Skyler Henderson has recently graduated from The North Texas Buckskin Brigade which was held on the Stasney's Cook Ranch outside of Albany, Texas on July 18-22. The Texas Brigades Camps is a wildlife education and leadership development program. Each camp is 5 days long and teaches life skills, public speaking, wildlife management, and leadership skills. There are 7 different Texas Brigade camps, 2 Bobwhite Brigades, 2 Buckskin Brigades, 2 Feathered Forces, and a Bass Brigade. The Texas Brigades is a non profit organization who depends on volunteers from various government agencies and businesses. To attend the camp you must be 13-17 and interested in wildlife management. After submitting an application it goes through a process; and only a chosen few students are accepted to attend the camp. Along with anatomy and botany you will learn population dynamics, habitat management, biology and a whole lot more. There are also lessons



USDA Announces Conservation **Reserve Program General Sign-up**

WASHINGTON, D.C. - July 26, 2010 - Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced that a general sign-up for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) will begin on August 2, 2010 and continue through August 27, 2010. During the sign-up period, farmers and ranchers may offer eligible land for CRP's competitive general sign-up at their county Farm Service Agency (FSA) office. The 2008 Farm Bill authorized USDA to maintain CRP enrollment up to 32 million acres. Jim Miller, Agriculture Under Secretary for Farm and Foreign Agriculture Services, made the announcement on behalf of Secretary Vilsack during a conference call with reporters.

"America's farmers and ranchers play an important role in improving our environment, and for nearly 25 years, CRP has helped this nation build sound conservation practices that preserve the soil, clean our water, and restore habitat for wildlife," said Miller. "Today's announcement will help us create a greener and healthier America, and I encourage all interested farmers and ranchers to contact their local FSA office to learn more how to take advantage of this opportunity."


To help ensure that interested farmers and ranchers are aware of the sign-up period, USDA has signed partnership agreements with several conservation and wildlife organizations, which will play an active role in USDA's 2010 CRP outreach efforts. Additionally, Secretary Vilsack has recorded two public service announcements, which are available to the press and public at www. fsa.usda.gov/psa.

CRP is a voluntary program that assists farmers, ranchers and other agricultural producers to use their environmentally sensitive land for conservation benefits. Producers enrolling in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving covers in exchange for rental payments, cost-share, and technical assistance. CRP protects millions of acres of America's topsoil from erosion and is designed to improve the nation's natural resources base. Participants voluntarily remove environmentally sensitive land from agricultural production by entering into long-term contracts for 10 to 15 years. In exchange, participants receive annual rental payments and a payment of up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing conservation practices.

By reducing water runoff and sedimentation, CRP also protects groundwater and helps improve the condition of lakes, rivers, ponds and streams. Acreage enrolled in the CRP is planted to resource-conserving vegetative covers, making the program a major contributor to wildlife population increases in many parts of the country. As a result, CRP has provided significant opportunities for hunting and fishing on private lands.

Land currently not enrolled in CRP may be offered in this sign-up provided all eligibility requirements are met. Additionally, current CRP participants with contracts expiring this fall covering about 4.5 million acres may make new contract offers. Contracts awarded under this sign-up are scheduled to become

The EBI consists of five environmental factors (wildlife, water, soil, air and enduring benefits) and cost. Decisions on the EBI cutoff will be made after the sign-up ends and after analyzing the EBI data of all the offers. Those who would have met previous sign-up EBI thresholds are not guaranteed a contract under this sign-up. In addition to the general sign-up, CRP's continuous sign-up program will be ongoing. 

Pecan Scab

There is a country music song out right now that goes "rain makes corn". Well, the other thing lots of rain can make is pecan scab. County wide rain has fallen in large amounts. High temperatures and humidity increase the chances of a scab outbreak.

Symptoms of scab can be found on the leaves, stems and shucks. Foliage systems will occur on the lower leaflet surface between and along the veins. The spots are initially olive green and will turn dark brown as they age. Infections may become severe along the midrib of the leaf and the leaf tip will begin to die, curl and turn a chocolate brown. With high humidity and frequent rain events the disease can spread throughout the trees. This disease can also infect stem growth. This will result in elongated twig cankers and are usually a secondary infection. If the infection is severe it can kill growth beyond the infection.

Shucks are susceptible from the time they form until a few weeks before harvest. Early infection is visible as small, dark-brown to black lesions on the shucks. These lesions will continue to develop on the shuck and become depressed and the center of the lesion will begin to form a crusty appearance. As the scab spreads over the shuck it will affect the movement of nutrients through the nut. If shucks are infected in May or early June we will usually see premature drop. Pecans that are infected with scab this time of year will result in poorly filled pecans and/or create shucks that will not open properly.

Controlling pecan scab is very important on susceptible varieties. Plant spacing becomes critical for air movement. Trees that are spaced close together will not have the air movement slowing water evaporation from the leaf surface and creates an environment for the disease that makes it difficult to control. Thinning trees and improving air circulation is a critical part of disease management. Keeping orchards clean is another step in disease management. Scab can survive over winter on old leaves, shucks and stems.

The third step in scab disease control is to provide a fungicide protectant. If you have varieties that are susceptible to scab you should already have protectant on your trees and/or planning to spray before the next showers move in. Both protectant and systemic fungicides should be applied at intervals short enough to insure that foliage has fungicide protection when environmental conditions favor infection.

Steady Steps to Prevent Seniors' Slips and Falls

(NU) - Slips and falls are a common cause of injury in the United States, and the risk increases with age. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), falls are the most common cause of injury deaths, nonfatal injuries and hospital admissions for trauma in seniors. But slips and falls are not inevitable - most can be prevented. Many falls occur in nursing homes and hospitals. In fact, slips and falls are the leading cause of injury in long-term care facilities. If your loved one is in an assisted living facility or nursing home, ask the management about its fall-prevention plan - it should have one. You can also evaluate the facility when you visit. Here are some things to look out for:Slippery floors. All floors should be level and offer noticeable traction, as canes and walkers require high slip-resistance. Make sure that there are no loose tiles or thick carpets that could cause seniors to trip. And ask how the floors are cleaned - soap scum can make floors even more slippery. On the other hand, some manufacturers are producing floor cleaners that increase traction. For example, Traction-Pak from Pak-It (www.pakit.com) is an anti-slip floor treatment that bonds with the floor to form an anti-slip surface, even while wet. This is important, as liquid spills cause many falls.




