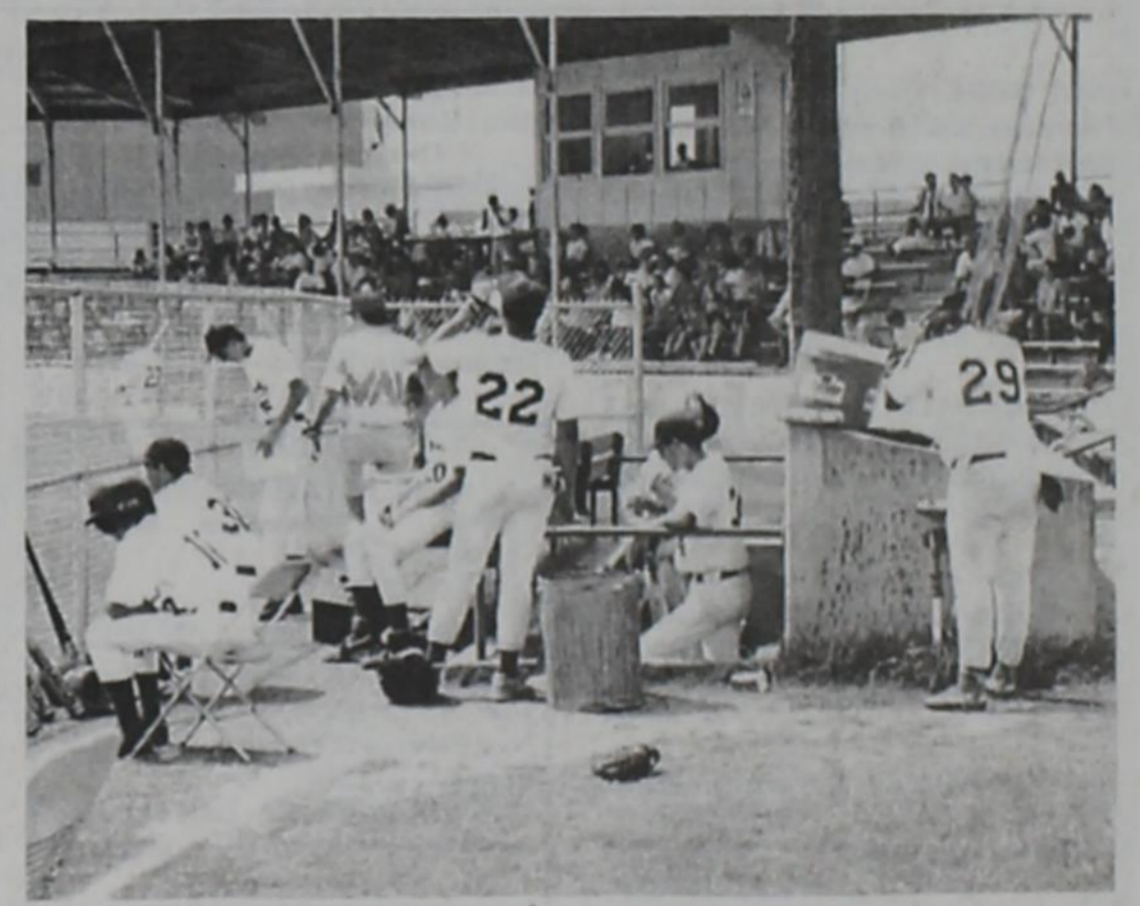

TU Electric Proposes New Strategic Rates

Dallas (June 6, 1994) — TU Electric today proposed a package of new strategic rates designed to enhance economic development, improve the environment and encourage further energy conservation by large users of electricity.

The proposal was filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas and cities in the TU Electric service area.

If approved, the new rates will be offered to qualifying commercial, industrial and wholesale electric customers as an incentive to attract new businesses and jobs, to retain existing businesses, or to encourage job creation through the expansion of existing businesses. The package also includes an incentive for qualifying customers who convert to advanced technologies that will conserve energy or improve the environment.

