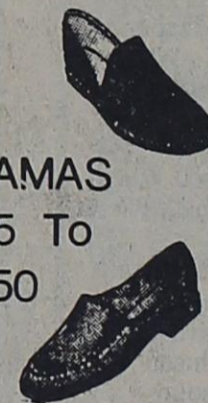

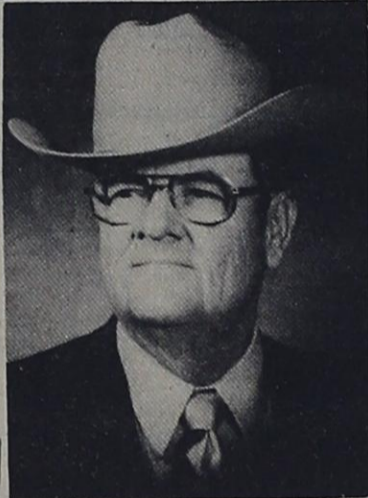

Eastland Plans Two Wildcats

Eastland County has gained sites for two wildcats.

Deeper of the pair is Allibaba Energy Resources Inc., Arlington, No. 1 Moran-Torch, slated for 3,900 feet.

It will be drilled two miles northeast of Eastland on a 100-acre lease. Site is 330 feet from the south and east lines of W. Lyman Survey, A-361.

Other test is No. 1 R. C. Browning Estate which will be drilled by Cherry Petroleum Co., Lubbock.

The planned 3,700-foot venture is located one mile south of Pioneer on a 183-acre lease.

Site is 487 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of S. A. Briggs Survey, A-353.

Hailey Oil Co. from Brookhaven, Miss., filed application to reener to 3,000 feet No. 1 Butler, abandoned regular field project two miles southwest of Rising Star.

Location is on a 77-acre lease, spotting 2,240 feet from the north and 990 feet from the west lines of Section 1, ETRR Survey.

It was plugged in February 1978, as Joe B. Cogdell No. 1 Butler.

There were about fifteen entries in the Fashion Revue. Eastland County leaders were impressed by the quality of work exhibited by the De Leon 4-H'ers.

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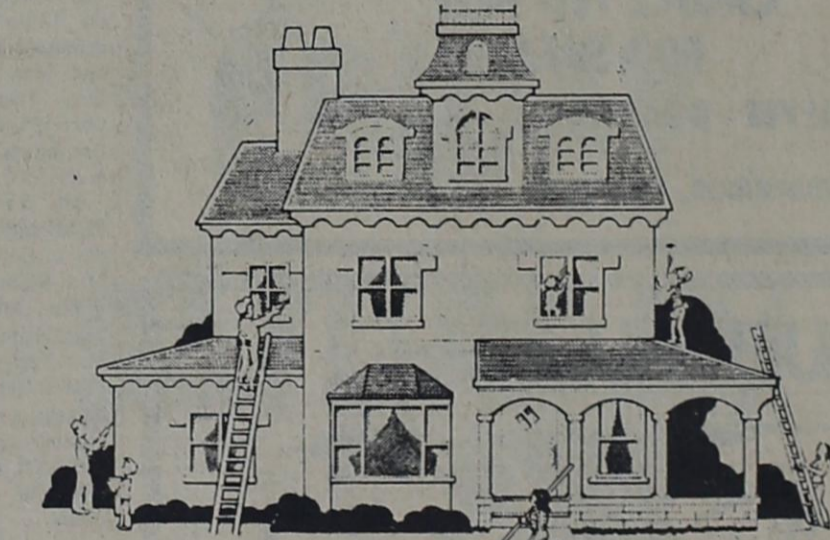
