gorman means much to me and the people mean even more. It am however far enough removed from the school to address the need without anyone believing I have any ill will lin stating what I believe many of those who were not represnted need to know.

From 1925 through 1968 (44 years) there were representatives from all but 7 classes. In those years, 37 classes had members present. From 1969 through 1995 (27 years) on 4 classes had members present. Their absence was noticeable and because there were so many classes not represented it was a concern to me.

I believe there is a connection between the troubled times that brought a generation of people to a place of dependence on each other and still instills a sense of joy in the companionship that was a transport over troubled waters. There is still a tremendous appreciation for those who helped bear the weight of struggle.

Has the current generation been cheated out of an appreciation of corporate struggle. Has economic prosperity made this generation feel secure in their own strength. I would rather believe it is the degeneration of the stability established by values that have for much to long been under attack. This is not an attack on those who graduated in the latter years because I know none of you but I believe there is a rational explanation why such a vast number of classes were not repre-

It is my opinion that in those years which were free of the agony of a depression and a world war people developed a smug complacency about the need for the support of others. The self assurance of those who do not face, or have not faced, the agony of standing by a neighbor when the message is delivered "The War Department is sorry to inform you...." may be the reason why fellowship of peers is not a priority. May it please the Lord of Glory to find some other way the next time to cause people to realize I am my brothers keeper.

## Resource Needs Assessment

the Upper Leon Soil and Water Con- sessment, establish local priorities and servation District (SWCD) with headquarters in Comanche, along with 3,000 other SWCD's in the nation, has been given the charge to lead the way in developing programs and initiatives to improve soil and water resources at the local level," said Norman Moore, Chairman of the SWCD.

"After years of applying top-down program management approaches in federal conservation programs, the 1996 Farm Bill establishes a locally driven process, coordinated by conservation districts, to guide the state and nations' agricultural conservation efforts. It provides tremendous opportunities for local people to become involved in assessing local resource needs, setting priorities, developing conservation policy, providing technical support, accepting program applications and approving conservation plans upon which cost-sharing will be baseds," Moore added.

According to Moore, the process deals with developing a list of priority areas and concerns for the long range Farm Bill program for Fiscal Year 1998 and beyond.

To enact the Farm Bill on the local level, the Upper Leon SWCD, in partnership witht he USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, will conduct a work group meeting with its conservation partners and interested persons or organizations on November 20th at 10:00 a.m. in the City Hall at De Leon, Texas. De Leon is centrally located in the Upper Leon SWCD which encompasses all of Eastland and Comanche counties and the western One-third of Erath county.





#### **USDA** Makes

"Emergency loans and grants are easier to obtain than ever before for fural communtieis," siad Sherie Hinton, Acting State Director for USDA Rural Development. "A new regulation change has great timing because of the current drought situtation across the state of Texas."

Originally, emergency aid thorough the Rural Utilities Service (RUS), an agency that falls under the Rural Development (Formerly Farmers Home Administration) missio area, was only available after a Presidential Declaration was declared. There no longer has to be a Presidentially-declared disaster for a community to qualify for these supplemental funds. Funds for this program are limited, and will be allocated by the RUS National Office reserves on a project-by-project basis.

RUS offers loan and grants for water and wastewater systesm that have suffered an emergency disaster within the last two years which resulted in a significant decline in quantity or quality of water. Funds can be sued to alleviate the problems created by the emergency.

To be eligible for assistance, the applicant must be a public body or a non-profit corporation serving rural areas and twons of up to 10,000 residents. Qualified applicants should submit a preapplication with a letter giving extensive details explaining the nature and date of the natural disaster, the need for emergency assistance due to a significant decline in quality or quantity of water, and how the proposed improvements will correct the problem. A comprehensive cost estimate should also be included.
