

But if you take that same Christian and slowly change their environment... They may not notice that something is wrong.

This scenario could also be applied in a larger congregational so Let's say that five years ago congregation X had a zeal to reach the community a had several thriving ministries that reached out to every facet of the community. The congregation was experiencing exceptional numerical growth by bringing in many young families and even had a great youth program. Everyone had a ministry in the congregation and everyone felt loved. Eventually, the congregation gets used to being known as a healthy thriving congregation. Within time many become complacent... comfortable because they know that they are healthy church and there is no reason to rock the boat.

The problem with this, though is that in their comfort, they lose the zeal, servant hearts, and desire to work that got them where they were.

I'm afraid that, like that frog, many of our nation's churches are becoming complacent and heading to our demise without even knowing it. What about you? What are you tolerating today that you wouldn't have 10, 20, 30 years ago? What will you put up with tomorrow, that you wouldn't stand for today?
