Panthers Defeat Cougars; Travel To Bosqueville Friday

The Panthers got off to a slow start on Friday night when they hosted Christoval and only managed a 13-6 half-time score. But they snapped out of it and scored 20 points in the final half while holding the Cougars scoreless for a 33-6 victory.

Gorman's first score came with 4:10 left in the initial quarter when they took the ball on the 39 and scored in 5 plays with Ben Burgess hitting A. J. Vaughn on a beautiful 40 yard pass for the TD. The kick for points failed and Gorman was up 6-0. The drive featured 2 runs of 1 and 1 by Little and a nice 18 yard run by Ramirez.

Then after recovering a fumble punt try on the Gorman 10 the Cougars scored in 4 plays with Chipman getting the final yard on a run with 10:45 left in the second period. The kick for point failed and the score was knotted at 6-6.

After the Big Red defense held the Cougars on the Gorman 35 the Panthers scored in 7 plays with Tyler Johnson getting the final 3 yards on a run with 5:13 left in the half. B. J. Ramirez booted the extra point and Gorman led 13-6. The drive featured a 5 yard run by Johnson, a 2 yarder by Ramirez, a beautiful 20 yard scamper by Ben Burgess and 3 runs of 14, 13, and 7 by Justin Little.

The halftime Homecoming activities were enjoyed by a very nice crowd. The homecoming pics will be in next weeks paper.

The Panthers came back on their second possession following the half and got the ball on their own 29 and in one big blast up the middle. B. J. Ramirez raced through the Coug defense and went 71 yards for the score with 4:25 left in the third. The kick failed and the score rose to 19-6.

Then after Josh Ryan intercepted a Cougar pass the Panthers got the ball on their own 38 and scored in 9 plays with Tyler Johnson getting the honors from 11 yards out on a fine run with 9:45 left in 4th. Ramirez booted the point after and Gorman led 26-6. The drive featured runs of 14, 3, 4, and 6 by Little; a 10 yard pass to A. J. Vaughn, a 6 yard by Burgess and a 7 yarder by Johnson.

The Panthers added another score with 8:20 left in the game when the Big Red Defense got an interception by Burgess on the Gorman 49 and scored in 4 plays with Johnson getting the score on a 10 yard scamper. Ramirez kicked the point after and the final score was 33-6. The drive featured runs of 19 by Burgess and 13 by Little.

Gorman was led by Ramirez with 160 yards on 7 carries. Justin Little had 93 on 18 tries. Ben Burgess got 44 on 6 and Tyler Johnson ran for 68 on 13 tries.

The Panthers will travel to Bosqueville Friday night for a 7:30 game. Bosqueville

is expected to field a very good team and the Big Red will really have to put forth another good effort for a victory. So follow the Panthers to Bosqueville and back them to another victory.

City Minutes

SEPTEMBER 17, 2009

The Gorman City Commission met on the above date. Those present were Mayor Robert Ervin, Commissioners Nathan Files, Joe Casey and David Stanley. Others present were Glenn Scitern and Durward Webb.

Nathan led the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge.

Mayor Ervin called the meeting to order @ 5:31 p.m. Joe made the motion to approve the minutes of the previous meeting. Nathan made a second. Motion carried 3-0.

Nathan made the motion to approve the bills for payment. David made a second. Motion carried 3-0.

The Commission had discussion on filling the vacancy of Charlie Torrez's position.

With the final reading of Ordinance #335C, Keeping of Livestock and Pet Animals, Joe made the motion to pass, approve and adopt this ordinance. David made a second. Motion carried 3-0. The Commission wants different portions of this ordinance ran in the paper, so that residents will have knowledge of what is allowed and what is not.

The first reading of the amendment to Ordinance #240, Prohibiting the use of fireworks in the City limits, was read at this time.

There was no action taken on the Blair Property at this meeting.

Nathan made the motion to appoint as point of contact for the NIMS Compliance the Chief of Police, Patrol Officer, Fire Chief and Asst. Fire Chief. Joe made a second. Motion carried 3-0.

