ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, The Commissioners Court has determined that circumstances present in all or part of the ncorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Eastland County that all outdoor burning is banned in the unincorporated area of the county to begin April 30, 2012, at 8:00 a.m., for 90 days from the adoption of this Order, the same being July 29, 2012, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; or (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081(h), a violation of this Order is a Class C Misde-

meanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00

arrest of Jason Dean Horn, 38 of Cisco. According to a witness, when Jason's brother, Joseph Evan Horn, 31 of Eastland got out of his car on West Patterson Street on the evening of April 4th, Jason reportedly struck his brother with is fists, causing Joseph to fall to the ground. After he fell, Jason reportedly kept punching and kicking his

brother until he lost consciousness. Then, Jason left the scene in a red 1997 GMC pickup with license BB94168.

Joseph was taken to the Eastland Memorial Hospital by ambulance, then was transferred to an Abilene Hospital with severe head injuries.

Investigating Officer Jacob C. Keierlber was told by a witness the assault may have occurred because Jason thought Joseph had been flirting with Jason's girlfriend.

The Panthers traveled to Goldthwaite on Tuesday the 17th and came up one run short on their bid to be the outright district champs in baseball. The Panthers scored 1 run in the 1st inning, and 2 runs in the 3rd inning. They left the bases loaded in both the 4th and 5th innings. Matt Fox, BJ Ramirez, and Dakota Pacheco each scored one run. Pacheco, Zach Carlton and Jon Fenley each had one RBI. Fenley lead the Panthers with a double and a single going 2-3 on the day. The Panthers out hit the Eagles, 6-5. The Eagles scored 2 runs in the 1st, one in the 5th and one in the bottom of the 7th inning. Dakota Pacheco recorded 9 strikeouts on the day and kept the Panthers in the game. FSA Allocates an Additional 400,000 **Acres For Wildlife Enhancement Initiative**

(COLLEGE STATION, TX) - April 24, 2012--USDA Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) Acting Executive Director, James B. Douglass today announced that FSA has allocated an additional 400,000 acres nationwide to the State Acres for Wildlife Enhancement (SAFE) program that improves habitat for high-priority wildlife species.

"SAFE is a voluntary conservation initiative that provides an opportunity for grassroots conservation partners to develop related projects to address high priority wildlife needs through habitat restoration," said Douglass.

SAFE project area proposals are being accepted for the purpose of improving habitats for the designated wildlife species in new areas as well as possibly expanding current SAFE project areas by requesting additional acreage. SAFE project sponsors must submit all project proposals as soon as possible as the State Technical Committee is scheduled to complete the proposal review process on May 23, 2012.

The Texas FSA State Committee will complete the final review and submit recommended

Various conservation practices currently offered under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) are fine-tuned through the SAFE proposal to improve, connect or create higher-quality wildlife habitats by promoting healthier ecosystems in the project areas identified as essential to the effective management of high priority wildlife species.

Douglass added, "Once a project proposal is approved and acreage allocated, the SAFE program is implemented through a continuous CRP signup allowing USDA to accept producer acreage offers year-round."

As with other Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) initiatives, the land and producer must meet certain eligibility requirements. Once approval of the SAFE project is announced, interested landowners can submit offers to voluntarily enroll qualifying acres in a SAFE project/CRP contract for a term of 10 to 15 years. In exchange, SAFE/CRP program participants receive annual rental payments, project incentives and cost-share assistance to establish habitat-enhancing natural covers on eligible land.

According to Douglass, Texas currently has 76,376 acres across the state enrolled in existing SAFE program project areas benefitting targeted wildlife species including the Lesser Prairie Chicken, the Ocelot and the Mottled Duck as well as other wildlife species that are present in the enhanced habitat.

Xerescaping, pronounced with a Z sound as in Xerox, is the practice of landscaping with plants that require very little water and maintenance. These landscapes in the past have been all but boring, using only cactus and rocks, but a modern xerescape can be colorful and intriguing. The best part of these designs is that they are very low maintenance. Watering these plants should be just the same as Mother Nature would in the dessert, a good flooding every once and a while. Xerescapes do not need regular pruning but will thrive when tall grasses are chopped bi-annually.

A few plants to consider are the Lantanas, which comes in many different varieties of colors that bloom from late spring through the summer. Native grasses are plants that Horticulturists have developed or altered to be transferred to a landscape. Often these are not taken directly from a field or prairie but are hybrids from their pastured ancestors. The choices are greater than just the common pampass grass, which can attract snakes. Purple Fountain Grass and Texas Sage bushes are a great choice to add color and texture.

SkillsUSA One Of The Best Kept Secrets In Texas

Competition is a staple of life in school. Athletic events, UIL academic tournaments, the performing arts, debate clubs, and farm and ranch contests all give students opportunities to earn credit toward graduation and gain lifelong skills that can't always be offered within the walls of a classroom.

