War critics say the President, in warning of a new wave of isolationism, is setting up straw men to knock off in a campaign to win approval for the anti-missile rocket defense system and present Vietnam war policies. They deny there is a single isolationist in the Senate.

Some claim that what is sweeping the country is not a new wave of isolationism but a demand that the nation's priorities be changed from massive investment in Vietnam, with a loss of American lives, to massive investment in the United States, and a consequent saving of lives.

Considering the fact that about half the membership of the Senate is concerned over the ABM controversy, and also the present, continuing war in Vietnam, and also the fact that a majority of both houses is Democratic, Mr. Nixon has risked ending a period of tolerance or waiting which has thus far protected him from bitter, personal attacks.

It remains to be seen whether Nixon's Air Force Academy speech was the beginning of a bolder, tougher line from the President, in behalf of foreign and defense proposals. If it is, coming months will become more stormy and controversial and in the immediate future, at least, the President will probably lose more than he gains.

As one of his last official opinions as Chief Justice, before retirement, Earl Warren's decision on the Adam Clayton Powell case was characteristic: ignored the Constitution which it was his job to interpret. In a 62-page opinion written by Warren, the Court ruled that the House exceeded its authority in refusing to seat the Harlem Congressman whose repeated violations of court orders and errant behavior in office are public knowledge.

I say the Court ignored the Constitution for this reason: Article I. Section 5 states that "each House may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior and, with the concurrence of two thirds, expel a member." I do not see how it could be stated any more clearly. But the Court resorted to a strange reading of its own that the above section applied only in cases of dispute over age, residency, and citizenship. In both spirit and exact wording, it seems to me, the Constitution is very specific on this point.

In a few days the present Chief Justice will retire and Judge Warren Burger will assume office. I have great confidence in the past record of Judge Burger. He comes to this great office at a time of loss of public confidence in the Court, but he has a great opportunity to invest the court with the impartial and objective majesty upon which rule by law depends. I have confidence he can accomplish this.

THE MAJOR LEGISLATION considered by the House this week was the Public Health Cigarette Smoking Act. It was Panhandle, of course. But this passed on Wednesday by a voice vote after defeat of an attempt to recommit the bill to committee. This was what I could call "iceberg" legislation in that the issue was bigger than be next: high-colesteral prowhat appeared on the surface.

Looking at the bill itself it appeared merely to extend present requirements that cigarette packages containa warning to the effect that cigarette smoking may be dangerous to one's health. There were no violent objections to this on the part of the cigarette industry.

What was important, how-

ever, was a section of the bill bureaucracy. which warned the Federal regu-

latory agencies that Congress intended to hold sole prerogative to decision making with regard to the advertising of cigarettes. The Federal Commin'cations Commission had indicated earlier that it intended to ban all advertising of cigarettes on radio and television stations. and the Federal Trade Commission had publicly announced its intent to require its own health warning of cigarette packages. So what Congress' action this week amounted to was a warning to the FTC and the FCC that it intended to write public policy on the cigarette controversy and

Earlier this week the House Agriculture Committee met to consider legislation designed to help more rural communities finance water and sewage disposal projects. During the course of testimony by Jim Smith, the new Administrator of the Farmers Home Administration, the subject of H.R. 11547 and H.R. 11604 came up. These are bills I introduced this session to improve the FHA loan program. The first bill would increase from \$60,000 to

\$100,000 the principal indebtedness limitation for farm ownership loans; and increase from \$35,000 to \$50,000 the limitation for operating loans. In view of changed economic agricultural conditions, I believe the proposed new ceiling would be more realistic.

H.R. 11604 provides that FHA operating loans will be insured in the same manner as other FHA programs.

I was glad to have the chance to discuss this legislation with Mr. Smith and to call it to the attention of the committee.

Revenue Bond **Voting Law** Incalidated

Texas Secreatry of State Martin Dies, Jr., said today that the United State Supreme Court's decision in a Louisiana case last week has invalidaged a Texas law which restircts voting in revenue bond elections to property owners.

By statute of the Secretary of State is the chief election officer of Texas and is responsible for obtaining and maintaining uniformity in the application, operation and interpretation of the state's election laws.

On Monday of last week the United States Supreme Court struck down a Louisiana law which gave only property taxpayers the right to vote in elections called to approve the issuance of revenue bonds by

municipal utility, on the ground that it violated the equal protection clause of the Feder-Consitituion because it excluded otherwise qualified voters who were as substantially affected and directly interested in the matter voted upon as those who were permitted to

The Texas Constitution contains a provision that only qualified electors who own property which has been duly rendered for taxation are eligible to vote in an election for the purpose of issuing bonds. The Supreme Court of Texas has interpreted this provision as applying to elections for issuing public utility bonds which are to be retired from revenues produced by the utility, as well as to elections for issuing bonds to be retired by levy of a property

Secretary Dies said that the property ownership requirement could no longer be imposed in future elections for issuance of revenue bonds. He pointed out that the United States civilians, not military men." Supreme Court's decision applies only to revenue bond elections and that the court has not ruled on the validity of a property ownership requirement in a tax bond election.

Military-Industrial a Friendly Goblin

Avowed enemies of our American institutions are always seeking to discredit them with raving or ridicule or by innuendo. Recently they have dug their teeth into the trousers of the so-called "military-industrial complex."

Some liberal members of Congress have aided and abetted their cause. Some Americans, frustrated by the dead-end war in Viet-

nam, have been willing to renounce anything military. With most explanations for our continuing intervention in Vietnam tenuous, to say the least, it has been easy for some Americans to accept the idea that we persist in fighting wars because the Pentagon is in cahoots with rich industrialists who want to produce an endless stream of military hardware for purely mercenary reasons.

Thus the "complex" which has thus far protected us from our enemies is itself denounced as an enemy.

Some critics jump to their own defense with: "Eisenhower said it..."

Then they quote, out of context, a remark by the late President in his farewell address in which he had sought to caution Congress not to abandon its watchdog responsibility on military spending.

The Senate-House economy-in-government subcommittee is presently considering the President's request for another \$80 billion for "defense."

That sounds like a lot of money when he asks only \$110 billion for all other government programs.

Yet the military share of our total budget is virtually unchanged over the past 10 years. Further, the House Armed Service Committee staff has

surveyed voting records during the past fiscal year and finds no evidence of any relationship between the way a congressman voted and the defense complexion of his district.

So any sinister alliance of military and industry to perpetuate military spending is a hobgoblin created by persons either malicious or uninformed.

Dean Acheson, secretary of state under President Truman, called the present assault on the "military-industrial complex" a "witch hunt which could lead to a dangerous weakening of our national defense. "The cliche about a military-industrial complex, moreover,

is invidious to an honorable profession. To portray such individuals, by innuendo, as schemers against the national interest is misleading and unjust. I urge abandoning the foolish phrase once and for all."

There is an unmistakable wave of antimilitarism in the United States. It derives from high casualties, high taxes and low morale. Americans generally are suffering understandably from varying degrees of battle fatigue.

But about that, House Armed Service Committee Chairman L. Mendel Rivers (D.-S.C.) said this: "If the United States is overcommitted in the world, and made a mistake by getting involved in Vietnam, it was because of decisions by End quote and amen.





"We are encouraged that this can become a practical way of planting cotton and sorghum in this area, thereby saving farmers the usual \$15 to \$18 per acre seedbed preparation cost'', Longnecker said.


