#### G.E.D. Study Classes To Resume Jan. 11

January is typically the month to begin good habits and make resolutions. If you are 18 years of age or older and need study classes or information about taking the G.E.D. Test, now is the time! Take advantage of this FREE service in Eastland County sponsored by Texas AgriLife Extension Service and Abilene I.S.D. Adult Education.

Eastland County G.E. D. Study Classes will resume January 10, 2011. Trained G.E.D. volunteer tutors will be on site at each study class to help students prepare to take the G.E.D. test. Each student is required to go through placement testing the first two weeks of class to identify specific areas of intensified instruction. It is critical that students attend the first two weeks of class. Study Guides and computer software will be available to students. Eastland G.E.D. Study Classes will be held at 504 South Madera Street in Eastland and classes start at 5:00 and are held every Monday and Tuesday night with Mike and Debbie Parsons along with Larry and Judy Smith will be the instructors. The Open Door Center located at 27 East Hwy 80 in Cisco study

classes start at 3:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. and are held every Monday and Tuesday night with volunteer tutors. The Spring '11 Study Session begins in January and usu-

ally ends in April. A Spring Graduation will be held in June to celebrate all G.E.D. graduates throughout Eastland County.

"More than 7,000 locally elected school board members serve a crucial role in our communities and schools. These dedicated men and women strive to maintain the health of every district and serve as strong advocates for our kids. In a time of financial uncertainty, they are willing to step forward to face the critical challenges facing our public schools," said James B. Crow, TASB executive

"We hope every community will say thanks to these board members for their commitment and offer support as they voluntarily tackle the important task of governing school districts. Local trustees tirelessly work with parents and educators to develop sound education policies and set high standards for student success. We applaud them for shouldering enormous responsibilities and making the time to share their vision and voice about the future of Texas schoolchildren," Crow said.

#### AGRICULTURAL VIEWPOINT

Looking Ahead - 2011 Pecan Management

Most of your hands are still cracked and sore from shelling pecans in the early winter months, and you probably do not want to even see a pecan tree until it warms up in March and April. I feel that it is never too early to start thinking about managing pecan trees for the 2011 harvest. So in this article I wanted to hit some critical needs for the pecan crop to be successful this year.

The first issue that comes to mind when I think about pecan trees is fertilization. This is very important for young trees. Nitrogen is necessary for rapid tree growth and is the only soil-applied nutrient that most pecan trees ever need. It is important to apply nitrogen in frequent small amounts during the first few years. Spread fertilizer on the soil surface, under the tree, but well away from the trunk. Nitrogen fertilizers are very soluble and are readily moved into the soil by watering. It is inefficient and unnecessary to make holes around the tree to pour the fertilized into the ground. Ammonium sulfate (21-0-0) and ammonium nitrate (33-0-0) are common, economical nitrogen fertilizers that can be used.

For mature trees apply 1 pound of 21-0-0 or 33-0-0 for each inch of trunk diameter in late March before bud break. If the tree produces a very heavy nut set in May, make a second application in late May or early June. Apply the fertilizer broadcast on the surface starting 3 to 5 feet from the trunk and extending out a few feet past the tree canopy. Water the fertilizer into the soil promptly. Avoid scattering fertilizer on sidewalks or paved driveways because some materials can cause unsightly, although seldom, permanent

Frequent zinc sprays are essential for rapid tree growth. Trees deficient in zinc usually have small, weak leaves, highly branched (rosetted) twigs at shoot tips and, in severe cases, dieback of twigs and branches. During the first seven (7) years, trees grow best if foliar sprays of zinc are applied at least every 2 weeks throughout the growing season of April through early August. If the trees are not growing, reduce the spray frequency. Spray mature trees with zinc at least three (3) times between bud break in late March or early April and early June. Zinc is needed primarily by young expanding leaflets. Leaflet expansion on mature trees usually stops by mid-June. Two (2) of several choices of zinc materials to spray with are:

Zinc Nitrate is formulated as a liquid. Use 2 to 4 teaspoons per gallon or 1 to 2 quarts per 100 gallons of water.

Zinc sulfate is formulated as a powder. Use 2 teaspoons per gallon or 2 pounds per 100 gallons of water. UAN liquid fertilizer (32-0-0) can be added at a rate of 1 quart per 100 gallons of the zinc sulfate solution to improve penetration of zinc into the foliage. Zinc sulfate spray can cause leaf burn on other trees in the home landscape, especially peaches, plums and other stone fruits. Zinc sprays are most effective if applied early or late in the day with little or no wind. The higher humidity under these conditions allows longer wetting and more zinc absorption. Zinc sprays pose a minimal hazard to man and animals, yet care should be taken not to contact the spray directly. Zinc sprays are not likely to stain sidewalks, houses, cars, etc.
