





"We all knew it was going to happen someday," said Eastland City Manager Ron Holliday, "but that didn't make it any more pleasant when the day finally rolled around."

Holliday was referencing the impending retirement of Eastland Police Chief Cecil Funderburgh who announced this week that August 31 will be his last day on the job he has held since 1990.

Funderburgh, a 31 1/2 year veteran of law enforcement received his Basic Peace Officer licensing in 1980 and will end his career with a Master Peace Officer certification and more than 2,400 Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Education (TCLEOSE) training hours. This does not include the many hundreds of additional hours of training he has received throughout his law enforcement career that are not counted towards his licensing. Some of those include training for Nationally Certified Floodplain Manager, a class C Waste Water license, Class D Water Distribution license, Amateur Radio Operator's license and many more.

Funderburgh served in the U.S. Air Force where he was a Navigational Aid and Communications Technician. He received extensive training in secret and top secret electronic devices, obtaining top secret and crypto secret security clearances in order to maintain and repair Nav-Aid and communications equipment.

This career led him to General Dynamics where he constructed scale models of aircraft, including the swept-wing F-111, for design and wind-tunnel testing. Here he obtained additional top secret clearance from the US government. He then moved to Bell Helicopter as an assembly line electronics installer. He later left this field and spent the next 20 or so years working on televisions, VCR's, and other consumer electronics for

After receiving his Peace Officer certification, Chief Funderburgh began his law enforcement career working for the City of Gorman, his hometown, where he left as that city's Chief of Police in 1990 to come to Eastland. He also served as an instructor for 20 years at the West Central Texas Law Enforcement Academy in Abilene where he taught Traffic Law, Traffic Collision investigation, Traffic Direction & Control and DWI.

While at the Eastland Police Department, Funderburgh has also served as the city's Code Enforcement supervisor, Emergency Management Coordinator, Floodplain Administrator, Crime Victim Liaison Officer and as Assistant City Manager from 1995-2001.

Funderburgh was instrumental in establishing the Eastland County Crisis Center in 1994 by successfully applying for a Community-Oriented Policing Service grant from the U.S. Department of Justice which got this organization off the ground. He has also served as a past coordinator of the Eastland County Crime Stoppers organization.

"Cecil has been a great asset to the city," said Eastland Mayor Mark Pipkin. "It will be a tough job finding someone with his training and knowledge to fill this position."

Back to School 2011:

New Legislation Mandates Shots For All

Abilene, TX, August 1, 2011 - As the summer break comes to an end, a new season of the year known as "back-toschool rush" is quickly ushered in as parents and children gear up for the 2011-2012 school year. Recent vaccination changes could hinder a child's ability to enter to school if they are not up to date. This includes all Texas college-bound students as well.

Over the past several years, Texas has phased in updated vaccination requirements that impacts children entering school for the first time as well as those entering the 7th grade. To ensure adequate protection updated Tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough), MMR (measles, mumps & rubella), varicella (chicken pox) and hepatitis A vaccinations may be required. Legislation passed earlier this year will now require all students entering Texas universities to have a current meningitis vaccination on file. Additionally, this year the CDC has begun recommending a booster dose of meningitis vaccine if 5 years have passed since the initial dose was administered.

"If you have any doubt as to whether or not your child needs vaccinations, it is best to consult with your child's doctor, local health department or visit the Care Van vaccination clinic to ensure compliance" said Lynda Shirley, Program Manger for Caring for Children Foundation of Texas, "Early preparation will help you avoid the long lines and delayed appointments often experienced during the back-to-school rush."

Schools districts are preparing for a rush of students in need of vaccinations. The Abilene Care Van will be at the Medical Care Mission, 1857 Pine, Abilene, TX, August 4 and August 18 from 5PM to 7PM. All recommended and required vaccines offered are provided by the Texas Vaccine for Children Program. Eligible children include children with Medicaid, CHIP, those who have no insurance or have insurance that does not cover vaccines or well care. Parents must bring their child's immunization records. No appointment is necessary and child must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

New Simplified Vehicle Registration Fee Structure Starts In September

AUSTIN - A new system that standardizes and simplifies registration fees for nearly every vehicle owner in Texas begins September 1, 2011

Currently, Texas has 1,745 fee categories for registration. That number is being reduced to nine weight classifications. The simplified structure makes it easier for Texans to know what they owe, and reduces administrative Savior please call Bro. Barry, ask Bro. Barry to talk with you about being saved or just ask costs for the state, counties and private businesses.

