



This was another Homecoming and the Wildcats Alumni really enjoyed the halftime activities and both Bands did a great job.

The first Wildcat score came following a Panther fumble on the Gorman 6 on a punt try. From there the Wildcats scored in 2 plays with Patrick Dayton getting the TD on a 3 yard run with 9:39 left. Jentsch added the 2 pointer on a run and Archer City was up 8-0.

After holding the Panthers on their next possession, the Wildcats got the ball on their own 43 and in just one big explosion Jentach raced 57 yards for the score. A pass added the 2 pointer and Archer City

Then after playing on even terms until the 2:20 mark of the first half the Wildcats got the ball on the 13 and scored in 1 play with a pass to Jentry. The kick failed and Archer City was up 22-0.

Following the intermission the Wildcats got the ball on their own 35 and went the distance in 5 plays with Dayton getting the final yard with 9:25 left in the third. The kick for point made it 29-0.

After holding the Panthers on their next possession the Wildcats took the ball on the Gorman 21 after a fumble and scored in 3 plays with Dayton going in from 8 yards out with 7:05 left in the third. The kick

failed and the score was 35-0. The Wildcats score again in the third with just 14 seconds left when Dayton raced in from 23 yards out. The kick

made it 42-0. The Wildcats got a safety for 2 points and added a field goal of 22 yards to make

the final score 47-0. The Panthers just couldn't get anything going against the very strong Wildcat defense. B. J. Ramirez led the Panthers with 27 yards on 11 tries. Tyler Johnson got 12 on 5; Justin Little had 22 on 6 and Ben Burgess got 18 on 9.





A mother walks into the bathroom where her 3 year old is sitting on the toilet. He is tapping himself on the top of the head with the palm of his right hand. The mother asks him what he is doing and he replies; "Well, I can't poop and this works with the ketchup bottle."

Constipation is a symptom of dehydration which is usually the result of drinking less water than your body uses. In these hot days we use much more water than we think. Every breath carries away moisture and sweat can evaporate faster than we notice it.

Other symptoms of dehydration are headache, irritability, back pain, faintness or light-headedness. I have seen all these in survival training when I was on active duty in the Air Force. Dehydration can also contribute to heat exhaustion, heat cramps and heat stroke. Heat stroke is life threatening because the body stops sweating and if the body temperature gets too high brain damage may start to happen.

The treatment for heat stroke, as well as heat exhaustion and heat cramps is to cool down the body and hydrate with water or Gatorade or kool-aide or lemonade..., but not beer please. Beer or any other alcoholic drink will make you more dehydrated and that is the reason for hangover symptoms. That's right. Hangovers are from dehydration.


Prevention is much more effective. Your body will tell you if you are adequately hydrated. Usually if you can pee clear urine 2 times in a short span of time, you are hydrated.... unless you've been trying to hydrate with beer, which will always make you pee clear urine. The Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation International is the leading charitable funder and advocate of type 1 (juvenile) diabetes research worldwide. The mission of JDRF is to find a cure for diabetes and its complications through the support of research.

Since its founding in 1970 by parents of children with type 1 diabetes, JDRF has awarded more than \$1.3 billion to diabetes research, including more than \$156 million in FY2008. More than 85 percent of JDRF's expenditures directly support research and research-related education. In FY2008, the Foundation funded more than 1,000 centers, grants, and fellowships in 22 countries, including nearly 40 human clinical trials.

Diabetes is a chronic, debilitating disease affecting every organ system. There are two major types of diabetes: type 1 diabetes (an autoimmune disease also known as juvenile diabetes) and type 2 diabetes (a metabolic disorder also known as adult onset diabetes).



# Eastland Co. Awarded Federal Reimbursement from the FY2009 SCAAP PROGRAM

The U.S. Department of Justice announced the award of \$2,329.00 to Eastland County, TX, to reimburse some of the costs of incarcerating undocumented criminal aliens who have committed serious crimes in the United States. The goal of this program is to enhance public safety in communities throughout the nation.


This opportunity originates from federally mandated programs that the County is providing at local cost. As many local entities are aware, the Federal Government drives local political entities to assume more responsibility for the administration and delivery of government services. Many times these services are funded with local dollars.

However, in some cases there are federal funding opportunities available, if the proper request is made. Identifying federal funding stream opportunities and then properly applying for them are not simple or easy tasks. The interaction between federal, state and local political entities is complex, and often unwieldy for most local political entities.

