Eastland County Burn Ban Starts July 9th

STATE OF TEXAS)
COUNTY OF EASTLAND)
ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING
WHEREAS, The Commissioners Court has determined that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;
IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Eastland County that all outdoor burning is banned in the unincorporated area of the county to begin July 9, 2012, at 8:00 a.m., for 90 days from the adoption of this Order, the same being October 7, 2012, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; or (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.
In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081(h), a violation of this Order is a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00
Adopted this 9th day of July, 2012, by a vote of 5 Ayes and 0 nays.

From Abilene : Drive East on I-20 to Eastland Exit 340, then South on Hwy 6 to Gorman

Registration opens at 7:00 a.m. at the City Park (Right at the blinking yellow light on Hwy. 6, then 4 blocks to downtown).

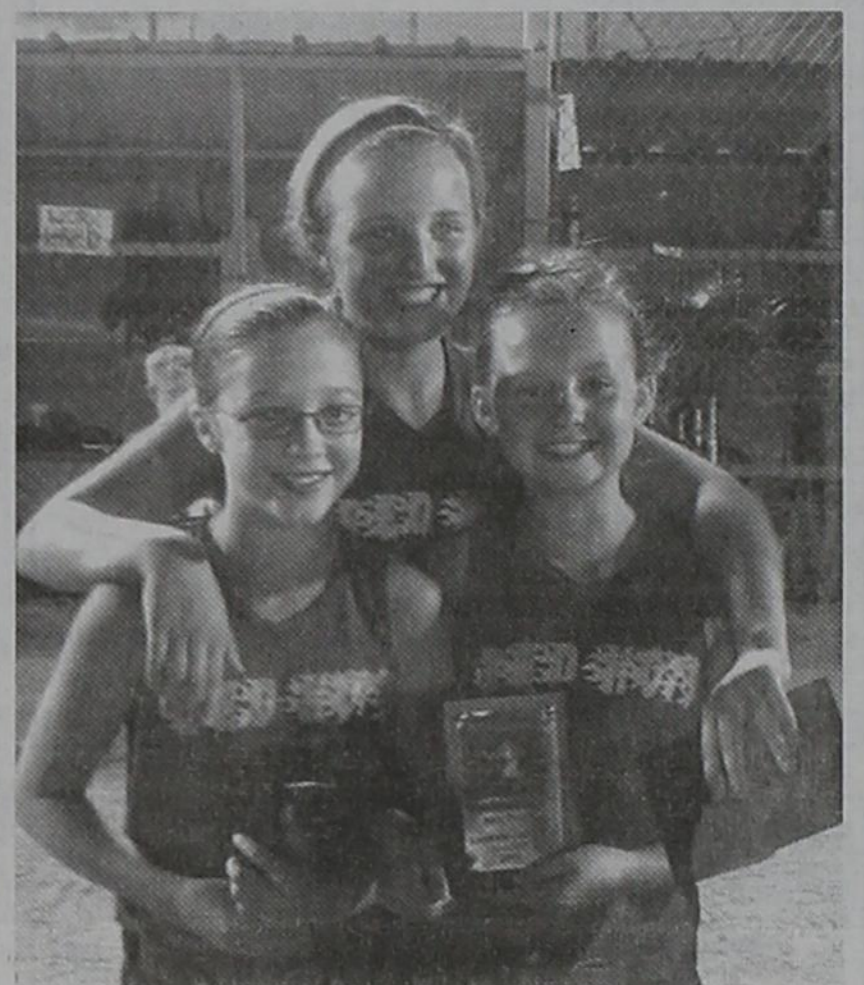

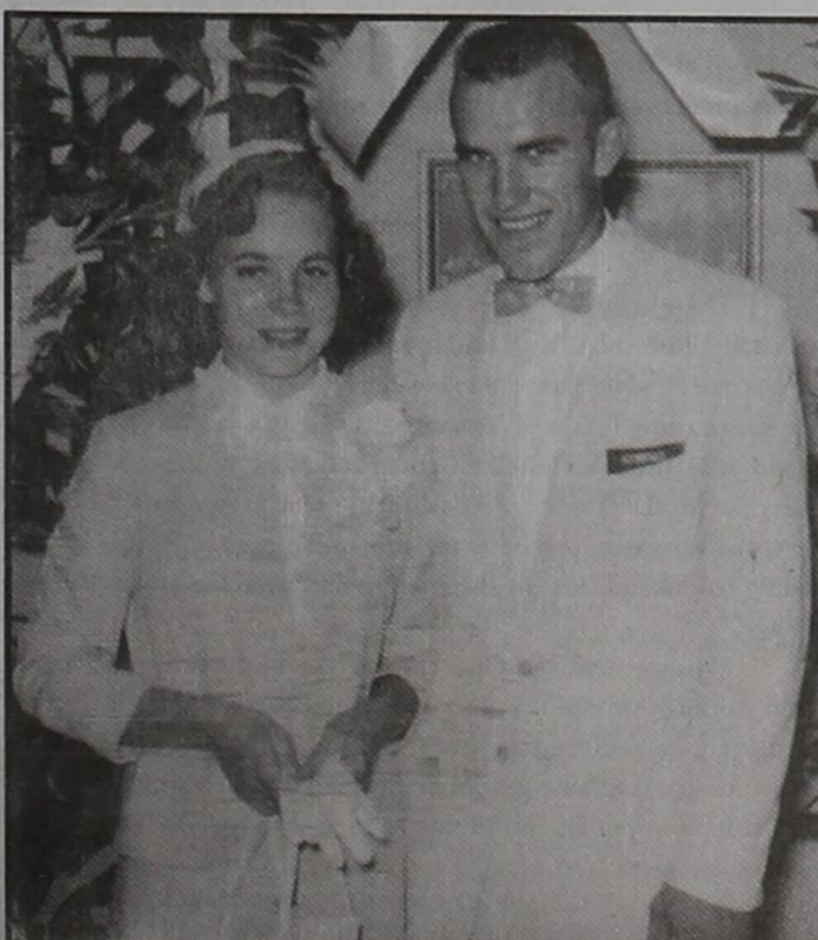

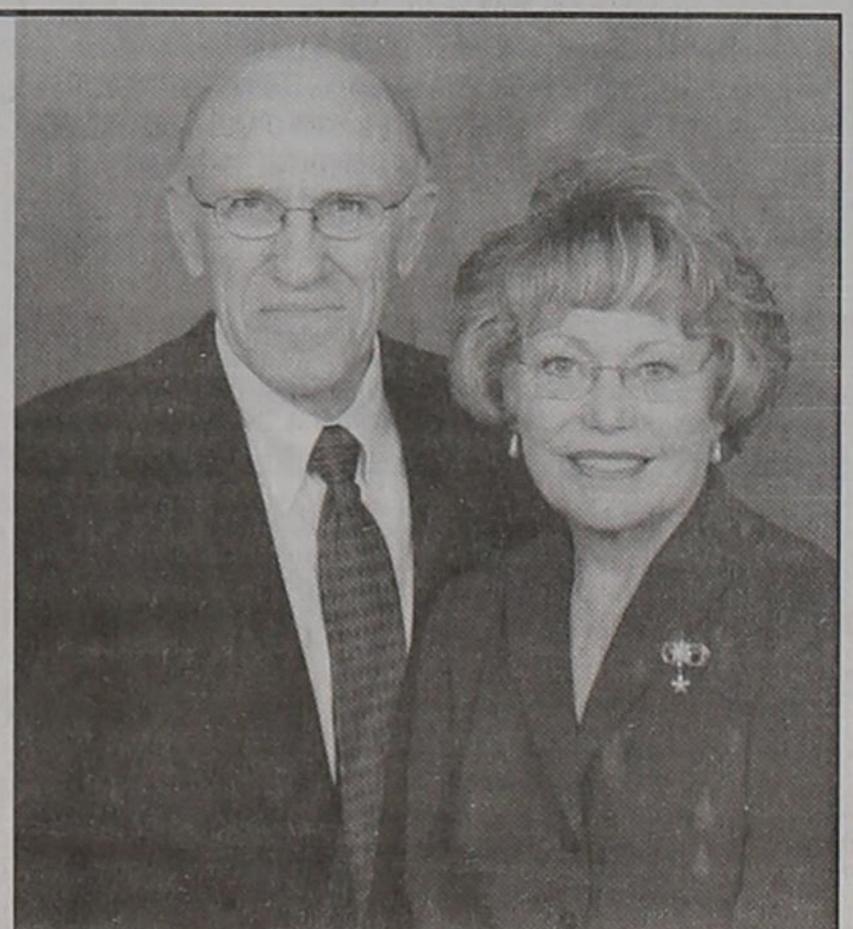

The Great Flavored Milk Debate

(NU) - A great debate has been building for the past five years in school districts across the country: Is flavored milk contributing to childhood obesity, and should it be taken out of schools? Facts, research and experts say no. Flavored milk contains the same nine essential nutrients as white milk, including calcium, vitamin D and potassium, three nutrients that children aren't getting enough of, according to the 2010 Dietary Guidelines for Americans.



Chocolate milk offers similar nutritional value as regular milk.

