#### Brownwood Wildfire Academy Aims To Prepare Firefighters

BROWNWOOD, Texas - After an unprecedented 2011 Texas wildfire season, firefighters looking to prepare for the next big blaze are invited to attend the 10th annual Central Texas Wildfire Academy on Feb. 17-20.

Sponsored by Texas Forest Service and Dam Volunteer Fire Department, the academy features wildland firefighting training for both paid and volunteer departments, as well as courses focusing on safety and fire operations in the wildland urban interface. A prescribed burn field exercise - allowing students to actually work on a fire - will be held if weather permits.

"The more training firefighters have, the safer they perform their tasks," said Texas Forest Service Resource Specialist Mary Leathers, an instructor at the academy. "Our role at Texas Forest Service is to train the initial attack responders to perform firefighting tasks in as safe a manner as possible so everybody goes home at the end of the day."

The cost to attend is \$60 per day, payable through a voucher system with the Rural Voluner Fire Department Assistance Program, a grant program funded by the state and administered by xas Forest Service. Breakfast and lunch are served for a combined \$15 per day. Free lodging in barracks is available on site at Camp Bowie in Brownwood.



## CRP General Sign-up Starts in March

The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is offering a general sign-up period from March 12 through April 6, 2012. CRP has successfully protected our natural resources while providing economic and environmental benefits to rural communities for the past 25 years.

Landowners enrolled in CRP receive annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish long-term, resource conserving covers on environmentally sensitive land. Land that is not currently enrolled in CRP can be offered during signup if all eligibility requirements are met. Offers for CRP contracts will be ranked according to the Environmental Benefits Index (EBI). Each eligible offer is ranked in comparison to all other offers and then a selection is made.

Nationwide, there are currently about 30 million acres enrolled in CRP and an estimated 6.5 million acres will expire on Sept. 30, 2012.







In you presently receive a residential homestead exemption, the status of your exemption remains the same and you do not have to reapply.

# Texans Can Claim Their Cash; Save for College at the Equipment Depot Mid-Tex Farm & Ranch Show Feb. 7-8

(WACO) — Texans who think or hope they might have some money waiting to be claimed from the state's Unclaimed Property List have a chance to search the list at the 41st Equipment Depot Mid-Tex Farm & Ranch Show on Feb. 7-8.

In addition, Texans will have the opportunity to enroll in the state's prepaid college tuition program, the Texas Tuition Promise Fund (TTPF). The TTPF enrollment period deadline is Feb. 29, 2012.

Staff members from the Texas Comptroller's Office Unclaimed Property Division will help citizens search for un-

claimed property online, fill out claim forms and answer questions about the unclaimed property program.

Unclaimed Property and TTPF representatives will be available from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 7 and from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Wednesday, Feb. 8, at the Extraco Events Center, in the Coliseum in booth 228, located at 4601 Bosque Blvd. in Waco.

"The current balance in the state's unclaimed property fund is around \$2.2 billion," said Texas Comptroller Susan Combs. "That money belongs to Texans and I know reclaiming it would make a difference to many people in challenging economic times. Through events like this one, we are reaching out to Texans and encouraging them to check the Unclaimed Property List often and claim their forgotten funds."

The Comptroller estimates one in four Texans has money waiting to be claimed. Unclaimed property includes forgotten utility deposits or other refunds, insurance proceeds, mineral interest or royalty payments, dormant bank accounts and abandoned safe deposit box contents. To search for unclaimed property any time, visit the Comptroller's unclaimed property website at www.ClaimItTexas.org or call (800) 654-FIND (3463).

A TTPF representative will discuss the advantages and enrollment opportunities for the state's prepaid tuition program, benefiting Texas parents who are interested in saving for their children's college education.

"Public college costs have risen rapidly during the past decade. It is important for Texas parents to have the opportunity to save for their children's college education with this prepaid tuition plan," Combs said.

The TTPF allows Texans to lock in the cost of undergraduate college tuition and required fees at Texas public colleges and universities, protecting against future tuition inflation.
