The Panthers received the opening kickoff Friday night in the game with Chico and jumped to a 7-0 lead. Then the Dragons answered back with a score but missed the point after to make the score 7-6 in the first. There was no scoring in the second period. The Panthers scored 13 in the third while the Dragons added 20 and there was no scoring in the final period with the final score being 26-20.

Gorman took the kickoff on their own 25 and scored in 5 plays with Zach Carlton hitting Yovani Palacios for 18 yards with 9:04 left in the period. Matt Fox booted the point after and Gorman was up 7-0. The drive featured runs of 1, 16 and 28 by B. J. Ramirez and a 2 yarder by Carlton.

Then with 40 seconds on left in the period McCoy passed to Rohan for 15 yards for the TD. The point ater failed and Gorman led 7-6 and the first half ended with that score.

The Dragons took the second half kickoff on their own 32 and scored in 5 plays with McCoy racing in for the score from 25 vards out with 10.18 left in the third. The pass try for 2 points failed and Chico led 12 - 7.

The Dragons scored again on their next possession, getting the ball on the Gorman 20 and scoring in 3 plays with McCoy hitting Hightower on a poss from 20 yards out with 7:39 left. Long ran for the 2 points and the score was 20-7.

The Panthers came right back after getting the ball on the Dragon 44 and Carlton scored on the first play on a beautiful 44 yard scamper with 7:13 left. The kick was blocked and the score was 20-13.

Then on the next possession by the Dragons, McCoy ran in for the score from 6 yards out with 4:43 left in the third. The run for 2 points failed and the score was 26-13.

The Panthers answered right back on the next possession, getting the ball on the their own 45 and scored in 5 plays with Ramirez scoring on a run from 18 yards out with 2:47 left in the third. Fox booted the point after and the score was 26-20. .

The drive featured funs of 8 and 16 by Ramirez and a 9 yarder by Carlton.

Neither teams could score in the final period and the Dragons held on for the 26-20 victory.

Ramirez led the Panthers with 136 yards on 20 carries. Carlton had 125 on 10 tries. Fox ran for 15 on 5 carries.



Alvis Scitern


Alvis Scitern, age 88 of Gorman, passed away Monday, August 29, 2011 at the Comanche County Medical Center.



Sandra Cagle - Eastland County Tax Assessor-Collector - New Vehicle Registration FEES

A massive overhaul of the vehicle registration fee structure is about to get underway, and it's important Eastland County residents understand what's happening and why.

Beginning Sept. 1, more than 1,700 registration fee categories are reduced to nine weight classifications that create a more equitable, standardized, and simpler registration fee system.

These changes impact what Eastland County residents will pay to register cars, light and heavy-duty trucks, motor homes (RVs), and trailers, including travel trailers. Because registration is paid forward, those of you with registrations that end in August 2011 already are seeing the new fees on your renewal notices.

The good news is some fees are being completely eliminated, and some residents will see a cost reduction.

The new fee simplification law, which was passed by the legislature in 2009, provides many benefits to taxpayers, including: A fixed fee means you'll always know what you owe.

Weight classifications make the fees more equitable for everyone because what you pay is based on how much impact your vehicle has on Texas' roads.

Vehicle dealers can accurately calculate registration fees for customers.

Trucking companies can better determine their own registration costs.

The Texas Department of Motor Vehicles will no longer have to spend tax dollars to maintain and program the complex fee structure in its database.

Freeing up resources at our tax offices so representatives have more time to spend with you.

If you have an older car or light truck (6,000 pounds or less), be aware that you will see a small increase – around \$10 – to your registration fee. There are two reasons for this: The state determined the new annual base registration fee on the amount of wear and tear the vehicle's weight does to our roadways instead of vehicle age, and the new, annual base rate of \$50.75 creates a fixed fee that will not adversely impact the current collection of registration revenue. (For those buying new cars, the new fee is about an \$8 reduction.)

Everyone continues to pay the \$1 Department of Public Safety fee for TexasSure, the automated insurance verification program, and there is a \$1 automation fee for improvements to the state registration and titling computer system.

The new law requires all counties to charge each vehicle owner \$1 for automation. Previously, this fee was only assessed in the state's largest counties but now our residents will also contribute, and the revenue will be used by the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles to

automate more of its processes - including the development of more online services to consumers. One fee eliminated is the 30-cent reflectorization fee. It was on everyone's registration renewal to help buy the reflective sheeting

for license plates. Also eliminated is the \$5 license plate transfer fee that was charged when you took off the license plates on a car or truck you traded in or sold and put them on the new vehicle you bought. Every time you sell or trade in a vehicle there are two important steps you must take to protect yourself: File the Vehicle Transfer Notification, which you can do online at www.TxDMV.gov, and transfer the license plates.

