
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



The two were married in Cisco, Texas, on December 19, 1940, by Johnny Burleson. They drove there from Gorman in a 1931 Model A Ford. Modell had a beautiful new blue crepe dress that she bought in De Leon, and Elmer had a new suit.

After their marriage, they lived and worked on the James and Ora Watson homeplace in rural Comanche County, then purchased a farm near the Watsons and L.F. and Lina Miears. They raised peanuts for a cash crop and raised hogs that were shipped to the Fort Worth stock-

yards. In 1949, Elmer began working in the oil fields, moving to Eastland, Snyder, Jacksboro, Sherman, and Midland. They raised four chil-

dren, and have enjoyed many grandchildren and great-grandchildren. After retiring, the couple lived in Granbury, Texas, from 1974 to 2000, when they moved to Fort Worth, where they currently live. They



State's Agricultural Agencies Change Names, Renew Missions

Two state agricultural agencies that have served Texans for a combined 224 years are beginning 2008 with new names and renewed missions.

Texas AgriLife Research is the new name for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, which annually conducts more than \$150 million in agriculture and life sciences research in such areas as improving food and fiber production, enhancing human and animal health, and conserving water, soils, wildlife and other natural resources.

The Texas AgriLife Extension Service is the new name of Texas Cooperative Extension, which provides Texans in all 254 counties with non-biased, research-based education programs and services in agriculture and natural resources, 4-H and youth development, family and consumer sciences, and community economic development.

"We are making these changes to better communicate the life-sustaining and life-changing impacts that both AgriLife Research and AgriLife Extension deliver to the people of Texas and beyond," said Dr. Mark Hussey, Director of AgriLife Research. Both agencies remain members of the Texas A&M University System, with the same commitment to their partners, clients and mission. "But we also want to tell our story to a larger audience and a changing state population, attract new resources and build new partnerships, while strengthening our existing ones," Hussey said. "In this way, we hope to better serve the people of this great state"

The name changes are part of a re-branding initiative launching this year after two years of study and planning. These efforts were led by former vice chancellor Dr. Elsa Murano, who was named president of Texas A&M University on January 3. "The re-branding efforts are centered on one foundational message: 'Agriculture is Life!'" Hussey said. "The central idea is that life itself is the core value that our agencies seek to sustain and enhance. "People usually do not realize how much we all depend on agriculture and the life sciences. Discoveries and innovations in these fields directly impact the quality of the food we eat, the clothes we wear, the air we breathe, the water we drink, the homes we live in, and more and more, even the fuels we pump into our vehicles."

"This is more than a name change, or even a new logo design," said Dr. Ed Smith, director of AgriLife Extension. "These new brands will impact not only our marketing materials and signage, but also the way we position and prioritize our programs and work with our federal, state and county partners to serve the state of Texas. It is vitally important to tell our story and that people connect our agencies to the tremendous impacts they have on the state."

One of the drivers of the re-branding initiative was a market study that showed that the work of the research and extension agencies was not widely known across the state of Texas. "We hope to help people better understand the vital role that agriculture and life sciences still play in improving the prosperity of their lives," said Smith. "We believe that if they come to know us better, they will see that connection more clearly, even within a state population that is now 85 percent urbanized."

AgriLife Research, established in 1887, employs a team of 425 scientists on the campus of Texas A&M University and at 13 centers across the state. Research has made many innovative advances over the years, including development of the Texas 1015 onion and the TAM Mild Jalapeno pepper, which revolutionized the U.S. salsa industry.

Current major research includes the efficient use and conservation of water resources, the development of fruits and vegetables with higher levels of disease-fighting compounds, and the adaptation of crops and other agricultural products for making biofuels.

AgriLife Extension, established in 1915, provides Texans with continuing education programs and services. More than 900 professional educators team with some 90,000 volunteers to serve families, youth, communities and businesses throughout the state. Some 600,000 children annually participate in Extension 's 4-H and youth development programs.

Bamboo: Unlike hardwood, bamboo does not come from trees. It's a fast-growing grass. It can example sof sustainable floring:

grow from sprouts to harvesting in three to five years, so an acre of bamboo can provide more flooring than an acre of trees. When barnboo shoots are cut, the roots remain intact, and fresh, new sprouts grow in their place. The dense root mass of bamboo helps prevent soil erosion and provides a viable crop opportunity in hilly acres where other crops cannot

Linoleum Linoleum flooring 13 manufactured from renewable resources, such as linseed oil, resin, wood flour, flax, cork powder and pigments. Its durability makes it very suitable for hightraffic areas. Linoleum is also naturally biodegradable, and because it is naturally anti-bacterial, there are no chemical agents needed in its manufacture or maintenance. It's available in rug form, too.

Carpet: Sustainable carpets must use postconsumer' and industrial materials, biodegradable dyes and solutions and recycled

Hardwood: Sustainable hardwood floors are made from recycled wood and/or antique woods that offer a timeless weathered

Ceramic: Sustainable ceramic floors are primarily made from natural and renewable resources and are exceptionally durable.

Stone: Sustainable stone floors offer low-extraction impact on the planet and are exceptionally long

Resilient: Durable, long-lasting, sustainable resilient floors are available chlorine-free and are typically made from recycled viryls and plastics.

Rubber: Sustainable rubber floors, a popular trend lately, can be made from recycled tires and other materials.

Vinyl: Sustainable VCT vinyl tile, made primarily of limestone, is long lasting and offers a high performance rating.

Green and sustainable products are produced around the world, including a number of developing nations. Purchasing these products is not just good for the planet but can help support the people in these countries.

The FACTS About STAPH/MRSA INFECTION

Recently, doctors in Texas have been seeing an increasing number of patients with skin infections caused by Staphylococcus aureus ("Staph") bacteria that are resistant to many antibiotics (drugs that kill bacterial), also called methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus-"MRSA". What is Staph/MRSA skin infection? It can be a simple, rash, boil, or an open wound. Staph/MRSA is often misdiagnosed as spider bites. Staph bacteria are commonly found on the skin of healthy persons. The cleanest person can get a Staph/MRSA infection. Antibiotic-resistant Staph/ MRSA skin infections are found in places where there are crowds of people (schools, jails, gyms). Staph/MRSA can rub off the skin of an infected person onto the skin of another person during skin to skin contact, or, the Staph can come off of the infected skin of a person onto a shared object or surface, and get onto the skin of the next person who uses it. Examples of commonly shared objects include towels, soap, benches in hot tubs, and athletic equipment - - in other words, anything that could have touched the skin of a Staph infected person can carry the bacteria to the skin of another person. Staph/MRSA infections often begin with an injury to the skin. Symptoms of a Staph infection include redness, warmth, swelling, tenderness of the skin and boils or blisters. Sometimes it does not cause any problems; sometimes it causes minor infections, such as pimples or boils. If left untreated, it can cause serious skin infections or worse. If you think you have a skin infection, consult your doctor or healthcare provider as soon as possible. Early treatment can help prevent the infection from getting worse. Be sure to follow directions from your doctor or healthcare provider closely, even when you start to feel better. To prevent yourself or your family members from getting infected, wash your hands with soap and warm water. Keep cuts and scrapes clean with soap and water. Avoid skin contact and sharing personal items with anyone you suspect could have a Staph skin infection. Regularly clean your bathroom, kitchen and all other rooms, as well as your personal items. Wash clothes and other items that become soiled with hot water or bleach, when possible. Drying clothes in a hot dryer, rather than air-drying, also helps kill bacteria in clothes.
