San Antonio – Justin Little of Gorman successfully haltered a calf during the calf scramble February 10th at the San Antonio Livestock Show & Rodeo.


Little is 15 years old and participates in Gorman FFA. He plans to use his award money from the calf scramble to purchase a pig.

In The last two weeks we have received 40 dog calls, they range from dogs running at large to Dog Bites. This is a very serious situation. We have kids and people that would like to take a nice walk around our City but are unable to do so because of all the dogs that are running loose.

The Police Department will be issuing citations for dogs that are not in a pen or chained up. We have a City Ordinance #335, Animal Ordinance. It advises the citizens that each animal is to have its rabies shot and have City tags. Any animal not confined to premises of owner by a substantial fence of sufficient strength and height to prevent the animal from escaping there from, or secured on the primises by a chain or leash sufficient in strength to prevent the animal from escaping from the premises and so arranged that the animal will remain upon the premises when the leash is stretched to full length. An animal intruding upon the property of another person other than the owner's shall be at large. This is to insure that our City is safe for our Citizens to enjoy. The impound fee and daily fees for the dog to be in the pound will be in another article. These fees will be discussed at the next City Council Meeting. If you need a copy of this Ordinance it is available to City Hall.







Foreign high school students are scheduled to arrive soon for academic semester homestay programs, and the sponsoring organization needs a few more local host families. The students are anxiously awaiting news of their new families. These young ambassadors are looking forward to fulfilling their life-long dreams.

According to Pacific Intercultural Exchange (P.I.E.) President, John Doty, the students are all between the ages of 15 and 18 years, are English-speaking, have their own spending money, carry accident and health insurance, and are anxious to share their cultural experiences with their new American families. P.I.E. currently has programs to match almost every family's needs, ranging in length from a semester to a full academic year, where the students attend local high

P.I.E. area representatives match students with host families by finding common interests and lifestyles through an informal in-home meeting. Prospective host families are able to review student applications and select the perfect match. As there are no "typical" host families, P.I.E. can fit a student into just about any situation, whether it is a single parent, a childless couple, a retired couple or a large

Families who host for P.I.E. are also eligible to claim a \$50.00 per month charitable contribution deduction on their itemized tax returns for each month they host a sponsored student.

For the upcoming programs, P.I.E. has students from Germany, the Former Soviet Union, Venezuela, Argentina, Brazil, Japan, Hungary, Korea, Mexico, Australia, Yugoslavia, China, and many other countries. P.I.E. is also participating in two special government-funded programs to bring scholarship students from the Newly Independent States of the former Soviet Union as well as predominantly Islamic countries such as Yemen, Syria, Jordan, Morocco, Kuwait, Iraq and Qatar to the United States. P.I.E. is a non-profit educational organization that has sponsored more than 25,000 students from 45 countries since its founding in 1975. The organization is designated by the United States Department of State and is listed by the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel (CSIET), certifying that the organization complies with the standards set forth in CSIET's Standards for International Educational Travel Programs.

Doty encourages families to contact the program immediately, as it will allow the proper time for the students and hosts to get to know one another before

they actually meet for the first time. Eastland County area families interested in learning more about student exchange or arranging for a meeting with a community representative may call P.I.E., toll-free, at 1-866-546-1402. The agency also has travel/study program opportunities available for American high school students as well as possibilities for community volunteers to assist and work with area host families, students and schools.


