Three Positions To Be Open For May 12th Election For School Board

Three positions will come open for the May 12, 2012 election for school board trustees and special election to fill an unexpired term. These positions will include two three-year terms to be elected at large, currently held by Mark Simmons and Daryl Hirst. The third position is a one year unexpired term ending May 2013, this term vacated by Don Whitten and filled by appointment by Jamie Espinoza. First day to file is February 4, 2011. Deadline to file is March 5, 2011 at 5:00 p.m. Applications are available at the Superintendents' office during school hours.

Natural Pond

If your landscape has a country feel, this style of pond is a great fit. Choose a spot that's large and flat to accommodate a lot of plants and have enough space for wildlife to enjoy the water.

Circular Pond

Natural Stream

On February 1, 2012 the Eastland County Museum held a Grand Re-Opening and along with the Eastland County Historical Commission a Historic Marker Dedication. The event was attended by some 200 people from all around the county and beyond. On behalf of the boards of both organizations we thank those who took the time from their busy lives and attended. County and state officials were on hand to unveil the marker and to cut the ribbon of the Museum. A special thanks to Ed Allcorn for making the trip from Abilene. We believe Ed was pleased to see his work continue and we were honored with his presence.

More changes are forthcoming at the Museum with the addition of a Media Room, once completed will allow for research of the hundreds of hours of videos available at the Museum as well as internet research. Thanks to Richard Barron and TXOL the Museum will soon become a free wifi hotspot for those who need, or like, to stay connected to the world wide web!

Other events coming to the Museum include a preservation workshop presented by Elyssa and Anna Ford in mid March, the Artists of Eastland County's Art Show April 21-22, and a Texas Historical Commission Regional Workshop on May 16. More details of these events will be released later as details are completed.

In our next and continuing editions of the Eastland County Museum News, we will include a photo now in the archives of the Museum for help in making identifications. We will appreciate any information you will be able to offer. So be watching for our first photo query.

You may or may not realize, but the Museum survives only with your help. Not only your donation of information, photos and or items, but with your dollars as well. We are a 501(c)(3) Non profit Charitable Organization as designated by the IRS. We rely on financial support from all means and have recently been the recipients of a donation that has relieved some of the pressures of maintaining a near 100 year old building and Museum. These funds will only reach so far in the huge building maintenance issues currently looming. Some of the major issues at this time are: Elevator upgrade as required by the state, and elevator codes - up to \$90,000 and some must be completed by September or the elevator must be taken out of service; windows restoration of the Museum area -\$unknown at this time but could reach \$75,000+ (a temp \$6,500 fix will soon be started), complete roof replacement \$80,000. (Thanks to the City of Eastland for covering the cost of a temporary fix to the roof at over \$9,000!)

As you can see the Museum is facing a \$245,000+ funding deficit towards these projects. Any financial support you can offer will be greatly appreciated and is tax deductible! Other cards are available at the Museum.

Currently the Museum hours of operation are Thursday through Saturday from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. As more volunteers step up to help, we hope to extend the hours in the near future. Want to volunteer?? Stop by the Museum and sign up!

We Can't Wait: Obama Administration Announces Steps to **Boost the Rural Economy, Promote Job Creation**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21, 2012 - As part of the Obama Administration's "We Can't Wait" efforts to strengthen the economy, create jobs and support business growth, Administration officials announced three significant actions to expand the government's purchase of biobased products, promote regional rural job creation efforts, and develop a rural healthcare workforce, all of which build on the historic investments the Administration has made in rural America over the past three years. Today's announcements are the latest in a series of executive actions the Obama Administration is taking to strengthen the economy and move the country forward because we can't wait for Congress to act.

"My Administration is committed to using every tool available to promote economic growth and create good jobs in rural America," said President Obama. "Today's announcements reflect our continued focus on expanding opportunity for rural Americans and all Americans, including supporting new and innovative businesses, and improving rural health care and education. And the actions we're taking today are possible thanks to the feedback and ideas I've received from hardworking Americans across rural America, including the participants at the White House Rural Eco-

"President Obama understands that a strong American economy is tied to a healthy, vibrant rural economy," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack, who chairs the White House Rural Council. "The actions we are taking will bring new economic investments to our rural communities, to ensure the people who live in these towns have a better, brighter future."

The three announcements were recommended by federal agencies participating in the White House Rural Council, and leverage existing programs and funding, but the new actions will expedite job creation in rural parts of the country.

"This Administration will not be satisfied until everyone who wants a job, has a job - both in rural and urban communities," said Commerce Secretary John Bryson. "Today's announcements are just the latest example of federal partners aligning all of their efforts and resources to help businesses grow, create jobs, and ensure that our economy is built to last."

"Health information technology has the potential to improve the quality, access, and efficiency of health care delivery, especially in our nation's rural areas. To achieve this aim, it is essential that we have a skilled health IT workforce," said Mary Wakefield, Ph.D., R.N., Administrator of the Health Resources and Services Administration. "This memorandum of understanding with our colleagues at the Department of Labor will build on existing collaborations to help ease the challenges of geographic isolation and staff shortages faced by rural communities and help move us toward our mutual goal of Health IT workforce development."

"There is a real need to expand the rural health IT workforce and our MOU with the Department of Health and Human Services will help ensure that job training programs are quickly and effectively addressing this need," said Assistant Secretary for Employment and Training Administration Jane Oates.

