The Gorman Panthers ended their season on Friday night at Brogdon Field on an upbeat as they defeated the Blanket Tigers by the score of 42 to 12. The only chance the Panthers had to return to the playoffs again this year was for the Lometa Hornets to defeat the Goldthwaite Eagles, and as predicted,

that just didn't happen. The Panthers took command from the opening gun as they took the opening kickoff on their own 28 and marched down the field in only 4 plays to score. The drive featured a 14 yard run by Jimmy Johnson before Jimmy took a short pass and turned it into a 55 yard scoring play with 10:23 left on the clock. Scotty Mauney added the two points on a run and the Big Red were on their way.

The Panthers added another score with 2:37 left in the period with David Pettit getting the final yard on a run. The score had been set up by a fumble recovery by Bob Hagood at the Tiger 23. The

The Panthers took the ball again on their next possession at their own 16 and it took only two plays to score. Following a 4 yard run Jimmy Johnson broke into the open and raced 80 yards for the score with 5:24 left. Pettit added the two pointer on a run and Gorman was out in front 42 to 6.

The Tigers got another score with 2:43 left in the game on a 3 yard run by Shane Cockerham. The pass try for two points failed and the final score was 42 to 12.

This will be the first time since 1974 that the Panthers have not been in the playoffs. It was sad that the one bad game they had was the one that counted the most and cost them the title. But we are real proud of our Panthers and as the old saying goes, "Just Wait Till Next Year." We will be looking for another good year for the Panthers. Jimmy Johnson led the Panthers on the ground with 206 yards on 20 carries and had two pass completions for 108 yards. Pettit had 94 yards on 11 carries. Mauney had 27 on 5, Jacky Johnson got 25 on 6, Spivey had 3 on 1 keeper, Eddie Pettit had 3 on 1, and Juan Pacheco got 2 on 1 try.



#### -GP-FARMERS AND **RANCHERS ELIGIBLE FOR FmHA LOANS**

Farmers in Eastland County are eligible to apply for emergency loans through the Farmers Home Administration for damage caused by drought and extreme temperatures.

Emergency loans are made to famers to cover losses resulting from disignated major disasters. In order to qualify, a farmer must have suffered production losses or physical losses to buildings or other structures. Crop production must be 20 per cent or more below normal in order to qualify for production loss loans. Loan applicants must be unable to obtain sufficient credit from local commercial sources in order to qualify. Farmers who sustained losses may apply for assistance at the local office which is located in the Eastland National Bank, Room 312, Eastland, Texas.

handling many thousands of loaves of dough I could tell when they were right. That day at noon the Captain said all were free until the next day. So we went back to out building. All took baths and were going to take a nap. Tho some one would say what they would do at home at Christmas time. No sleep then.

> Just six months and ten days later on May 21, 1919 I was discharged. In April I asked the Sarge why I was being kept on there. He said "You are a Volunteer, the draftees are going home." 



- Avoid driving into vapor clouds. Avoid direct contact with the escaping liquids.



When you see signs like those shown above, they tell you that there's a pipeline nearby. If it's underground, you can't see it. of course. But it's there, working quietly to provide energy for you and other consumers throughout this nation.

Some of these signs list the commodity transported in the pipeline, the name of the operator. and a telephone number where the operator's representative can be reached at all times.

Although pipelines have an exceptionally good safety record. once in a while a leak can occur. Indications of a leak might include:

- A strange or unusual odor in the vicinity of a pipeline.
- A hissing or roaring sound (caused) by petroleum or product escaping
- Avoid creating sparks or sources of heat which could cause the liquids or vapor to ignite and burn. If you find yourself in a suspected vapor area, do not light a match. start an engine or even switch on an electric light.
- Notify the pipeline operator as soon as you reach a safe area. Call collect. Give your name, a description of the leak and its location. If you do not know who the pipeline operator is, call your local fire, police or sheriff's department, or the state police. Advise them of the nature and location of the emergency.