"On average, flavored milk accounts for only 2 percent of total calories and 3 percent of all added sugars in kids' diets. But studies show that schools see a severe drop in milk consumption when chocolate milk is taken away," says Alyssa Greenstein, a registered dietitian with the Dairy Council of Florida. "And the nutrients lost from not consuming enough milk aren't easy or affordable to replace." Research finds that low-fat chocolate milk is the most widely chosen milk option in schools, and despite the availability of white milk, children will turn to sodas and fruit drinks if flavored milk is removed from cafeterias. Sodas are the main source of added sugar in children's diets, and unlike milk, they offer no nutritional value. Many nutrition and health organizations - including the American Heart Association, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Dietetic Association and the School Nutrition Association - agree that flavored milk is

a healthier alternative to soft drinks and a vital part of meeting the dietary needs of youngsters. "If children don't drink milk with lunch, it becomes almost impossible for them to consume the daily intake of calcium, vitamin D and potassium, which are nutrients of concern as it is," says Greenstein. Drinking flavored milk is a small but significant contributor to a child's total milk consumption, and it doesn't mean youngsters neglect white milk. In fact, flavored milk makes up only 20-26 percent of kids' total milk intake. A recent survey of 1,000 moms discovered more than half opposed any school district decision to eliminate chocolate milk from the menu. In the past five years, milk processors nationwide have made significant nutritional changes in milk formulations. With 38 percent less added sugar, flavored milk is projected to contain, on average, just 31 calories more than white milk. Commitment To Education

As a state; we pay our teachers well below the national average; and yet we pay 90 million dollars for our students to take the TAKS and now the STAAR test. If we can not afford to pay teachers a more competitive salary, and we have to cut the education budget here in the state, how can we justify 90 million dollars spent on a test that is doing more harm than good to our children's education? Mayor Ervin had met with representatives from Staff Water Board and TRWB. He returned with paper work which has to be filled out by the City for the required CCR. No action was taken.

