Eastland County Judge Lifts Burn Ban

TO: ALL UNITS AND STATIONS: BURN BAN LIFTED

EASTLAND COUNTY JUDGE LIFTS BURNING BAN

On Monday, October 1, 2012, after receiving information from other knowledgeable sources, the County Judge decided to remove the OUTSIDE BURNING BAN in Eastland County with the stipulation and request that anyone intending to plan and execute any type of outside burning, please contact Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch (254) 629-1728 and their nearest fire department to notify them of the time and location of the outside burning activity, with no fire being started if there is 15 MPH wind speed or above. Plese use extreme caution with any outside burning! The County Judge may rescind the Order Restricting Outdoor Burning upon a determination that the circumstances that required the Order no longer exists.

In making this announcement, the Commissioner's Court expressed its appreciation to the various fire fighters, fire departments, and all other citizens of Eastland County who cooperated so diligently in helping to alleviate the emergency condition of dangerous wild fire.

It is hereby ordered by the County Judge that the outside burning ban in Eastland County be removed effective immediately.

In down pours and deluges of rain on Friday night at Cross Plains, the Buffaloes sunk the Panthers 26-0 in the district opener for both teams. The Panthers were hampered with some injuries, but just couldn't stop the running of Blake Hutchins, 200 lb. Senior running back who carried 21 times for 218 yards. The Panthers trailed 8-0 at the intermission, then allowed 18 more points in the final two quarters.

Cross Plains scored first on their fourth possession when they took the ball at the Gorman 17 and scored in just 2 plays with Justin Willis getting the final 15 on a run with 9:12 left in the second period. A pass play added the 2 pointer and the Buffs were up 8-0.

There were no halftime activities due to the inclement weather.

On their first possession in the third period the Buffs took the ball on their own 12 and scored in 10 plays with Blake Hutchins running in from 9 yards out with 4:04 left in the third. The kick for point failed and the score was 14-0.

Then after the Panthers fumbled the ball on the Gorman 42 the Buffs scored in 6 plays with Hutchins getting the final 17 on a run with 1:06 left in the third. The kick try failed and the score was 20-0.


The game was played with no scoring again with the Buffs got another Panther fumble on the Gorman 30 and scored in 14 plays with Willis getting the final 12 yards on a run with 2:20 left in the game. Again the point try failed and the final score was

B. J. Ramirez gained 48 yards on 10 carries despite an injury. Zach Carlton got 28 on 11 keepers. Dakota Pacheco had 17 on 4 and Rylan Laminack carried 1 time for 7 yards.

Obituary

Thomas Harrison

Thomas Harrison passed away on September 22, 2012 in Tyler, Texas at the age of 72. Thomas was the only child born to Clarence and Edwina (Wedin) Harrison on June 4, 1940 in Palestine, Texas. He attended Palestine High School and Lee Junior College.

Thomas resided near Gorman, Texas where he was active in the community over four decades. He was co-owner and President of A. O. Easley Trucks. Thomas was a member of Walston Springs Baptist Church

since childhood, but worshiped with his family at the First United Methodist Church of Gorman most of his adult life. It was at Gorman UMC where he previously served as Youth Director and Youth Sunday School Teacher. He was currently seated as Chairperson to the Board of Trustees for the church.

He previously served as Gorman High School Senior Class Sponsor on multiple occasions, the Gorman City Council and past officer for the Gorman Chamber of Commerce. Thomas was a 32nd Degree York Rite Mason. He was active in the Masonic Lodges at both Gorman and De Leon. He helped organize and served as President for the Post Oak Gun Club. Thomas went on to co-found the 2nd Texas Frontier SCV Camp #1904 in De Leon and, passionately, served as the Camp's only Commander until the time of his death. He also served on the state level as SCV 2nd Lieutenant Commander for the 7th Brigade-Texas Division.

Thomas was a beloved family man that enjoyed spending time hunting, camping, fishing, shooting, gardening and leather work. He also had interests in genealogy, history and politics.

He is survived by his wife of fifty years, Betty (Easley); his son, Rhett and wife, Tessa, of Stephenville; grandson, Thomas Robert; and mother-in-law, Irene Easley, of Gorman.

Thomas was devout in his Christian Faith. He was a man of extreme dedication, conviction and virtue. He was known as person of action and led his life by example. Thomas' greatest characteristic was that he not only knew his principles; he fought for them.

