

Eastland County Burn Ban Reinstated As of November 14th

COUNTY OF EASTLAND

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, The Commissioners Court has determined that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Eastland County that all outdoor burning is banned in the unincorporated area of the county to begin November 14, 2011, at 8:00 a.m., for 90 days from the adoption of this Order, the same being February 12, 2012, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; or (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081(h), a violation of this Order is a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00

Adopted this 14th day of November, 2011, by a vote of 5 Ayes and 0 nays.



He still had the same personality, the same zeal to work hard, the same boldness, and the same leadership ability, but now all of those efforts were repurposed to serve Christ rather than his former religious traditions.

Are there any areas of your life that need to be repurposed? Surely all of us have hobbies, relationships, or even personality traits that drag us down. They're time consuming, draining, and add nothing to our spiritual growth. In short... they're the scrap of our lives. It is a good practice to audit ourselves every so often just to make sure we are serving God with all of our heart, soul, mind, and strength. And if you happen to find any areas that are bringing you down, you have a few options: First, you can ignore it and keep doing what you're doing. Unfortunately, this won't benefit yourself or the Lord's Kingdom. Second, you can cut it off. Throw the scrap out of your life that weighs you down. Many of us have bad habits that should be stopped completely. But what about a third option... what if you repurpose that part of your life so that it brings glory to God and produces fruit in His Kingdom?

Maybe you enjoy working on cars. You can repurpose that hobby by inviting a neighborhood boy to your shop and teach him what you know. You could also use your talent to fix the car of a person in need. Maybe you like to quilt or knit. You could offer to teach a young lady the craft. Maybe you are into extreme couponing. You could share your coupons and skills with a family in need. Do you get the idea? Repurpose every aspect of your life so that you give your completely to God.

USDA Farm Service Agency Urges Farmers and Ranchers To Vote in County Committee **Elections Beginning Friday, Nov. 4**

WASHINGTON, Nov.3, 2011 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Bruce Nelson announced today that the 2011 FSA county committee elections will begin tomorrow, Nov. 4, with USDA mailing ballots to eligible voters. The deadline to return the ballots to local FSA offices is Dec. 5, 2011.

"The role and input of our county committee members is more vital than ever at a time when our country faces important choices regarding the funding and operation of our government," said Nelson. "New county committee members provide input and make important decisions on the local administration of disaster and conservation programs. With better participation in recent years, we have also seen promising increases in the number of women and minority candidates, helping to better represent the richness of American agriculture."

County committee members are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support programs; conservation programs; incentive indemnity and disaster programs for some commodities; emergency programs and eligibility. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws.

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age, but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm may also be eligible to vote. Agricultural producers in each county submitted candidate nominations during the nomination period, which ended on Aug. 1.

Eligible voters who do not receive ballots in the coming week can obtain ballots from their local USDA Service Center. Dec. 5, 2011, is the last day for voters to submit ballots in person to local USDA Service Centers. Ballots returned by mail must also be postmarked no later than Dec. 5. Newly elected committee members and their alternates will take office Jan. 1, 2012.

Close to 7,700 FSA county committee members serve in the 2,244 FSA offices nationwide. Each committee consists of three to 11 members who serve three-year terms. Approximately one-third of county committee seats are up for election each year. More information on county committees, such as the new 2011 fact sheet and brochures, can be found on the FSA website at http://www.fsa.usda.gov/electionsor at a local USDA Service Center.
