For this reason Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbockorganization, is reminding producers of the "anniversary loan" which became available for the first time in 1971, Under this program growers can secure a Commodity Credit Corporation loan and retain title to their cotton for 10 months from the first day of the month in which the loan was made. Final date for loan applications on 1971 crop cotton is May 31, 1972,

The cut-off date for cotton loan applications under previous program was April 30, then CCC took title to all unredeemed cotton on the following July 31, the end of the cotton marketing year. This gave growers on the High Plains, where the bulk of the crop is harvested in December most years, only about seven months in which to find buyers for each year's crop.

Under the anniversary loan producers can retain title to cotton for a much longer period. For example growers taking a loan on cotton in May this year will have until February 1, 1973. to see if market conditions improve enough to permit sales at acceptable prices.

PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson said "This is exactly why we worked over two years to get the anniversary loan -- to give producers as much time as possible to take advantage of market fluctuations."

There are differences of opinion as to whether the market will strengthen over coming months for the kind of cotton now held by Plains growers. There was a strong demand for "low quality" cottons from the 1970-71 crop and again for earlyseason 1971-72 crop cottons, proving beyond doubt that there is a place in the market for low grade cotton stapling less than an inch and with low micronaire readings. Most observers agree that overproduction of these "cheaper" cottons in 19-71-72 is responsible in large part for the current lack of demand.

On the High Plains, where most of the nation's short staple cotton is grown, over 54 percent of the 1971-72 crop fell in the micronaire range of 2.9 and below. The previous fiveyear avarage of cotton in that category was less than 21 percent. And the same adverse weather conditions which caused low micronaire readings last

year also resulted in much lower grades of cotton than is normal from the Plains. "in short" Johnson states.


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




A History Of Bailey County

Pioneer Families

Mr. and Mrs. John D. Bayless

John D. Bayless came to Bailey County from Snyder, Texas in 1925. He and his parents, the John W. Baylesses came by Model-T Ford and settled down to farming on land they bought in the Longview community. On July 10, 1927, J.D. Bayless married Ellen Coffman.

The wedding ceremony was held in the home of her parents and was performed by Rev. C.F. Booth. Ellen and J.D. had six At the time of his marriage, J.D. was helping Mr. Coffman

make his crop, and was being paid \$1.50 a day. He had no car, but he did have a horse and saddle.

as a married man, he felt the need for a car, so he soon traded in the saddle for a striped-down Model T. Ford. It didn't have a windshield or a fender. J.D. bought a buggy seat from a junk dealer and built a box bed in the back.

Soon he and his wife set off for Spur, Texas to pick cotton. In the early days most pioneers had to work for others in order to establish their own stake.

Ellen remembers that "so much of the time the Model-T wouldn't start. I didn't know how to drive well enough to start it, so J.D. would harness up a horse to pull the car. Then I would lead the horse and run as fast as I could get the horse to go to try to get the Model-T started."

"One day our car (we called it "Hoppey") needed some work done on it, so I remember that we just turned it up on its side so my husband could get to it easier and get it

Ellen continues, "In the early days people were happy. They took the hard times as they came and when there was church once or twice a month, nearly everyone went." "We had a wood cook stove and a box heater. Corn and maize were so cheap you couldn't sell it to buy coal for the heater. So, we burned corn and maize in the stove and the

The Baylesses sold milk and cream to their neighbors. But the money they received from these sales was hardly enough to buy the flour and potatoes they needed.

Dry pinto beans were the staff of life in those days. In spite of hail storms, dust storms and sand storms, the Bayless family succeeded in making their farm into one of the most prosperous in the entire county.