Yet one of the best-kept secrets in our public schools is another competitive, hands-on program which prepares over a million Texas students for high-paying careers in specific, skilled trades. SkillsUSA, was founded in 1966 as Vocational Industrial Clubs of America and changed its name in 1999. It sends in skilled workers from various trades to train teachers and students alike on how to perform specialized work. Its goal is to prepare students for a future in a wide variety of trade, technical and skilled service occupations.

Easily recognizable by their bright red blazers at events, the students participate in competitions - featuring a wide variety of contests from graphic design to sheet metal assembly along with leadership conferences.

SkillsUSA includes with its masonry of career training programs ethical lessons. The students recite a creed that teaches the importance of education, fair play, the satisfaction of hard work, the American way of life, and having moral and spiritual standards.

"Forty-five years and not everyone knows about us," said Linda Holcombe, executive director of the Texas Industrial Vocational Association (which works with SkillsUSA to train career technology teachers). However, awareness of SkillsUSA is building in Texas. Holcombe said that one of the highlights of the year for their teachers and students occurs during the SkillsUSA-Texas Day at the state Capitol, where a mock legislative session is held.

The exposure at the Capitol is apparently paying off. "In 2007 ... we aligned 19 career and tech courses to fulfill the fourth

year of science and math," Holcombe said. "We've also created a career technology course for a speech credit, and another for a fine-arts credit." The organization recently wrapped up SkillsUSA Month in March, celebrated in many public schools. Holcombe said SkillsUSA saw a 10 percent membership increase over the past year. According to Holcombe, industry required certifications are tickets to well-paying jobs in specialized, high-tech fields.

"The certifications keep them from being ditch-diggers," Holcombe said. "They prepare them for the world of work because they get the training industries need." As one example, home construction courses offered through SkillsUSA do not simply train a student how to be a carpenter. Skills learned may lead to a career in architecture and structural engineering -- "not just hammering

in nails," she added. "Career technology is not the old shop class," she said. "If you're in class and just making ash trays for four years, it should be shut down! Schools need to be up to date with technology and the job market." Safety is another aspect of career technology training that can be applied to a wide variety of jobs. OSHA certifications are available for students at the entry level, which is a prerequisite in many manufacturing environments.

If you know a junior high or high school student who is interested in 3-D animation, plumbing, advertising art, cosmetology, radio production, firefighting, aircraft repair, drafting, cabinetry, commercial baking, machinery, collision repair, nurse assisting (there are so many I'll have to cut this list short), let them know about SkillsUSA - as well as the good-paying career opportunities that await in skilled labor fields.

TxDOT Launches Motorcycle Safety Campaign — Statewide Initiative Targets Drivers to Prevent Deadly Car/Motorcycle Crashes

AUSTIN—Motorcyclists are dying at alarming rates, so the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is asking motorists to pay closer attention to the growing number of Texans riding scooters and motorcycles on the roads and highways.

TxDOT's Share the Road (www.looklearnlive.org) motorcycle safety and public awareness campaign runs through mid-May and is designed to remind drivers to look twice for motorcycles, especially at intersections and when changing lanes where most of the collisions take place. In 2011, Texas had 470 motorcycle fatalities, 16 percent of the state's traffic deaths.

Seeing them is saving them is the theme of this year's Share the Road campaign, which uses radio and television public service announcements (PSAs) and outdoor billboards, both in English and Spanish to drive its safety message home.

Half of all fatal motorcycle crashes in Texas occur because the motorist never saw the motorcyclist. According to national statistics, a motorcyclist is five times more likely to be injured and 25 times more likely to die in a crash. In fact, 87 percent of motorcycle crashes result in the death or serious injury of the motorcyclist. This is because motorcycles have a much smaller profile than other vehicles, and it can be difficult for car and truck drivers to judge the speed and distance of an approaching bike. As a result, drivers involved in crashes with motorcycles often say they never saw the motorcyclist and could not react in time to prevent the crash.

"The number of motorcycles on Texas roadways has doubled to more than 419,000 in the last decade." said Carol Rawson, TxDOT's Traffic Operations director. "As more people turn to motorcycles for affordable transportation and recreation, it's more important than ever to remind drivers to be on the lookout."

TxDOT offers these safety tips for sharing the road with motorcycles:

- Look Twice: Especially watch for cyclists at intersections where they may be making a left turn, as well as on the highway where a motorcyclist may be changing lanes. Regularly check your rearview and side-view mirrors and clearly signal your intentions.
- Give Them Space: Don't follow a motorcycle too closely. A
 motorcyclist's riding patterns are different from vehicle patterns,
 and reactions may vary for the same road or weather conditions.
 Allow a full lane of travel space between your car or truck and a
 motorcycle.
- Anticipate Next Steps: Obstructions that drivers do not notice could prove to be deadly for a motorcyclist. Give motorcyclists plenty of space to react. This will help to make the road a safe place for you and others, no matter what form of transportation is used.

Robert Alton Brown of Fort Worth visited his parents, Robert and Ima Brown this past weekend and they attended the Cemetery Working on Saturday.