"Every customer of TU Electric will benefit from this package," said TU Electric Manager Harold Smith. "These options will provide revenue that the company otherwise would not receive, thereby helping to reduce the level of future rate requirements. In addition, all residents of the service area will benefit from increased economic development, a cleaner environment and the conservation of energy resources."

The package consists of two competitive rates for qualifying commercial, industrial and wholesale customers; an Economic Development Service rider to help attract new businesses to the area; and an

Environmental Technology Service rider to encourage conversion by customers to more energy-efficient and environmentally beneficial technologies.

"Approval of the strategic rate package will be a vital step in keeping this part of Texas competitive in today's business environment," Smith said. "We hope it will be approved quickly so TU Electric customers can begin to benefit from it."

TU Electric serves more than 2.2 million customers in 88 counties or North Central, West, and East Texas.

Widows May Get Higher Benefits At Age 65

If you're receiving Social Security benefits because you're a widow (or widower), you may be eligible for a higher benefit when you reach age 65. This could be possible if you have been employed and, therefore, are entitled to benefits based on your own work record. Ordinarily, you cannot change from a reduced benefit to a full benefit, but that does not apply if you're a widow or widower.

As a widow(er) who is entitled to retirement benefits on your own earnings, you can take reduced benefits at age 62 and receive a full widow's(er) benefit at 65. Or, you

FINAL REPORTING DATE

The final date to file a report or planted acreages of peanuts, corn, grain sorghum, cotton, conserving use and ACR (set aside) is July 15, 1994. Other crops for which an acreage report will be accepted included commercial vegetable crops melons, guar, and any other crop that the farm operator wishes to establish a record of crop history.

ACCURATE REPORTING

When filing an acreage report, be sure to file an accurate report. Failure to do so can result in loss of program benefits and the assessment of a monetary penalty. Meas-

can take your widow's(er) benefit at 62 and get your full retirement payment at 65.

Here's an example of how this works: Rebecca Litchfield, a widow, visited her Social Security office just before her 62nd birthday and learned she had some choices to make. Her full (age 65) widow's benefit would be \$800, but she could take a reduced widow's benefit of about \$660 at age 62. Because she had worked, she also was due a full (age 65) retirement benefit of \$600 with a reduced benefit of \$480 payable at age 62. These are her choices: (1) She could take a reduced widow's benefit of \$660 at age 62. That would remain her benefit forever (except for annual cost-of-living increases); or (2) she could take the smaller retirement benefit of \$480 at 62 and switch to her full widow's rate (\$800) at 65.

Rebecca has to ask herself these questions: Can she live on the smaller income (\$480) for three years in anticipation of the higher benefit (\$800) at 65? Or would she rather get

Agriculture View Point

Action on critical agricultural issues centered on "c" words: coalitions, communications, and conflict, the first two to resolve the third, during the recent Texas Agricultural Mini-Summit in Temple.

A common theme emerged from five work groups focused on the need for agriculture to reach out to build coalitions and improve communications. "The participants took their work seriously and came forward with solid solutions," said Dr. John Abernathy, the Summit Leadership Chairman. "This should result in increased understanding of agriculture and greater involvement in policy decisions."

More than 175 representatives from Central and Southeast Texas examined issues in work groups on the environment and natural resources, competitiveness of Texas Agriculture, public policy, education and information needs of consumers, and leadership.

"These issues have an impact on how agriculture producers do business," said Abernathy. "For instance, new environmental regulations are on the minds of many producers. They must deal not only with the cost of complying with new requirements, but sometimes resolve conflicting environmental needs."

One to five regional conferences around the state, the Temple Mini-Summit brought together concerned

producers and service providers. Measurement service is available and is recommended to those not sure of their exact acreage.

Peanut producers are reminded to bring their receipts for peanut seed purchases when they request measurement service or when they file their report of acreage.
