Following Traffic Laws For The **New School Year**

New clothes, backpacks, lunch boxes, school buses. The first day of school is exciting for students, but the new school year can bring tragedy if school bus safety rules are not followed. The Texas Department of Public Safety rules are not allowed. The Texas Department of Public Safety reminds motorists to obey traffic laws and watch for children boarding or exiting school buses. Parents and teachers should talk to children about school bus safety.

In 1995, no school bus drivers or passengers were killed while riding on school buses in Texas, but 1,370 people were injured while traveling on them. Seven people were killed in accidents directly or indirectly involving school buses, while 2,556 were injured.

The most common time for accidents is when school buses are loading or unloading students. Students should be taught to follow safety rules and to watch for traffic before crossing streets. Students also should watch for vehicles illegally passing stopped school buses on either side of the bus. According to the National School Bus Loading and Unloading Survey, most children injured or killed while getting on or off busesare under the age of 10.

A safe, reliable and efficient system for transporting children to and from school is part of the total educational program. To ensure the proper operation of school transportation systems, the DPS oversees and updates the state's school bus driver training program.

"Practicing good school bus requires a combined effort of hte motoring public obeying the traffic laws, parents and teachers educating children to be safe and school bus drivers being properly trained to decrease the number of school bus related accidents," said Debbi Goertz, DPS program administrator for school bus transportation.

Reminders for motorists:

*Drive with care wehn enar a school bus. If you approach a school bus from either direction and the bus displaying alternately flashing lights, you must stop until the school bus has resumed motion, until you are signaled by the driver to proceed, or until the red lights stop flashing.

Two Countians Graduate TDOPS Training Academy

Lancer Shane Morrow and Christian S. Ledbetter, both of Eastland were among 106 trooper cadets who graduated fromt he Texas Department of Public Safety's 110th Training Acad-

Rep. Rob Junnell, D-San Angelo, addressed the graduating class at hte Frank Erwin Center on the University of Texas campus in Austin. DPS Director Col. James R. Wilson and Lt. Col. Dudley Thomas also participated in the ceremony along with DPS training officers.

The cadets entered the Academy in February and completed 1,182 hours of instruction - more than twice the training required by the Texas Commission on Law Officer Standards and Education. The Cadets received instruction in criminal law, traffic law, arrest procedures, accident investigations, first aid and other law enforcement subjects as well as classes aimed at developing self-esteem and goal setting skills.

"Getting into the Academy is not an easy task," said Capt. Mark Warren assistant commander of the DPS Academy. Every recruit school receives about 4,000 applications from men and women all across Texas and the United States. Those applicants are narrowed to about 500. Troopers then personally investigate those who made the first cut. Personality and psychological tests wer given to narrow the applicants to the 106 who graduated.

Troopers Morrow and Ledbetter will be assigned to the Highway Patrol in Eastland on September 3rd.

Anyone in the community who has completed all graduation requirements except for passing the TEAMS or TAAS may take these tests to try to earn a high school diploma.