The notification removes your liability from anything the new owner may do with the vehicle and the license plate transfer protects

You need to think of your license plates as a personal identification number, and turning them over to someone else means that person can run up toll charges and even commit a criminal act that points to you as the culprit. Now that transferring your plates is free, I encourage everyone to take advantage of this service.

The new law standardizes the license plate replacement fee at \$6, and does away with the fee for classic, cotton, forestry, volunteer firefighter, tow truck, and radio operator license plates.

Eastland County residents who own trailers under 6,000 pounds will be pleased to know that the 75 registration fee categories for trailers are reduced to a fixed annual cost of \$45. And this includes travel trailers.

Truckers, trucking companies and those of you with other vehicles over 6,000 pounds, such as RVs, should no longer have to worry about whether you are paying the right registration fee. Gone are the 1,600 fee categories that these heavy vehicle owners had to use to determine what they owed. Instead there are seven weight classifications, which should make it easy for fleet owners and individuals to determine their costs.

Car dealers, too, often had difficulty determining the proper registration fee for customers because there were so many variables in the formula. Now, it's standardized.


County fees may still vary throughout the state because they are set by our commissioners. In Eastland County vehicle registrants pay \$10.00 Rd & Bridge, \$1.00 DPS fee and a \$1.00 Automation Fee.

We're glad to help all our customers, but we also know most Texans would prefer to handle it themselves. The new, simplified fee structure is going to help everyone to do just that. For those of you who need our in-office assistance, we're always here for you.


This standardized fee structure is not designed to make more money for the state or county. Its purpose is to apply common sense and fairness to what was a very complicated and complex fee structuring system that was difficult for many customers to understand and expensive for the state to maintain.

Plus the new categories set up to standardize registration fees are done in a way to ensure the state doesn't lose any registration revenue for building and maintaining Texas' roads and bridges. So now more than ever you can be proud to "Check the date, Love your state" and "Put Texas in your corner."

The Time for a Balanced Budget Amendment is NOW "Only a constitutional amendment will do the job. We've tried the carrot, and it failed. With the stick of a Balanced Budget Amendment, we can stop government squandering, overtaxing ways,

and save our economy." - Ronald Reagan, 1982 Today, our national debt is nearly \$14.3 trillion. Annual deficits are out of control and expected to reach \$1.3 trillion again this year. Since President Obama took office on January 20, 2009, the national debt has increased by \$3.7 trillion. To put that in perspective, it took the U.S. from 1776 until 1992 to accumulate the same amount of debt that President Obama accumulated in two and a half years. We are currently borrowing more than 40 cents of every dollar we spend, much of it from the Chinese, and sending the bill to our children and grandchildren. Every child born today already owes more than \$46,000 to our government's creditors. The Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff has named our record?high debt "the single biggest threat to our national security."

Fifteen years ago, a Balanced Budget Amendment (BBA) passed the House with bipartisan support, only to lose by one vote in the U.S. Senate. Since then, the national debt has grown by \$9.2 trillion. The BBA is a game changer, and fighting for its ratification is the ultimate solution to our nation's fiscal crisis.

The time to act is now. Our debt crisis is a legitimate threat to our nation's future, and extraordinary problems call for extrao. nary action. America cannot afford to wait any longer. Texans know balancing budgets is not an untested idea, as 49 states currently abide by some form of a balanced budget requirement. The House just passed a series of spending cuts and caps, but the only way for us to ensure that future Congresses can't undo the work we've done is to enshrine fiscal responsibility into the U.S. Constitution in the form of a Balanced Budget Amendment.

Getting Americans Back to Work

Thirty-two months into his presidency, and 31 months after he signed the failed \$1 trillion "stimulus" bill, President Obama will address a Joint Session of Congress this week to share his jobs plan with the nation. After spending the first 2 1/2 years of his administration initiating a trillion dollar government takeover of health care and spending \$3.7 trillion we simply don't have, the President finally wants to focus on the fact that 9.1 percent of Americans who want to work are unemployed.

Since taking over the House majority in January, House Republicans have had a jobs plan and have been passing pieces of legislation to get Americans back to work. We have had a plan to create jobs and restore confidence and certainty to the economy. Our plan includes a budget that would protect America's entitlement programs from bankruptcy (without tax hikes), a Plan for America's Job Creators that would provide a better environment for private-sector job growth, and as I mentioned earlier, a Balanced Budget Amendment to the Constitution so Washington will be required to live within its means. Republicans are committed to creating jobs, getting our nation's fiscal house in order, and restoring economic certainty for long-term growth and prosperity for every American. I hope President Obama is too and I look forward to hearing his proposals at the upcoming Joint Session.