"Under this new fee structure, Texas' registration fees are among the lowest when compared to the country's 12 largest states," said Executive Director Ed Serna of the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles. "At the same time this new, simplified fee structure will ensure the state does not lose any of its current registration revenue."

Registration fees contribute more than \$1 billion each year to the state highway fund, which is used to build and maintain Texas' roads and bridges. There are more than 21 million registered vehicles in Texas.

Car and truck owners whose vehicles weigh 6,000 pounds or less will pay a base vehicle registration fee of \$50.75. This is a slight reduction - about \$8 - from the previous registration fee for new vehicle owners, and a small increase - around \$10 - for those with older vehicles. "Whenever you make a fixed fee for everyone you have to look at creating some kind of middle number," Serna said.

Some Texans also will pay a new \$1 automation fee. This fee was assessed in Texas' largest 60 counties, but now applies statewide. The automation fee is used for improvements to the registration and titling computer system. Vehicle owners will continue to pay the \$1 Department of Public Safety fee for TexasSure, the electronic insurance verification program, and any local county fees.

"This creates consistency for every vehicle owner in the state," said Deborah Hunt, the Williamson County tax assessor-collector. "Vehicle owners will no longer have to contend with the fluctuations that were part of the previous fee schedule and no matter which of the 254 counties you live in or move to in Texas, the base state registration fee is going to be the same."

Fees being eliminated include the annual 30-cent reflectorization fee (used to purchase the reflective license plate sheeting) that was on every registration renewal, and the \$5 charge for license plate transfers. Texans who transfer their plates when they sell or trade in their vehicle to the new one they buy are protected from anyone running up toll charges or committing criminal activity that traces back to their name.

Those with heavy vehicles (more than 6,000 pounds) where registration fees were previously calculated by 100-pound weight increments in 1,600 fee categories will now find their registration fees fall into seven weight classifications.

"This fee modification will save time and money, positively affecting the more than 15,000 trucking companies across the state as well as the hundreds of thousands of professional truck drivers who live and work in Texas," said John D. Esparza, president and chief executive officer of the Texas Motor Transportation Association. "We are pleased that this new structure simplifies and standardizes a convoluted system and modernizes an outdated process.

'We applaud the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles for their diligence in overseeing this statewide update," he said.

Hunt said tax office customers also benefit. "To consolidate 1,600 fees down to seven helps business owners with fleets of trucks and auto dealerships as well as the average citizen," she said.

"The fee structure was so complex that these businesses needed to depend on tax office personnel to assist them in calculating their annual projected business expenditures," Hunt added. "By simplifying the fee structure, these businesses will be better able to determine their costs."

Anytime a service, whether fee simplification or online registration renewal, saves customers' time it also saves tax office resources, Hunt said.

Fees also change for trailer owners. The 75 different trailer categories, which include travel trailers, are reduced to one annual fee. It will cost \$45 to register any trailer or travel trailer up to 6,000 pounds.

This fee simplification structure was passed by the state legislature two years ago. It represents the first change in Texas' base vehicle registration fee since 1985.

The new law also standardizes the license plate replacement fee at \$6, and eliminates the fee for classic,

cotton, forestry, volunteer firefighter, tow truck, and radio operator license plates.

Brand Re-Registration Begins Aug. 30 in Texas - New Website Helps Guide Ranchers Through Re-Registration Process

FORT WORTH, TEXAS - The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TS-CRA) reminds ranchers that the next brand re-registration period opens Aug. 30, 2011 and concludes Feb. 29, 2012. The State of Texas requires that brands be re-registered in the county or counties where the owner operates.

Larry Gray, executive director of law enforcement at TSCRA, says that branding is the number one way to prevent livestock theft, a phenomenon that is happening more and more in

In 2010, the number of cattle reported missing or stolen to TSCRA was approximately 7,700, an increase of 220% from 2007.

TSCRA was established in 1877 to help prevent and solve agricultural crimes. Since then, the association's law enforcement division has expanded to include 29 special rangers stationed throughout Texas and Oklahoma who work alongside local law enforcement agencies to protect rural Texans against agricultural crimes, including livestock theft.

Although Texas does not have a statewide brand registry database, TSCRA has market inspectors stationed at 105 Texas livestock auctions that collect brands and other identifying marks on 4 million cattle sold annually. They report this information to TSCRA headquarters in Fort Worth, where it is entered into the nation's largest brand recording and retrieval system. This system currently houses more than 102,000 brands, the largest brand registry in the U.S.