An aggressive program of researching and applying for little known federal programs to supplement the local tax burden was implemented by engaging Justice Benefits, Inc. (JBI) for assistance.

JBI is a public sector consulting firm located in Dallas, Texas, that specializes in locating and accessing hard-to-find federal reimbursements for local and state entities. JBI does the research, gathers and analyzes the data, and completes all necessary information to be included in the application. As a result of JBI's expertise and experience, Eastland County was able to maximize its dollar amount on this application. Eastland County was one of only 900 (out of 3,140) eligible local entities across the U.S. that successfully applied for these dollars.





## **Gorman City Commision Minutes**

October 1, 2009

The Gorman City Commission met on the above date in a Regular meeting. Those present were Mayor Robert Ervin, Commissioners Nathan Files, Joe Casey, David Stanley and Durward Webb. Also present was Gene Foster.

Joe led the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge.

Mayor Ervin called the meeting to order @5:30 p.m.

Nathan made the motion to approve the minutes of all previous meetings and Public Hearings. Joe made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

Joe made the motion to approve the bills for payment. David made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

No one was present for the Citizens In Put.

The second reading of Amendment to Ordinance # 240 was read, David made the motion to pass, approve and adopt the amendment to Ordinance #240: Amendment to prohibit the use of fireworks in the City limits. Nathan made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

The Commission was advised that the Quit Claim Deed was signed and notarized on the Dub Ramsey property. The deed now only needs to be filed at the county. The Commission also told Tacy to contact Jack and Annye Kate Wheeler and inquire on how and when they intend to conduct clean up on their portion of the property of the "Blair Building". The city will touch base with the individuals who first inquired about hauling the bricks and cleanup.

Randy Beyer was not present at the meeting. Nor anyone from Jacob & Martin Engineering.

Durward made the motion to accept the contract lease agreement with RB3, LLC, a company of Reach Broadband. This contract/lease will be good year to year. David made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

Gene Foster was present on behalf of Gorman Milling to find out what the City had decided about the speed limit on McCall Street from Kent to Ector. The Commission said that this could be changed from 30mph to 20 mph. Joe made the motion to make the change on the portion of McCall St. running through Gorman Milling Company, from Ector St. to Kent St. from 30 mph to 20 mph. Durward made a second. Motion carried 4-0. This will be an amendment to Ordinance #298. Tacy will order 4 signs from Sa-So Company.

At 6:08 p.m. Joe made the motion to go into Executive Session. David made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

At 7:30 p.m. David made the motion to go out of Executive Session and return to Regular Open Session. Joe made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

There was no action taken upon returning to Regular session. Tacy will check with the City's attorney and convey information to the Mayor before the next meeting.

There being no further business for consideration Nathan made the motion to adjourn with a second from Durward. Motion carried, time was 7:40 p.m.

Mark Simmons and I were at the Texas Association of School Administrator and the Texas Association of School Boards Conference in Houston last week. I must say that most of what I heard was negative. School districts across the state are unhappy with our legislature and the shortage of funds being experienced this year. Many districts are having rollback elections (raising taxes) and most of them are passing just to maintain existing programs and staff. What about the stimulus money you ask? It has strings attached and has to be spent the way they say you can spend it and most of it is just replacing monies they took from other areas of education. We have billions of dollars in a rainy day fund that were not touched." Why? Ask Rick Perry and the rest of his leadership in Austin! To the best of my knowledge, almost every time the value of your home goes up and the school district receives more money from you, the state reduces the amount they pay us dollar for dollar and they money they save from you paying more goes either into their rainy day fund or just back into some other program other than education. You would think they would at least keep the money in public education. It is like they are robbing our children. The only exception, a way we can increase our income without the state reducing their input, would be on our next two cents of M&O taxes if we were to ever have a rollback election. Because of a new law, we would receive the same amount from the state for those two pennies as Austin receives for theirs and that would mean about \$170,000.00 a penny versus under \$6,000.00 a penny when it is based on our property wealth. The state actually has to pay the increase to us, but it has to be approved by our voters. They would have a two cent increase, but for a local cost of under \$12,000.00 in local tax revenue.

There were 7 of us out on the 1st for games. Hurray! Enjoyed having Donna Early with us. Maybe more folks will start coming back and hopefully some new ones.