A Memorial Service will be held 2 PM on October 7th at The First Methodist Church in Gorman. There will be a musket and cannon salute immediately following the service. Thomas was laid to rest on his ranch near Gorman in a private family ceremony. No graveside services will be conducted.

on The Wilder Side"

I remember seeing a piece of artwork that perfectly DATE describes the state of Christianity in the world. On one side Oct. 6 of the piece was a cannon and a group of Christians on an Oct. 8 island. These Christians were holding balloons with words Oct. 9 like "love", "peace", and "grace" and the word "God" was Oct. 13 Saturday Lingleville written on their crumbling island showing that God was their foundation. On the other side of the piece was another group on another island. If I recall, the world "the world" was written on their island and they were holding balloons that said "abortion", "adultery", "murder", etc. Both groups had their cannons pointed at each other. The Christians aimed their cannons at the world's balloons (sins) but the worldly group aimed at the Christians' foundation (God).

I wish I could remember who drew it and I would love to see it again because it so perfectly describes the Christian's predicament today. While we are busy preaching against sin, unbelievers are taking shots at our foundation. From the looks of it, the world was doing a pretty good job at shooting out the ground we stand on.

If this is indeed the situation, what then should we do? Should we stop preaching against sin? I'm not convinced that would do much good. We deceive ourselves by calling America a Christian nation but in truth we are a godless nation with a few remaining Christian values. We have come to expect the world to live like Christians but the truth is that Christ only expects His followers to live up to His standards. So I really don't think it is practical or even Biblical to expect non-Christians to live up to Christian standards.

But one thing I am convinced we should do is defend our faith when attacked. Jesus said to be on guard by false teachers who come as wolves in sheep's clothing (Matt 7:5). These wolves might look like Christians, but "by their fruit you will know them" (Matt 7:16). In the end, Gal 6:7 says "Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows."







This reporter would like to say "Hello" to a Classmate, Alla Rae (Friday) Kelley and husband, Pete in Sealy, Texas. They are semi retired.


June and Alla Rae are first cousins as their mothers, Eula and Mary Alice were sisters - also their brother was "Bud" Wisdom.


Our area received a wonderful rain in past few days. Jakehamon Community got five inches of rain.

Gorman City Minutes

AUGUST 16, 2012

The Gorman City Commission met on the above date. Those present were Mayor Robert Ervin, Commissioners Dylan Cogburn, Joe Casey, Kenneth Good, and David Stanley. Also present were Barbara Fenley, Billy Carson, Richard Watson and numerous others, (see attachment).

Kenneth led the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge.

Mayor Ervin called the meeting to order @ 5:35 p.m.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting were read. David made the motion to approve the minutes with a second from Dylan. Motion carried 4-0.

Joe made the motion to approve payment of the bills including the contribution to GISD. David made a second. Motion carried 4-0.

Joe explicitly stated that each department credit cards be kept in the vault at all times. These cards should only be in the hands of employees when it is necessary to travel for educational purposes, or travel involving city business or other city related needs by the employee. This card is not an employee issued benefit. This has already been addressed in the past, but Joe and Kenneth wanted this noted and expressed again.

Richard Watson requested to address the City Commission in regards to the legal sale of alcohol being placed on the ballot of the upcoming election. Mr. Watson expressed opposition for this. Numerous were in attendance to support Mr. Watson. These individuals are named on the attached sheet. Mr. Watson had submitted a letter earlier via certified mail, addressing the issue of the petition of signatures. In his letter he stated that the signatures were not valid due to the fact that six individuals used a PO Box for an address rather than the fiscal address or street address. This is in the Texas Election Code Section 501.031(b). Mr. Watson had also sent a copy of this letter to the City's attorney Pat Chesser. The Commission responded to Mr. Watson's request in the next agenda item. (Item #8)

Sandra Cagle and Tacy had been over the petition of signatures at the court house numerous times. Sandra and Tacy were instructed by a different individual at the Sec. of State's office if the PO box could be matched to the street address by the information on the voters registration it could be accepted. The City Attorney Pat Chesser composed a letter corresponding and advising that the City of Gorman NOT order the election calling for the legal sale of alcoholic beverage for off the premise consumption. Due to the information and advise of attorney, David made the motion to Not order the election for the sale of alcohol on the November election ballot. Kenneth made a second to the motion. Motion carried 4-0. (Item #9)

Resuming agenda order Kenny Welch asked if anyone had submitted bids on the upgrading and remodeling of the Community Center. He added that an upgrade would sure improve the facility as it was showing signs of much use and aging. We responded that no bids have been submitted to do this project.