No action was taken on item 9.

The Mayor, Joe, and Dylan discussed at the length and Joe made the motion that there would be no use of City equipment by employees for personal use. Equipment is for City business only. Dylan made a second. Motion carried. Community service will be allowed the use of City equipment as it is for City property improvements.

Tacy reported that the water tower repairs were the reason for being over budget on the Systems side. The grant proceeds that were spent prior to closing with USDA were the reason the General operating side was over budget. Joe made a motion to amend the 2011-12 actual budget. Dylan made a second, motion carried.

There being no further business for discussion Dylan made the motion to adjourn with a second from Joe. Motion carried, time was 6:20 p.m.

Baby Boomers: Don't Let Osteoarthritis Slow You Down

(NU) - Osteoarthritis affects an estimated 27 million Americans and is the most common type of arthritis. Women over the age of 50 have a greater risk of suffering from osteoarthritis than men of the same age. In fact, women overall are more likely to experience a decrease in their activity level.



Women over 50 are more likely to decrease their activity level than men.

With osteoarthritis, the tissue that serves as a 'cushion' between joints breaks down and causes the joints to rub together. This can result in chronic pain, stiffness, and decreased mobility. Chronic pain can be one of the most difficult parts of dealing with osteoarthritis, and it can get in the way of routine activities that make life rich and fulfilling - such as working, driving, shopping or even hugging a grandchild. A majority of people with osteoarthritis say it is difficult to be physically active. This puts them at risk for other medical problems, such as heart disease, diabetes and weight gain.

