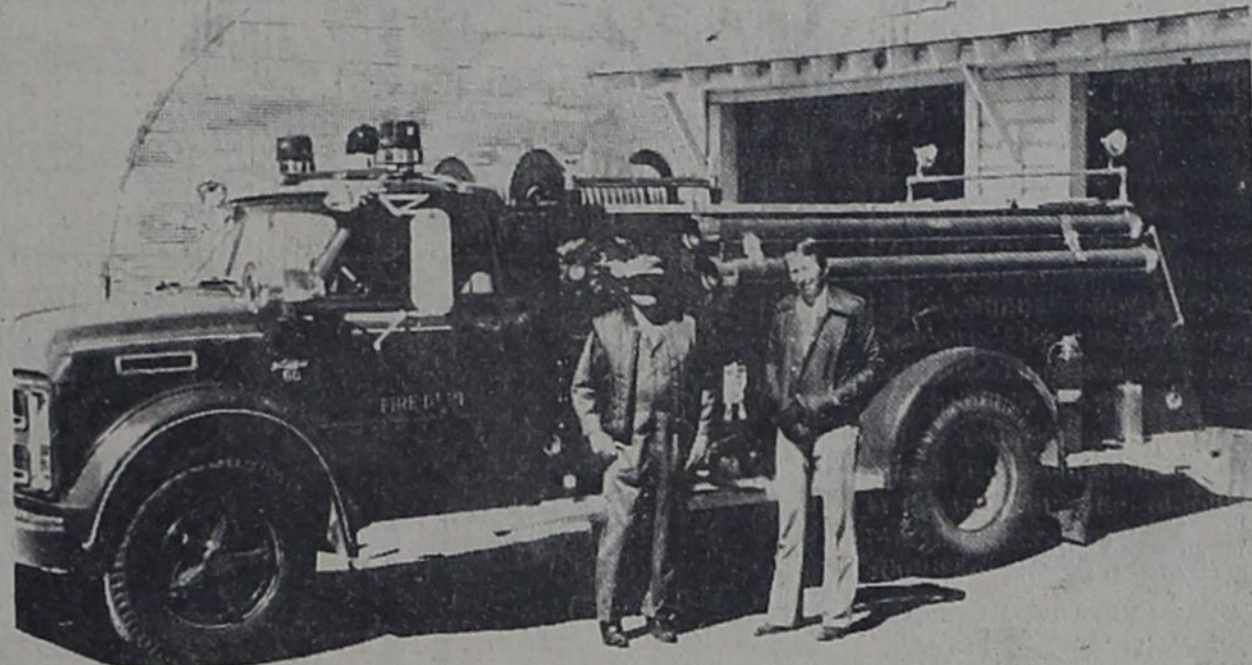

City Buys New Pumper Truck

The Gorman City Commission met in regular session on February 21 at 8:00 a.m. with the Mayor and all Commissioners, except Mr. Morris present. Others attending the meeting were Mrs. Brinegar, Mr. Ervin, Mr. Baze and Mr. Foster.

Regular items were acted upon on the posted agenda, items which were included were the approval of the minutes of the last meeting, discussed progress and plans for the Senior Citizens Building, and discussed the swimming pool with Mr. Baze. After some discussion on the swimming pool, the Commission passed a resolution that the pool continue to operate under a committee composed of one appointed member from each of the local civic groups as has been the custom. Since the pool is paid off, the City now will assume an added responsibility in its operation. Mr. Foster reported that Mr. Neal from Waco could meet with us at 5:00 p.m. on the same afternoon for us to inspect the pumper truck that I had mentioned earlier. An emergency meeting was posted for 5 p.m. for this purpose.

Mr. Neal arrived with the truck and many of the firemen met with the Commission to inspect and try out the truck. We saw it in operation and heard Mr. Neal tell us how he had completely gone through all of the fire fighting equipment and had cleaned and coated the tank with an epoxy finish. The truck is in excellent condition and did a wonderful job of pumping. The truck was closely inspected and seemed to be something that would save us thousands of dollars and serve as well as a new one.

After questioning Mr. Neal on several matters, we voted to purchase the truck with the understanding that if the state should fail to certify it for at least 17 years that he would pick it up and refund the money. The price of the truck was \$18,500 or he would take the old 53 truck and trade for 16,500. He agreed that he would wait a few days to see if we could dispose of the old truck. The prospect did not take it so we are trading for \$16,500. We have nearly \$8,000 in the Pumper Fund and will pay the remainder from Revenue Sharing Funds and a little from the general

fund. Mr. Neal gave the Department two coats, two helmets and two pair of boots and allowed them to keep the hose off the old truck. We feel we made a good buy. We are asking those who were paying the 50 cents per month to continue to do so that we may be able to reimburse the general fund or help the Fire Department purchase more coats, boots and helmets