New initiatives being announced today include:

Promoting A Bioeconomy: President Obama issued a Presidential Memorandum today directing the Federal Government to take decisive steps to dramatically increase the purchase of biobased products over the next two years, which will create jobs and drive innovation where biobased products are grown and manufactured. The Memorandum will also result in a 50 percent increase in the number of new products that are designated as biobased. Biobased products include items like paints, soaps and detergents and are developed from farm grown plants, rather than chemicals or petroleum bases. The biobased products sector marries the two most important economic engines for rural America: agriculture and manufacturing.

Rural Jobs Accelerator: The Rural Jobs Accelerator is a national competition that will provide about \$15 million for projects that promote innovation-fueled regional job creation. The competition will combine funding from the USDA, the Economic Development Administration (EDA), Delta Regional Authority and the Appalachian Regional Commission. Additionally, this approach will require multiple agencies to coordinate technical assistance and grant / loan programs so that potential rural customers have a single access point within the Federal government to mobilize the resources of the government to help a region of the country. USDA will utilize the Rural Community Development Initiative (RCDI) program to support this effort and provide technical assistance and training funds to qualified intermediary organizations to develop their capacity to undertake housing, community facilities, and community and economic development projects in rural areas. The Federal Funding Opportunity will be released in the next few weeks.

Rural Health IT Workforce: The Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Labor signed a memorandum of understanding to connect community colleges and technical colleges that support rural communities with the materials and resources they need to support the training of Health Information Technology (HIT) professionals that work in rural hospitals and clinics. The Bureau of Labor Statistics estimates that the needed HIT workforce will increase by 20 percent by 2016.

Over the last month, the Obama Administration has made several additional announcements resulting from the White House Rural Council's efforts, including an initiative to help rural homeowners refinance their mortgages at lower interest rates and a new forest restoration frame-

work to drive economic growth and job creation through timber restoration and harvest. The new plan would place federal agencies on a path toward increasing federal timber harvests to 3 billion board feet.

Since August 2011, the White House Rural Council has supported a broad spectrum of rural initiatives including a \$350 million commitment in SBA funding to rural small businesses over the next 5 years, launching a series of conferences to connect investors with rural startups, creating capital marketing teams to pitch federal funding opportunities to private investors interested in making rural investments, making job search information available at 2,800 local USDA offices nationwide, making HHS loans available to help more than 1,300 Critical Access Hospitals recruit additional staff, and helping rural hospitals purchase software and hardware to implement health IT. USDA and Navy also announced a partnerip to advance the use of next neration biofuels in Navy op-

William Vander Knaap, 2701 County Road 177, Stephenville, Texas 76401 has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) under General Permit No. TXG920000 for authorization to operate a new dairy cattle facility at 990 head, of which 990 head are milking cows in Eastland County, Texas. The notice of intent was recevied to TCEQ on October 24, 2011. No discharge of pollutants into the waters in the state is authorized by this general permit except under chronic or catastrophic rainfall conditions or events. All waste and wastewater will be beneficially used on agricultural land.

The facility will be located approximately 1.1 miles north of the intersection of Farm-to-Market Road 2214 and County Road 488, on County Road 488, in Eastland County, Texas. The facility will be located in the drainage area of Leon River Below Lake Leon Reservior in Segment No. 1223 of the Brazos River Basin.

Hybrid Cars: The Performance Cars of the Future

(NU) - When most people think of hybrid cars, they imagine practical, mild-mannered vehicles. But could we someday see hybrid racecars burning up the

In March of 2010, Porsche (www.porsche.com/usa/) un-veiled three hybrids at the Geneva Auto Show: one for the road; one for the race track; and one that is a genuine Porsche supercar. These innovative new Porsches - the Cayenne S Hybrid, the 911 GT3 R Hybrid and the 918 Spyder - show that hybrids can be sporty, fast and pow

The Cayenne S, Porsche's first production hybrid car, features a sophisticated parallel full hybrid system with the combined power of a 380 horsepower V6 combustion engine and an electric motor. The car has the potential to significantly enhance fuel economy at high speeds -when the driver lifts off the accelerator at cruising or highway speeds, the gasoline engine can be switched off and disengaged from the drivetrain. This enables the vehicle to move without com-

bustion or electric power.

The GT3 R's innovative hybrid technology has been developed especially for racing. The front axle features two powerful electric motors that supplement the car's 480 horsepower, naturally aspirated four-liter flat-six that drives the rear wheels. Instead of the heavy batteries found in hybrid road cars, an electrical flywheel power generator resides

next to the driver to deliver energy to the electric motors. The 911 GT3 R Hybrid competed in the 24 Hours on the Nordschleife of Nürburgring in May 2010, leading for eight hours before retiring after 22 hours and 15 minutes for mechanical reasons. In the 2010 Petit Le Mans at Road Atlanta it finished 18th out of a starting

field of 41 cars. With the 918 Spyder high-performance mid-engine concept hy-brid sports car, Porsche is displaying its expertise in the field of highly efficient and low-emis-sion drive technology. The 918 Spyder prototype with plug-in hybrid technology combines high technology recombines high-tech performance features with electric mobility to produce a fascinating range of qualities. It has an ultra-compact car's emission levels of 70 grams of CO₂ per kilometer, and it consumes just three liters of fuel per 100 kilometers, but can go from 0 to 62 mph in just under 3.2 seconds and reach a top track speed over
