# College Football In Week's Spotlight

NEW YORK, Sept. 17 (AP)—College football moves closer to the front and center of the nation's sports stage this weekend. Topped by such encounters as Indiana-Michigan, Southern California-UCLA, Kentucky-Mississippi and Duke-South Carolina, ordinarily late October or November clashes, more than 50 games are scheduled for Friday night and Saturday afternoon.

# TRIALS TO BEGIN

NUERNBERG, Sept. 17 (AP)—Supreme Court Justice Robert H. Jackson, chief U. S. war crimes prosecutor, says the United States expects to be ready to begin trials of Nazi war leaders by Nov. 1 and may proceed on its own if the other Allied nations are not prepared to go ahead at that time.

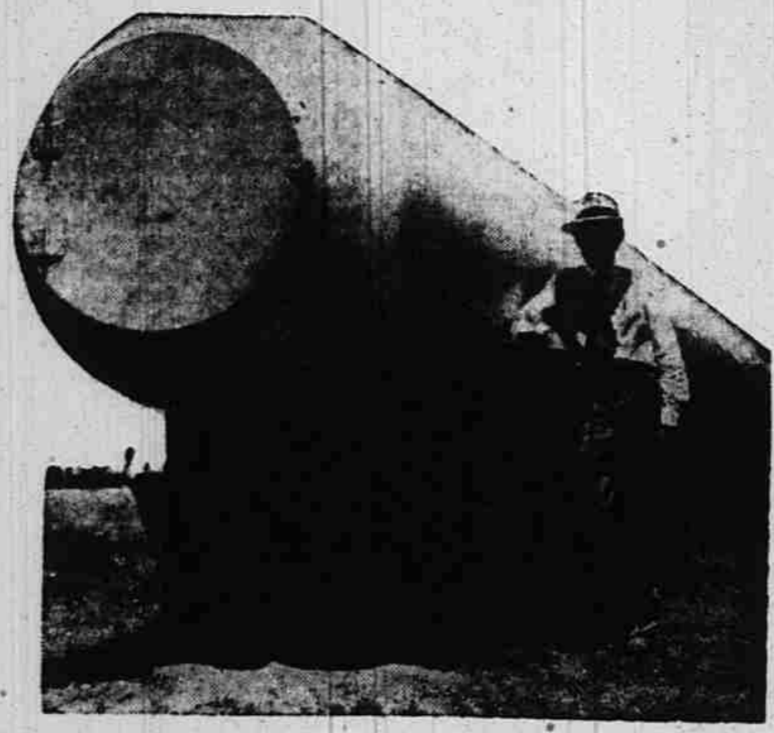

The bodies will be of new improved, rust resistant steel, and there will be a heavier chrome finish. New interior trim will be featured, and the instrument panel will be redesigned.

Mechanical changes will include improved vacuum metering, carburetor, new wheel rims, longer-life muffler and tail pipe and improved cooling.

## Suit Too Good For Work Good For Thief

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17 (AP) Editor Wayne Richardson started for his office dressed in a suit of which he was particularly fond. It was much too good, he decided, for everyday office wear. So he stopped at a clothing store, bought a new suit and had the clerk put the one he had been wearing in a box.

Next he stopped at a restaurant. Now there's no question of wearing his favorite suit to the office. While he was eating, someone took the box.

The two brothers are interested in seeing that everyone gets the proper mileage from his tires and suggest that they be allowed to check over those rundown tires. A one day service is available in recapping if the cars are brought in early in the morning.

Much of the company's time is spent recapping and they now have better rubber than has ever been available since the beginning of the war.

Tires and batteries still are short in stock so the owners ask that everyone conserve old ones until new ones are ready for the public.

# Butane Due For Great Extension

Butane—the gas without pipelines—is due great development in the immediate future, in the opinion of butane dealers of the state.

Not the least of these is Bill Fraley, head of Fraley & Co. and also president of the state butane dealers' association. By reason of his long experience and his close connection with the situation in general, Fraley foresees a new era for farm homes.

The trend was unmistakable when war came to freeze the number of butane users due to restrictions on materials for tanks. Now that these restrictions have been lifted, storage tanks soon will become available.

Farm housewives, having seen their neighbors cook with gas and not having to be bothered with filling the kerosene tank or guess at when to put in a few chunks of wood, are going to demand this modern service.

Nor will butane be restricted to use for cooking purposes, for it will be pressed into service for general heating purposes during the winter time. With butane, the fires may be started in the morning just as quickly as it takes to strike a match. There will be no need of shaking the grate, scooping out ashes and muttering about clinkers or a contrary damper.

Moreover, a simple twist of the wrist will bring hot water for the morning toilet. Even though the farm home might be removed from power lines, it will be possible to have refrigeration just as easily as automatic hot water, thanks to butane.

**The Nation Today— Tremendous Volume Of Mail Shows Women Prefer Rationing Of Meat**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP) — The government probably will decide this week whether to end meat rationing by October 1 or continue it a while longer.

Meanwhile, OPA is receiving what officials describe as a "tremendous volume" of mail from people all over the country.

Most of the letters are from housewives. In general, OPA says, they want rationing continued.

Many fear they will have difficulty obtaining meat if controls are lifted. A number express this sentiment: Let's continue rationing so we can send some meat to hungry people in liberated countries.

According to OPA, most letters advocating an immediate end to rationing come from people in the meat business. They are convinced supply warrants such a move. They say they want to get rid of the red tape of rationing.

Here are samples of what the country is telling OPA:

From a grocer at Parkersburg, W. Va.: I firmly believe that rationing could be eliminated. x x x I have outlived its usefulness. x x x I have been informed by the meat suppliers that we shall immediately receive more meat, with the exception of pork.

A food merchant at Heron Lake, Minn., says: Our farmers really will be irate x x x if meat and butter rationing continue. x x x My suggestion would be to get rid of meat rationing at once.

And from Pittsburgh: This winter there are undoubtedly going to be hundreds of thousands of people in Europe and Asia perilously close to death by starvation. x x x That being the case, why are we contemplating removing most meat from rationing. x x x I can keep my belt as tight or tighter than it has been, until the war torn people get back on their feet.

And this letter without a return address or legible postmark: I haven't bought a steak since rationing started, but I'd be willing to do without them for two more years if I thought the children in France and Italy had a better diet.