This database is the first source checked when livestock is reported stolen, and has aided in the arrests of cattle thieves and the recovery of hundreds of thousands of stolen cattle.

Gray says that while Texas law does not require you to brand your cattle, he highly encourages it as a way to protect your business.

"When cattle are stolen, a rancher is losing much more than the value of that single animal or animals. They are losing the value of the offspring that animal would provide in the future," Gray

said. "In a way they are losing the factory." To help guide ranchers through the brand re-registration process, TSCRA has launched

www.tscrabrands.com. Working in conjunction with the 254 county clerk offices, this site provides all the necessary paperwork and information to register brands, as well as information on current brands, designing and reading brands.

USDA Reminds Producers of Sept. 1st Sales Closing Date for Noninsurable Crops

The USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director urges producers who want to buy coverage through the Noninsurable Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) to do so before the sales closing date of September 1, 2011.

NAP provides financial assistance to producers of noninsurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory or prevented planting occur due to normal disasters.

Purchasing a crop insurance policy is an easy way for producers to practice risk management. This year alone has proved that natural disasters can directly affect the profitability and recovery of agricultural operations.

The following crops have a NAP application closing date of Sept. 1, 2011: Small Grains (Wheat, Oats, Barley, Rye & Triticale), Beets, Broccoli, Brussel Sprouts, Cabbage, Canola, Cauliflower, Garlic, Sod Grass, Greens, Herbs, Kohlrabi, Leeks, Lettuce, Onions, Radishes, Strawberries, Turnips and Value Loss Crops (Christmas Trees, Crustaceans, Fin Fish, & flowers).

In order to meet eligibility requirements for NAP, crops must be noninsurable, commercially-produced agricultural commodity crops for which the catastrophic risk protection level of crop insurance is not available. If the Risk Management Agency (RMA) offers coverage for a crop in the county, then NAP coverage is not available for that crop.

In the event of a natural disaster, NAP covers the amount of loss greater than 50 percent of the expected production based on the approved yield and reported acreage.

Producers must file an application and service fee by the Sept. 1st deadline. The service fee is the lesser of \$250 per crop or \$750 per producer per administrative county, not to exceed a total of \$1,875 for a producer with farming interests in multiple counties.

Aug 11 (8/11) Serves as Reminder for Texas Residents to Always Call 8-1-1 Before Digging. It's the Law.

August 11, 2011, to be marked by Public Awareness events and community outreach throughout the state to promote the law to Call 8-1-1 Before You Dig, the requirement to allow 48 hours to have those underground lines marked, the responsibility to exercise caution within 18" of those marks, and to dig safely!

Austin, TX, August 11, 2011: The Texas Pipeline Awareness Alliance (TPAA) encourages the public to use this date on the calendar, 8/11, as an important reminder for residents to Call 8-1-1 prior to any digging project to have underground utility lines marked. Texas law requires a call to 8-1-1 before any excavation or digging occurs. Recognizing the potential for unintentional damage, danger and harm to persons and property, the Texas Railroad Commission, Texas pipeline regulartory body, reminds professional excavators and homeowners that a simple call to 8-1-1 in advance of any digging project saves time and money while keeping people safe and connected. Striking a single line can cause injury, repair costs, fines and inconvenient outages. Every digging project, no matter how large or small, requires a Call to 8-1-1. Installing a mailbox, building a deck, planting a tree and laying a patio are all examples of digging projects that need a Call to 8-1-1 before starting.

Texas is home to over 280,000 miles of pipelines, operated by over 1,200 companies; by far the largest pipeline infrastructure in the nation. Pipelines play a significant role in the oil, gas and petrochemicals industries contributing more than \$160 billion annually to the Texas economy. Texas is the largest producer of oil and natural gas in the United States and Texans consume the most energy in the country, both per capita and in total. Texas' pipelines are working every day to deliver that energy efficiently, safely and in an environmentally friendly way. Pipeline companies carefully build and maintain these lines and monitor their operations around-the-clock. Pipelines are safe and serious pipeline problems are rare, and in many cases, preventable. Yet, failure to call before digging results in over 15,000 unintentional hits and damage to pipeline infrastructure annually according to the Texas Railroad Commission. Although most were minor, some did require repair and even taking the line out of service, disrupting service to consumers and businesses. A simple call to 8-1-1 to have those lines marked could have prevented damage in many cases.
