Much Accomplished - But Much to Do

When the 104th Congress convened in January of 1995 , we had a rare pportunity to put government back in contact with what the meddling. I am pleased to report that we have filled the glass slightly more than half full.
At the top of Congress' agenda was a balanced budget Congress passed a seven-year balanced budget with significant tax cuts for the middle class. Although the President vetoed that bill, Congress has stayed within the limits. So if we can get entitlement reforms, we still will be able to reach a balanced badgel by 202.

Another important reform enacted was the Congressional Accountability Act, a measure requiring the Senate and the House of Representatives to comply with the sa
the law of the land.

And that was only the beginning. The 104th Congress has enacted sweeping welfare reform and gone one step toward moderating regulatory overkill. Unfunded mandates, those unreasonable decrees from the federal government forcing states and municipalities to establish programs which end up raising local taxes, have been banished
When you read this, the 104th
But this country still has, as the poet Robert Frost wrote ." promises to teep, and miles to go before I sleep." Much remains to be accomplished.
The first priority on my personal legislative agenda is the Balanced Budget Amendment. Our federal budget deficits and daunting debt continue to inflict an enormous amount of harm on the American people and the American economy. Ithas to the cend Congresses to pass and hold to a balanced budget.
Government borrows and spends money that would otherwise serve as capital needed for economic growth and job
tendency to spend so far beyond our means.
Yet at the same time, Americans continue to pay unreasosnably high taxes. The average two-parent working family of four now pays 38 percent of its incom.
$\$ 3$ earned.
Economic history shows we can enact tax cuts without devastating deficit-reduction efforts. We did it in the 1960 s under President Kennedy and in the '80s under President Reagan. On taxes, my agenda remains the same: an across-the-board 15 percent ax cut, a $\$ 500$ per child tax credit and repeal of the 1993 Social Security tax ncreases on seniors. The enactment this year of my Homemakers IRA, which income couples, goes a long way toward providing equity. Our next high priority item should be to do away with the "marriage penalty," which forces two-income married couples to pay higher taxes than if each were single. In addition to being patently unfair, this quirk in the tax law weakens one of the basic institutions of our society
