



Durward led the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Aljance and the Texas Pledge.

Mayor Ervin called the meeting to order @ 5:30 p.m.

Nathan made the motion to approve minutes as read with a second from David. Motion carried 4-0.

After looking over the bills, David made the motion to approve them for payment with a second from Durward. Motion carried 4-0.

The Mayor reported that repairs were somewhat slow on the tower due to the high winds, but progress was being made. The ladder which had to be installed is all the way up now and the tank has been washed down. The Commission wants to be sure the issue of horses and not enough acreage gets tended to.

Nathan made the motion to transfer funds from the EDC savings account to the City of Gorman name and account. This account will be the Buildings and Standards account. This account will be for property clean up only. (EX: roll off containers etc.) These proceeds originally came from the sale of property that was acquired by the EDC. Once Tacy checks all of the legalities of this process the funds will be transferred. Durward made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

Cliffa reported s brief statement regarding some properties in Gorman.

At 6:30 p.m. Nathan made the motion to go into Executive Session. Joe made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

At 6:36 p.m. David made the motion to adjourn from Executive Session and return to Regular Open Session with a second from Joe.

There being no further agenda items for consideration David made the motion to adjourn with a second from Joe, motion carried 4-0, time was 6:40 p.m.

The USDA Farm Service Agency reminds eligible ranchers and livestock producers of the Jan. 30, 2012 deadline for applying for benefits under the provisions of the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) for losses incurred during the 2011 crop year. Eastland County became eligible for the Livestock Forage Disaster Program on April 5, 2011.

LFP provides payments to eligible livestock producers that have suffered livestock grazing losses due to qualifying drought or fire. Fire losses apply only to federally managed rangeland. Eligible livestock under LFP include beef cattle, alpacas, buffalo, beefalo, dairy cattle, deer, elk, emus, equine, goats, llamas, poultry, reindeer, sheep and swine. For losses due to drought, qualifying drought ratings are determined using the U.S. Drought Monitor located at http://www. drought.unl.edu/dm/monitor.html.

It is imperative that livestock producers meet this deadline for disaster assistance as there are no late file provisions for LFP. To ensure a smooth application process, producers should have all required supporting documentation with them at the time they visit

our office to apply for benefits. In order for an LFP applicant to qualify for program benefits, the applicant must have purchased insurance coverage through FSA's Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) or the Pasture, Rangeland and Forage Insurance-Rainfall Index for Grazing (PRF-RI) program offered through the Risk Management Agency (RMA). 

Grasshopper Control

I have had a few phone calls this week and while driving down the road I understand why. The grasshoppers are back. Grasshoppers cause some main factor affecting grasshopper populations is weather. Outbreaks, or exceptionally large populations, are usually preceded by several years of hot, dry summers and warm autumns. Dry weather increases the survival of nymphs and adults. Warm autumns allow grasshoppers more time to feed and lay eggs. Grasshoppers have a high reproductive capacity. The female lays an average of 200 eggs per season, and sometimes as many as 400 eggs.

Grasshoppers deposit their eggs 1/2 to 2 inches below the soil surface in pod-like structures. Each egg pod consists of 20 to 120 elongated eggs cemented together. The whole mass is somewhat egg-shaped. Egg pods are very resistant to moisture and cold and easily survive the winter if the soil is not disturbed. Grasshoppers deposit eggs in fallow fields, ditches, fencerows, alfalfa.

Eggs typically begin hatching in late April or early May. Hatching peaks about mid-June and usually ends by late June. Young grasshoppers are called nymphs. They look like adults, but are smaller and have wing pads instead of wings. Nymphs go through five or six developmental stages and become adults in 40 to 60 days, depending on weather and food supplies. The adults of grasshopper species that damage crops become numerous in mid-July and deposit eggs from late July through fall. Usually only one generation of grasshoppers is produced each year.

Farmers and ranchers should start watching for grasshoppers early in the season and begin control measures while grasshoppers are still nymphs and still within the hatching sites (roadsides, fencerows, etc.). Treating grasshoppers early means (1) having to treat fewer acres and use less insecticide, (2) killing grasshoppers before they cause extensive crop damage, and (3) killing grasshoppers before they can fly, migrate and lay eggs. Also, smaller grasshoppers are more susceptible to insecticides than larger ones.

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
Sodium and Potassium: Leading The Way To A Healthier Heart

Do you salt your food before you taste? Should Americans cut back on damage every year, but they become very destructive during outbreaks. The salt? Sodium is important in maintaining proper fluid balance, regulating blood pressure, transmitting nerve impulses, and relaxation of muscles. But, too much sodium can be dangerous to our bodies and lead to heart disease, stroke, and/or kidney disease. With majority of sodium coming from processed, packaged foods, and restaurant foods, Americans on average get over 3,400 milligrams (mg) of sodium per day. The adequate intake (AI) of sodium for individual's ages 9 to 50 years is 1,500 mg per day. Lower sodium AI's were established for children and older adults (ages 1 to 3 years -1,000 mg/ day; ages 4 to 8 years - 1,200 mg/day; ages 51 to 70 years - 1,300 mg/day; ages 71 years and older - 1,200 mg/day) because their calorie requirements are lower. To Tolerable Upper Intake Level (UL) for sodium is 2,300 mg per day. Too much sodium leads to risks with the main risk being high blood shelter belts and other weedy areas, as well as in crop fields, hay fields and pressure. To prevent risks from occurring, a UL is establish to pose no risk to an individual. Ways to decrease sodium in the diet include the following:

- Avoid adding salt to foods.
- Limit canned, processed, and packaged foods.
- Limit the amount of restaurant visits, but if needed ask them to avoid adding
 - salt to your food.
 - Season foods with herbs and spices that are salt-free.

Potassium maintains fluid balance and nerve transmission. Potassium One way to control grasshopper populations is to eliminate sites where does the opposite of sodium by lowering blood pressure by stopping the action ACE inhibitors. Sources of potassium include bananas, orange juice, most fruits, potatoes, dried peas, peanuts, nuts, dairy products, and meats.

With sodium and potassium working hand in hand, it is essential to regulate the two of them to allow for normal blood pressure. Unregulated blood pressure can lead to heart disease and stroke, which is the first and third leading cause of death in the United States. Know the Warning Signs (NU) - Each year, millions of people are affected by ventricular arrhythmias, or irregular heartbeats. If left untreated, fast or irregular heartbeats can lead to sudden cardiac death, a condition that kills about 300,000 people in the United States each year,1 more than lung cancer, breast cancer and HIV/AIDS combined.^{2,3}

Lifeline Service and Link Up Program

The Federal Communications Commission and the Public Utility Commission of Texas have established two programs to make telephone service more affordable to eligible customers. Lifeline Service, supported in part by federal universal support mechanisms and the Texas universal service fund, is a program designed to make telephone service available at reduced rates to eligible residential customers. Link-Up is a program designed to offer eligible customers a reduction in installation charges for telephone service equal to one-half of the service connection charges or \$30.00, whichever is less.

Services supported by the federal universal service support mechanisms and the Texas universal service fund include: voice grade access to the public switched network, tone dialing, single party service or its functional equivalent, access to emergency services (911), access to directory assistance, toll limitation to qualifying low-income subscribers, availability of an annual local directory, the ability to report service problems seven days a week, access to toll service, and Lifeline service.

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


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