No discussion on item #7.

The Commissioners and Mayor were given copies of Ordinances # 230 and #225. David requested that these be taken home and more carefully reviewed for any amendment changes. No action was taken.

Tacy read the results of the 2012 Effective Tax Rate and the Rollback Rate as were published in the Gorman Progress. After discussion and debate David made the motion to set the 2012 Ad Valorum Tax Rate @ 1.0500/\$100. Dylan made a second to the motion. Motion carried 4-0.

The 2012 rate will not increase nor will it decrease.

The 1st reading of Ordinance #2012-02 the 2012 Tax Ordinance was read with the rate of 1.0500/\$100.

David wanted to ensure that the Commission was aware that one of the citations written in regards to the keeping of animals would be going to trial. A trial date has not yet been set, but the Commission will be notified as soon as the date is decided upon. A defined course of action will be presented to the Commission at that time.

Kenneth requested that each commissioner, and the mayor consider a 4 Way Stop sign at the intersection of Kent and Roberts, and put this on the next agenda.

There being no further agenda items for consideration, David made the motion to adjourn with a second from Joe. Motion carried 4-0, time was 6:45 p.m.

SEPTEMBER 6, 2012

The Gorman City Commission met on the above date. Those present were Mayor Robert Ervin, Commissioners David Stanley, Kenneth Good, Joe Casey and Dylan Cogburn. Also present were Barbara Fenley and Billy Carson.

Joe led the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge.

Mayor Ervin called the meeting to order @ 5:30 p.m.

Tacy read the minutes of the previous meeting please be noted that paragraph 6 was discussed at the August 02, 2012 meeting but not noted in the meeting and a correction was needed in paragraph 8 on grammar. David made the motion to approve the minutes with these notations and corrections with a second from Dylan. Motion carried 4-0.

Joe made the motion to approve the bills for payment. David made the second. Motion carried 4-0. The Mayor and Commission discussed the water line project for Highway 8 and on to Desdemona and the water tower maintenance / repairs will be on hold til further news from grant application and process. Also briefly discussed were repairs needed at the swimming pool before next year.

David made the motion to amend the 2012-13 budget for the City of Gorman to reflect a 3% raise to the full time employees. Dylan made a second to the motion. Motion carried 4-0.

In lieu of voting for one of the candidates listed on the TM L Ballot of Trustee Election, David made the SECTION 8: Every person convicted of a misdemeanor for a violation of any of the provisions of the ordinance shall be punished for by a fine of not less than ONE DOLLAR (\$1.00) nor more than FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$500.00). Kenneth made a second. Motion carried 4-0. Amendments for Ordinance #225 are tabled. Need more details and attorney advise.

No action was taken on the TXU Energy Rate / Contract.

After the 2nd reading of Ordinance #2012-02, City of Gorman Tax Ordinance for Ad Valorum Taxes, Joe made the motion to pass, approve and adopt this said ordinance with a second from David. Motion carried

Kenneth made a motion to put a 4-way Stop sign in at corner of Kent / Roberts. Motion died for lack

There being no further agenda items for discussion David made the motion to adjourn with a second from Dylan. Motion carried 4-0, time was 6:40 p.m.

FSA Prepares to Issue CRP and DCP Payments

October 02, 2012 - Eastland County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director John Bird announced that FSA will issue Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) payments during the first few weeks of October.

"FSA will issue the payments timely as long as all producer eligibility

requirements are met," said Bird. CRP and DCP payments could be affected if producers have not submitted the required Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) forms. Affected producers will need to submit the proper AGI forms before payments can be issued. In addition, producers who signed up for CRP emergency haying and grazing and did not pay in advance will notice that their annual rental payment was reduced by the

acreage that was hayed or grazed. Producers who were affected by county office consolidations will not experience payment delays. All county office payments, regardless of consolidations, will be generated at the same time as long as all other eligibility requirements are met.
