

All Charges Dismissed-Ronnie White

In a quick turn of events on Thursdy in the 91st District Court the prosecurtors from the State Attorney General office dropped all charges against former Sheriff Ronnie White.

In the case of misdemeanor official Oppression being tried last week. White was accused of removing a fence owned by Mike McPhail in County Road 483 (Alameda County Road) without a proper order. He was also accused of threatening McPhail.

Another indictment was related tho this same incident and another was not.

Attorney Siedler of Fort Worth, a lawyer for McPhail, said he, didn't think McPhail had hindered anyone in moving his fence on Alameda Cemetery Road. He also said he had telephone conversation and a meeting with sheriff White and White stated he thought McPhail had blocked access.

Upon questioning by McLewallen, Siedler said he through the sheriff was just trying to do what he though he had to.

McPhail was called to the stand and testified that the fence was old and had to be replaced. He stated he never was approached about the cemetery groups concerned and received information about it from newspapers. McPhail said that finally Sheriff White told him he was commiting a crime and threatened to arrest him.

District Attorney Mike Siebert took the stand late Tuesday and testified that Sheriff White had asked him what should be done about he fence. He had replied that since McPhail had offered to remove the fence, the issue was moot.

On Wednesday County, Judge Scott Bailey testified that he began to learn about the fence last summer. He said he signed a Commissioners Court order Sept.11th" to seek removal of the fence" Bailey said hte order did not give anyone authority to take the fence down. Owens, abstained, Bailey said the action from that meeting was not valid because a majority did not vot ena dhte presiding judge commioned L.T. Owens did not sign the order.

Pet. 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman. he stated that Sept. 25th he made a motion to have the fence down by 5 p.m. the next day, and understood the motion passed. He said he made the motion to remove the fence because the Commissioners Court has a right ro remove a fence blocking access on a county road.

During some of the testimony Judge Burdock chided spectators for showing emotions. He reminded them they they were n a Court of Law, not a pep rally. He also had some choice words to the jurios about not reading newspawas being tried.

Thursday began with testimony by Pct. 2 Commissioner Calvin Aimsworth who started by answering questions from Attorney Lewallen. He was questioned about the cemetery road, which he had been maintaining. The Commissioners gave the normal width of such a road as around 46 1/2 ft. He said when McPhail mowed the fence he took in from 2 to 12 ft. of this roadway in places. He stated there was not room between the fence and a horn to make a good ditch. He said the fence went uphill and the farther it went, the father into the right-of-way it got. A post was almost to the bottom of a bar ditch. Aimsworth said he voted for the Sheriff to remove the fence but thought we were doing something wrong.

About this time the jury was asked to leave the noon and lawyers had some exchanges.

Aimsworth resumed testifying with the jury absent. But when the Commisioner said he pulled up one of the fence posts himself, defense attorney Lewallen rose to his fee. he said "Why is the Sheriff being charged and not these people (Pittman and Aimsworth)" he asked Judge Burdock. "This man (Aimsworth) pulled the postup !!!

Burdock warned Aimsworth that

Lewallen said that two suits, would be filed soon - for the payment of White's defense fees, and also for a determination of the out of McPhails fence, and who might owe for it.

Judge Burdock called in the jury and then annouced that he granted the State's motiuon to dismiss this case! He then turned to white and said "I wish you the best of luck; whatever vou undertake."

After court was dismissed Gary Lewallen stated "I'm really thankful this is over for Ronnie White and his family. I was defending an innocent man."

Others, private citizens and some pers or watching T.V. while the case officials had less charitable comments on the trial. "The whole thing was stupid". A number said, "The Sheriff was just trying to do his job." "What a wase of tax payers money," others commented.

> According to Robert's Rules of Order the motion passed on Sept. 25th was offical. This motion was directed to Sheriff White to remove the fence by 5 p.m Tuesday Sept. 26th Soem stated that the motion failed. This is not correct according to 21st Century Roberts Rules of order. Ourdinary to the rules, the vote, was 2-0 for passing the motion.

> The Gorman Progress also thinks that this case was a big waste of tax payers money. First the Commissioners Court should not have put Sheriff White in this position and then backed down. Secondly, the Grand jury should not have accepted such a peny case. And thirdly the Attorney General's office should be chastized for their acitons in bringing this case to the Grandjury Maybe we should all write to Attorney General Morales and express our views on such a sorry waste of taxpayers money in every trying this case.

Ranger Banker To Celebrate 50th year



On Tuesday, July 2 Tom Dunn, Prsident of People's State Bank of Ranger, will have completed 50 years in banking, the employees of the bank have scheduled a two-day celebrationin recognition of this achievement. Tuesday, July 2, a reception will be held where his friends in the banking community will have an opportunity to drop in and share this moment with him. On Wednesday, July 3, a comeand-go open house will be from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. where the bank's customer will have an opportunity to participate in the celebration. Refreshments will be served throughout the day.

In the spring of 1946, when Tom dunn graduated from Huckaby High School, it wasn't easy for a young man fresh off the farm to find a job that didn't involve farming in one way or another. "At that time I had no idea the direction my life was going to take. I knew how to work. I had been working, it seemed, most of my life so I went looking for a job," he said in response to a question regarding the beginning of his career as a banker. By Gorman Masonic Lodge #716 A.F. July he was working for a road crew "tamping bridges". This involved using a hand tool to pack the dirt along the edges of the road leading onto a newly constructed bridge, One day he

was tamping bridges, the next day he was in the bookkeeping department of the First National Bank of Stephenville, and the rest, as they say, is history.

of the Stephenville bank, went to visit the superientendent of Huckaby High School in search of a bright young man who was good at math. The superintendent recommended Tom Dunn and Mr McCleskey went to his home and invited him to come to work at the bank. Tom accepted and worked there for the next eleven years. He worked his way up to Loan Teller there when W.G. Kirk, President of the Farmer's National Bank of Gorman hired him as Vice President and Loan Officer.

He worked in the Gorman bank for four years and when Mr. Kirk bought the Citizen's National Bank in Brownwood, moved there with him as Vice President, Loan Officer and Personnel Director.

When Mr. Kirk sold the Brownwood bank to B.C. Drinkard and bought another one in Grand Prairie, Tom made the decision to stay on with the Citizen's National Bank where he worked for a total of eleven years.

In 1971 Tom Wilson, Chairman of the board of Ranger's First State Bank, called Tom and invited him to move to Ranger as president of the bank and he accepted. The Board of Directors at

that time consisted of Tom Wilson, Chairman, Glen Gilliam, President, J.P. McCraken, James Ratliff and Morris Newnham.

This is a year of half-century marker Fred McCleskey, a vice president for Tom. Earlier this spring, he went back to celebrate the 50th anniversary of his graduating class at Huckaby High school, on July 2, he will celebrate his 50th year as a banker, and when he retires the last of December, he and Sammie will have celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary.

> Tom and Sammie Pack, also a Huckaby High School product, were marred on December 28, 1946. They have four children: Diane Blair, the Principal of 900 student junior high school in Denton. Her husband Tom is the head baseball coach at Denton High School. Alicia Whitfield lives in Austin and works for an advertising agency Brenda Anderson and her family li in Weatherford. Her husband Rex is pilot for Delta Airlines. Tommy teaches school and coaches football in Stephenville. He is married to Vicki Gibson, who is also a teacher.

Tom the youngest of ten children born to a share-crop farmer, summed up his 50 years as a banker: "My daddy always said to get a good job and stay with it. That nobody ever amounted to anything bouncing around from job to job." I guess, I have just been following my daddy's advice."
