

Kenneth N. Eaves, age 34, has filed as a candidate for Eastland County Sheriff in the upcoming Democratic Primary. Mr. Eaves is currently serving as Chief of

Police in Cisco. Eaves has over 1100 hours of law enforcement training including the Austin Police Department Academy and In-Service Training courses at Central Texas College. He was also chosen as one of five from among 450 officers to receive special training at the FBI Academy in 1974.

Eaves has been commissioned as a Texas Peace Officer since 1971. He has a total of seven years experience including Austin where he served on patrol and traffic and a special assignment unit working plain clothes in high crime areas and the Hays County Sheriff's Office. He served briefly in the Eastland County Sheriff's Office during the summer of 1979 resigning shortly after Ronnie White. In July he accepted the position as Chief of Police for the City of

Eaves is a native of Carbon. A 1964 graduate of Comanche High School, he has sixty college hours. Most of these hours were received in 1964 and 1965 when he attended Tarleton State Uni-

versity. Eaves is married and has two children, Laura Jean, age 8 and Cary Neil, age 2. His wife, Harriett Ann, received a BSEd. degree from Abilene Christian University and a MEd. from the University of Texas at Austin. She has been teaching ten years and is currently teaching English and Spanish at Ranger High School. The couple have been married twelve years. They are members of the Church of Christ

Gorman students in the fifth and ninth grades will be taking the TABS test Wednesday and Thursday, February 27 and 28. An adequate breakfast and adequate sleep the night before testing will help students to do their best on these tests.

In May 1979 the Texas Legislature mandated that minimun basic skills competency test be instituted in the State of Texas. As an outgrowth of this legislation, a program know as the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) has been implemented. Panels of curriculum experts in the areas of reading, writing, mathematics and other educators identified and reviewed essential competencies which students are expected to have mastered and which will be assessed in this

program. The TABS project involves approximately 500,000 fifth grade and ninth grade Texas students. Individual student results are to be made available to parents and school personnel directly involved in the student's educational program by May 1, 1980.

Carbon Man Dies After House Ablaze

EASTLAND (RNS) -- A fire and bitter cold weather may have contributed to the Saturday morning death of James Raymond McGinty, 68, of Carbon.

McGinty and his wife Betty, discovered a fire in the ceiling of their den about 7:30 a.m. Saturday. Mrs. McGinty climbed a step ladder and sprayed water on the fire to extinguish it. McGinty, clad only in pajamas and house shoes, grabbed his car keys and ran outside, intending to go to a nearby reighbor's to summon aid. The McGintys have no phone.

Mrs. McGinty suffered a fall from the ladder but managed to put out the blaze. When she went outside to disconnect the hose, she found her husband slumped to the ground just as he had placed the keys in the car door. She went to the neighbor's house to summon an ambulance.

Eastland Justice of the Peace. R.L. Rowch was summoned and pronounced him dead at 9:15 a.m. Tentatively, graveside services are scheduled for 10 a.m.