"For many individuals, the main goal is to effectively treat the symptoms of osteoarthritis and stay active," says Society for Women's Health Research spokesperson Carmen Green, M.D., Professor of Anesthesiology and Obstetrics and Gynecology, and Associate Professor of Health Management and Policy at the University of Michigan. "Treatment may include a mix of physical therapy, acupuncture, massage and prescription pain medications, including over-the-counter products, anti-inflamma-

tory drugs and opioid medications."

Experts believe the sooner osteoarthritis is diagnosed and treated, the better the chances are of preventing it from getting worse. Those battling osteoarthritis should see a doctor about managing their pain. They - and their caregivers - should also learn as much as they can and be actively involved in their own treatment plan.

Hybrid Cars: The Performance Cars of the Future

(NU) - When most people think of hybrid cars, they imagine practical, mild-mannered vehicles. But could we someday see hybrid racecars burning up the tracks?



Hybrid cars can hold their own on the racetrack.

In March of 2010, Porsche (www.porsche.com/usa/) unveiled three hybrids at the Geneva Auto Show: one for the road; one for the race track; and one that is a genuine Porsche supercar. These innovative new Porsches - the Cayenne S Hybrid, the 911 GT3 R Hybrid and the 918 Spyder - show that hybrids can be sporty, fast and powerful.

The Cayenne S, Porsche's first production hybrid car, features a sophisticated parallel full hybrid system with the combined power of a 380-horsepower V6 combustion engine and an electric motor. The car has the potential to significantly enhance fuel economy at high speeds - when the driver lifts off the accelerator at cruising or highway speeds, the gasoline engine can be switched off and disengaged from the drivetrain. This enables the vehicle to move without combustion or electric power.

The GT3 R's innovative hybrid technology has been developed especially for racing. The front axle features two powerful electric motors that supplement the car's 480-horsepower, naturally aspirated four-liter flat-six that drives the rear wheels. Instead of the heavy batteries found in hybrid road cars, an electrical flywheel power generator resides

next to the driver to deliver energy to the electric motors. The 911 GT3 R Hybrid competed in the 24 Hours of the Nordschleife of Nürburgring in May 2010, leading for eight hours before retiring after 22 hours and 15 minutes for mechanical reasons. In the 2010 Petit Le Mans at Road Atlanta it finished 18th out of a starting field of 41 cars.

With the 918 Spyder high-performance mid-engine concept hybrid sports car, Porsche is displaying its expertise in the field of highly efficient and low-emission drive technology. The 918 Spyder prototype with plug-in hybrid technology combines high-tech performance features with electric mobility to produce a fascinating range of qualities. It has an ultra-compact car's emission levels of 70 grams of CO₂ per kilometer, and it consumes just three liters of fuel per 100 kilometers, but can go from 0 to 62 mph in just under 3.2 seconds and reach a top track speed over 198 mph.

Commitment To Education

The educational system of Texas is on life support. Our actions in the near future will determine whether it lives or dies. Due to "No Child Left Behind" and our legislators; our teachers have become tutors to the TAKS and now the STAAR, as well as proctors for bench mark testing, and mandatory testing. Mandatory assessment testing and preparation consumes nearly half of our students allotted instructional time. In its original intent, the mandatory tests were supposed to be an evaluation of where our students were, and where we needed to direct them with the states educational curriculum. Many districts resisted the "teaching to a test" approach; until funding and evaluations became tied to the scores. The days of preparing a student for college or the work force have been replaced with taking a standardized test.

