Panthers Edged By Bears; Play At Meridian On Friday

The Panthers moved out to a 7-0 lead in the first period but were down 15-7 at halftime. The scored 7 in the final period, but allowed 14 points to the Bears to come out on the short end of a 29-20 score. This was a very tough loss since the Bears were picked by a heavy margin.

Gorman scored on its first possession, going 75 yards in 7 plays with Brandon Velasquez getting the honors from 1 yard out with 8:09 left. Drew Flanary booted the point after and the Big Red were up 7-0. The drive featured a beautiful 58 yard run by Velasquez.

The Bears came back in the second period when they took over the punt on their own 3 and after an incomplete pass. Tyler White tossed a pass to his right and Will Russell broke free after a short gain and raced 97 yards for the score with 11:28 left in the second. The kick for point failed and the score was 7-6.

The Bears held the Panthers on their next possession and got the ball on their own 43. They scored in 8 plays with Tyler White scoring from 1 yard out with 5:32 left in the half. The try for 2 points failed and the Bears held a 12-7 advantage.

The Bears added a field goal of 10 yards by Will Russell after they got an interception on their own 34 and moved to the Gorman 10 before the kick. The Bears held a 15-7 edge at halftime.

Both bands performed very good routines at intermission and the Panther Cheerleaders did a good job with their routine.

The Panthers came back on their first possession following the intermission and put on a 77 yard drive in 11 plays with Josh Ryon getting the honors from 2 yards out with 3:27 left in the third. The run for 2 points failed and Gorman moved to within 2 points of the Bears at 15-13. The drive featured runs of 8, 4, 8, 1,3 and 6 by Ramirez and 16, 15 and 3 by Velasquez.

Gorman came back with another score after recovering a Bear fumble on the Baird 12 and scored on an 11 yard run by Velasquez with 10:37 left in the game. Flanary booted the point after and Gorman was up 20-15.

However the Bears came back with a scoring drive of 68 yards in just 3 plays when White hit Russell on a 65 yard pass and run to put the Bears at 21-20. The kick try by Russell made the margin 22-20 with 9:49 left.

The Bears got another chance when the Panthers missed on an eight yard try for

a fourth down and gave the Bears the ball on the Gorman 32. From there the Bears scored in 9 plays with White connecting on a 12 yard pass on fourth down with 29 seconds left. Russell added the point after and the final score was 29-20.

The Panthers travel to Meridian on Friday night in another District game. Meridian is having some scoring problems this season but has always given the Panthers a tough battle when they met. So follow the Panthers to Meridian on Friday and back them to a win.