Randy Beyer was not able to be present. He will reschedule and plan to be at the next meeting.

Mr. Beyer is with Jacob and Martin Engineering. We are working to get a grant to replace water lines.

Gorman Milling Company had requested changing the speed limit on McCall Street and Houston Street from the 30mph, to 10mph. These streets are very busy with the customer loading, employees crossing back and forth, and trucks weighing and loading. This request was tabled at this time to check on Ordinances supporting speed limits in the City. This will be put on the next agenda.

Cable Tower Lease was not discussed. Kerry Stratton was apparently unable to attend this meeting. The tower lease will be put on the agenda for the next meeting.

The Commission discussed with Glenn the need to figure out a schedule for using the chipper. It will be advertised in advance what day and which area will be served each time the chipper is taken out.

There being no further business for discussion, David made the motion to adjourn with a second from Joe. Motion carried 3-0, time was 6:25 p.m.

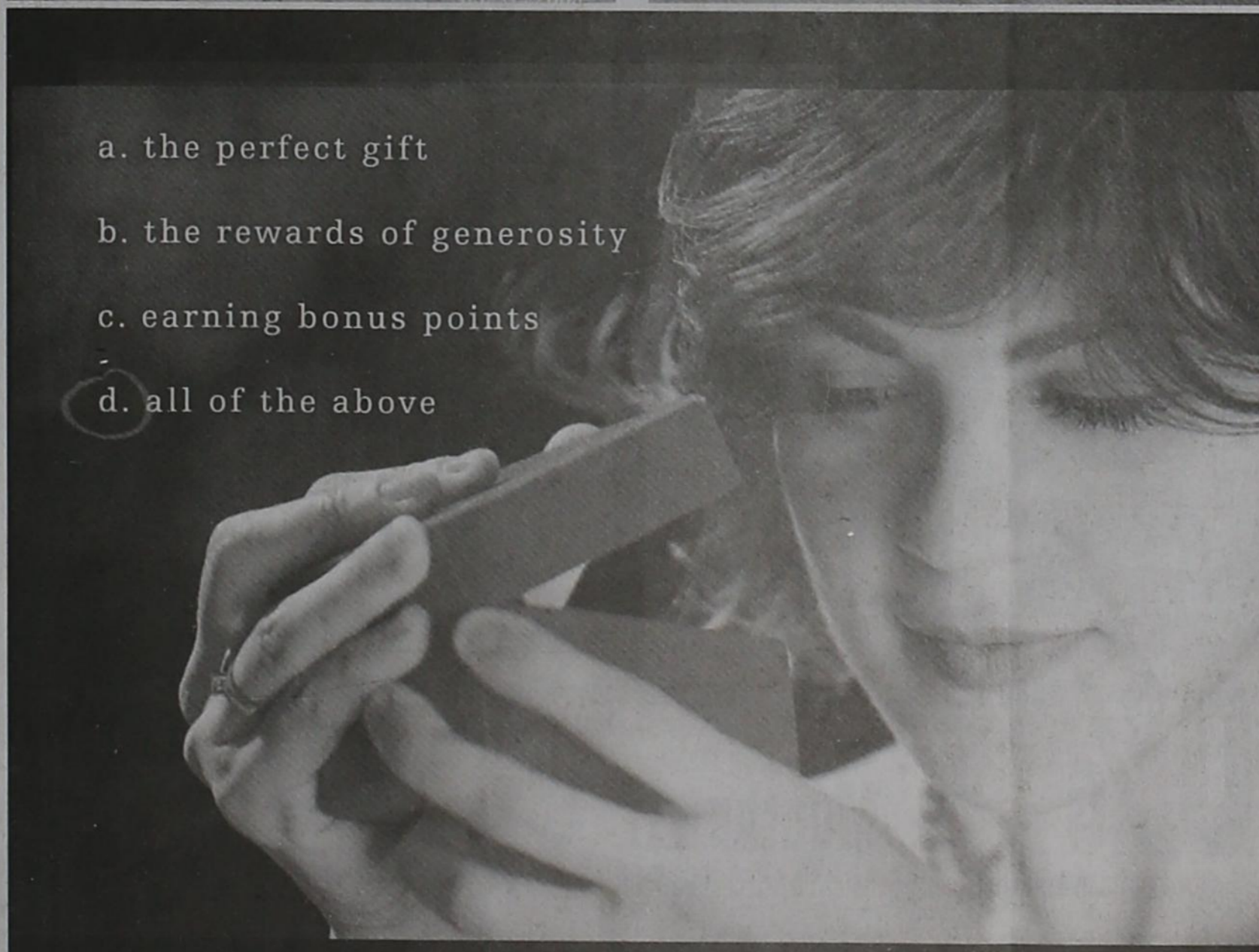

Farm Service Agency Clarifies Livestock Eligibility Program Requirements - Emphasis on Insurance Requirements

(College Station) -- Sept. 18, 2009 -- Juan M. Garcia, Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Texas, announced earlier this week that Texas FSA offices statewide are now accepting applications for benefits under the provisions of the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP) and the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) as outlined in the 2008 Farm Bill. For both programs, producers must have suffered losses that occurred on or after January 1, 2008, and before October 1, 2011.

In order for an LFP or ELAP applicant to qualify for program benefits, the applicant must have purchased insurance coverage through FSA's Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) or the Pasture, Rangeland and Forage Insurance (PRF-RI) program offered through the Risk Management Agency (RMA).

FSA offered producers the opportunity to "buy-in" eligibility for 2008 program benefits for LFP subject to a September 16, 2008 deadline. Deadlines for buy-in for 2008 ELAP benefits were September 16, 2008 and May 18, 2009; and purchase of 2009 crop year NAP coverage for native and improved pasture for grazing had to be completed by December 1, 2008.