When the system fails, and the lynch mobs begin to point fingers, searching for the culprits, who is to blame? Unfortunately, I'm afraid many of the accusations will be aimed at the teachers, and the local districts. While there may be teachers, and districts that are less than stellar, they are few and far between. Many of our teachers are sincere, caring people, who feel a sense of reward in educating a child. Those who should answer to the questioning are those on the front line who have made the decisions to put our children and our schools in this position. Our legislators made the rules the schools have had to play by. Our legislators turned the TAAS into the TAKS, and into the STAAR; growing a billion dollar business for those in the testing and curriculum business, while the education of our children has been put on the back burner. These same legislators agree that it is important to spend more money per inmate, than we do per student. How can we justify this, and claim that education is a priority? Common sense tells me that if this was reversed, we might not need so many prisons! In an election cycle, we also elect members of the Texas Board of Education. How many can you name? Do you remember who you voted for in the last cycle? We, as voters have to make educated choices in our elected officials. We have to put people in place whose priority is education. While planning our state curriculum, did Austin ever ask businessmen what type of education would prepare our students for the modern industrial and professional world? Did they ask for input from our teachers?

As parents, we live in a world that demands a great deal of us. We are constantly faced with a mortgage, rent, food, gas, and assorted other bills in a tough economy; while trying to balance being a parent. Honestly, the one common place of neglect and failure is with our children. Many students go about their education without the support and encouragement of their parent or parents. Many of these students; unless they are highly motivated, will do the minimum it takes to pass. Do not blame the teacher if half of your child's educational life is abandoned. The teacher can not be both teacher and parent to our children.

As a community, we have the obligation and privilege to educate our children. Many policies are passed down from Washington and Austin that are mandatory; often without any funding to implement the policy. Local school boards must strive to provide the absolute best possible for our students. This means leaving behind personal agendas, and doing "the right thing" each time a decision is made. School boards must abide by the rules and regulations governing them; such as the open meetings act, nepotism and not discriminate due to race or religion. We must "cross our T's and dot our I's for the sake of our students, and our community.

There are many reasons contributing to the decline of our educational system; from legislators playing politics, to parents failing in the basic parental skills. We must begin on the road to repair the system, or face certain failure. We can point fingers and disagree on causes and problems; but please don't blame the teacher!

House Agriculture Committee Set to Act on 2012 Farm Bill

On Wednesday, the House Agriculture Committee will begin debate on the 2012 Farm Bill. The House bill has some key differences from the version passed by the Senate. It saves \$35.1 billion dollars, which is \$11 billion more than the Senate bill. The House bill achieves those savings while still providing a safety net for all farmers to ensure that a few bad seasons don't devastate their business. Those savings are critical in our current budget crisis. We're eliminating direct payments to farmers and moving to a more market-oriented program of crop insurance. We're also improving the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), otherwise known as food stamps. By limiting loopholes and tightening eligibility requirements, we can save \$16 billion dollars over ten years without taking a single calorie off the plate of someone who truly qualifies based on financial need. House to Vote to Repeal Obamacare

On Wednesday, the House will vote on the Repeal of Obamacare Act. The American people have voiced their opposition to Obamacare loud and clear, and House Republicans are listening. Unfortunately, that opposition falls on deaf ears in the Senate, which has refused to vote on over 30 bills to repeal part or all of Obamacare when sent over from the House. I will continue to remain a vocal opponent of Obamacare until it can be fully repealed. Help Young Children Maintain A Healthy Weight

Three simple routines can help young children maintain a healthy weight. Recent research published suggests that preschool children who eat their dinner meal as a family, get at least 10 1/2 hours of sleep each night, and limit screen-time to 2 hours or less per day were less likely to be obese than other children.

"Young children who eat meals prepared at home, in accordance to MyPyramid for preschoolers, have a better diet quality and are more likely to eat sensible portions sizes when eating out," said Dr. Robinson, Registered Dietitian and Nutrition Specialist with the Texas AgriLife Extension Service. Family meals also allow for role modeling and parent child discussion time about the role of food in children's growth and health.

Both adults and children can benefit from a good night's sleep. Emerging research suggests that adequate sleep is important to not only maintaining health, but optimal weight as well for both adults and children. While the relationship between healthful weight and adequate sleep may remain elusive - getting a good night's sleep is a sound practice for everyone. The sleep recommendation for preschoolers is at least 10 1/2 hours each night.

Children who limit their screen time (time spent watching TV, DVD, computer and playing sedentary video games) are less likely to be overweight than other young children who get more screen time. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that young children limit their screen time to no more than 2 hours per day.

These three (3) simple house rules can make a big difference to your child's health:

- * enjoying dinner as a family affair,
- * getting a good night's sleep, and
- * limiting screen time.