"Since the passage of the 2008 Farm Bill in June of 2008, the Agency publicized program 'buy-in' and NAP coverage deadlines and offered deadline extensions in order to insure all producers had ample opportunity to meet program eligibility requirements," said Garcia.

Producers who meet the requirements of a socially disadvantaged, limited resource, or beginning farmers or ranchers, as defined in the Food, Agriculture, Conservation, and Trade Act of 1990, Section 2501 (e) (7 U.S.C. 2279(e)), do not have to meet this Risk Management Purchase Requirement (RMPR) and, therefore, are not required to have paid the buy-in fee.

Garcia stressed that FSA will consider granting equitable relief to producers who did not meet RMPR provisions; rendering them ineligible for livestock disaster program benefits.

"For certain extenuating circumstances, FSA has the authority to grant equitable relief to producers who made a good faith effort to comply with RMPR provisions," said Garcia "All requests for equitable relief will be considered on a case-by-case basis but producers must understand that relief is not guaranteed."

LFP provides payments to eligible livestock producers that have suffered livestock grazing losses due to qualifying drought or fire. Fire losses apply only to federally managed rangeland. Eligible livestock under LFP include beef cattle, alpacas, buffalo, beefalo, dairy cattle, deer, elk, emus, equine, goats, llamas, poultry, reindeer, sheep and swine. For losses due to drought, qualifying drought ratings are determined using the U.S. Drought Monitor located at <http://www.drought.unl.edu/dm/monitor.html>.

ELAP provides emergency assistance to eligible producers of livestock, honeybees and farm-raised fish that have losses due to disease, adverse weather or other conditions, including losses due to blizzards and wildfires. ELAP assistance is for losses not covered under other Supplemental Agricultural Disaster Assistance programs established by the 2008 Farm Bill, specifically LFP, the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) and the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program (SURE).

LFP and ELAP program applicants should note that in addition to risk management provisions, certain payment limitation and adjusted gross income eligibility requirements must be met in order to qualify for livestock disaster program benefits.