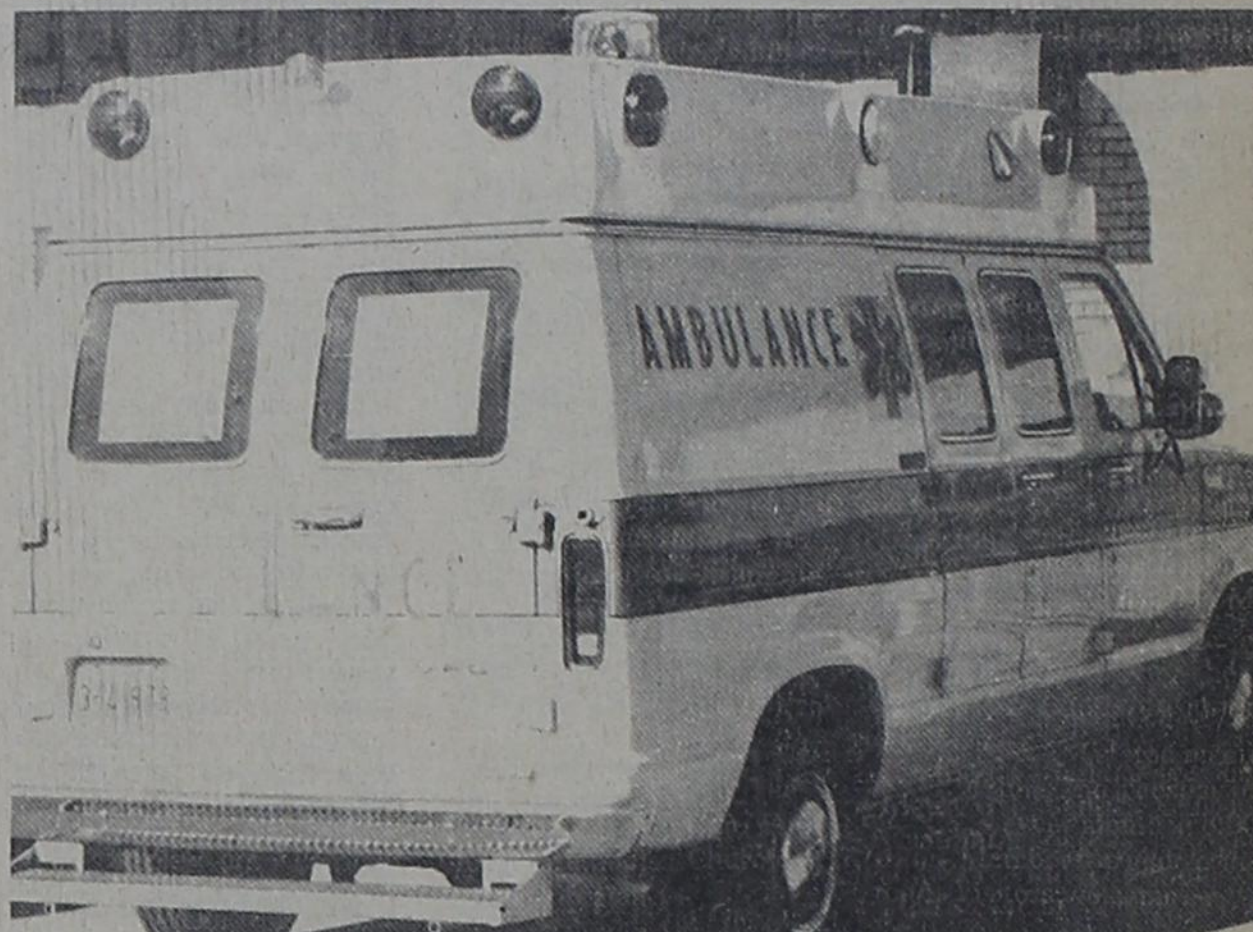

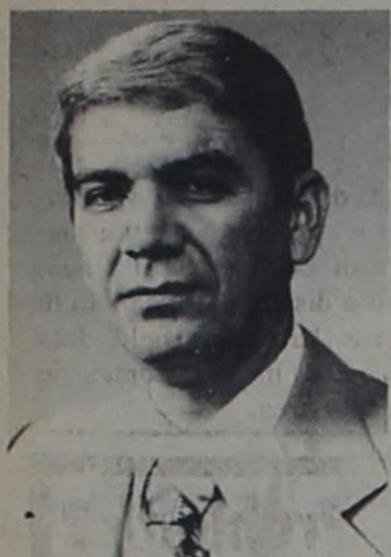

As there was 2-1000 barrrell steel tanks that were full of oil, other half full about 40 yards down hill from fire. We finished dike and holding pit just before it over flowed. Sure had a fire for awhile. Tho we saved the tanks. We went home at 6 a.m. for breakfast. We were ready for a days work at 7 a.m. We worked ten hours a day. Seven days a week. No over time then tho the Company paid us four men \$5.00 apiece for saving several thousands dollars worth of property. We knew it was our duty to save that property anyway.

People think that things are high now. We drew 50 cents per hour as Roustabouts. While most companies paid 40 to 45 cents. A fryer on foot \$1, butter \$1, eggs \$1, sugar 90 cents. You see it took two hours work to pay for just one of those. While to day, you can buy several with one hours pay. Yesterday Snooks and Billie Joe Craddock came by and we visited for awhile! B. Joe told about how we use to make ice cream. A neighbor of mine was moving to Calif. He had a 3 gal freezer (Joe said 5) and wanted to sell it to me. I told him no two or three times! Tho on evening before he left, he came down with the freezer. (Bill Kiziar) and said I could have it for \$1. I bought it. We would all gather on Sunday evening and enjoy that cream. I was milking several cows, so was Roy Crawley and Tidy Eaves. Tho ice was very high 300 pounds for 25 cents. Those were good old depression days. Tho we had plenty to eat and money was as scarce as old hens teeth. I hope such never happens again.

I played some domjones this past week. I am so thankful for the ones that takes me to town and for the ones that bring me home from the games.

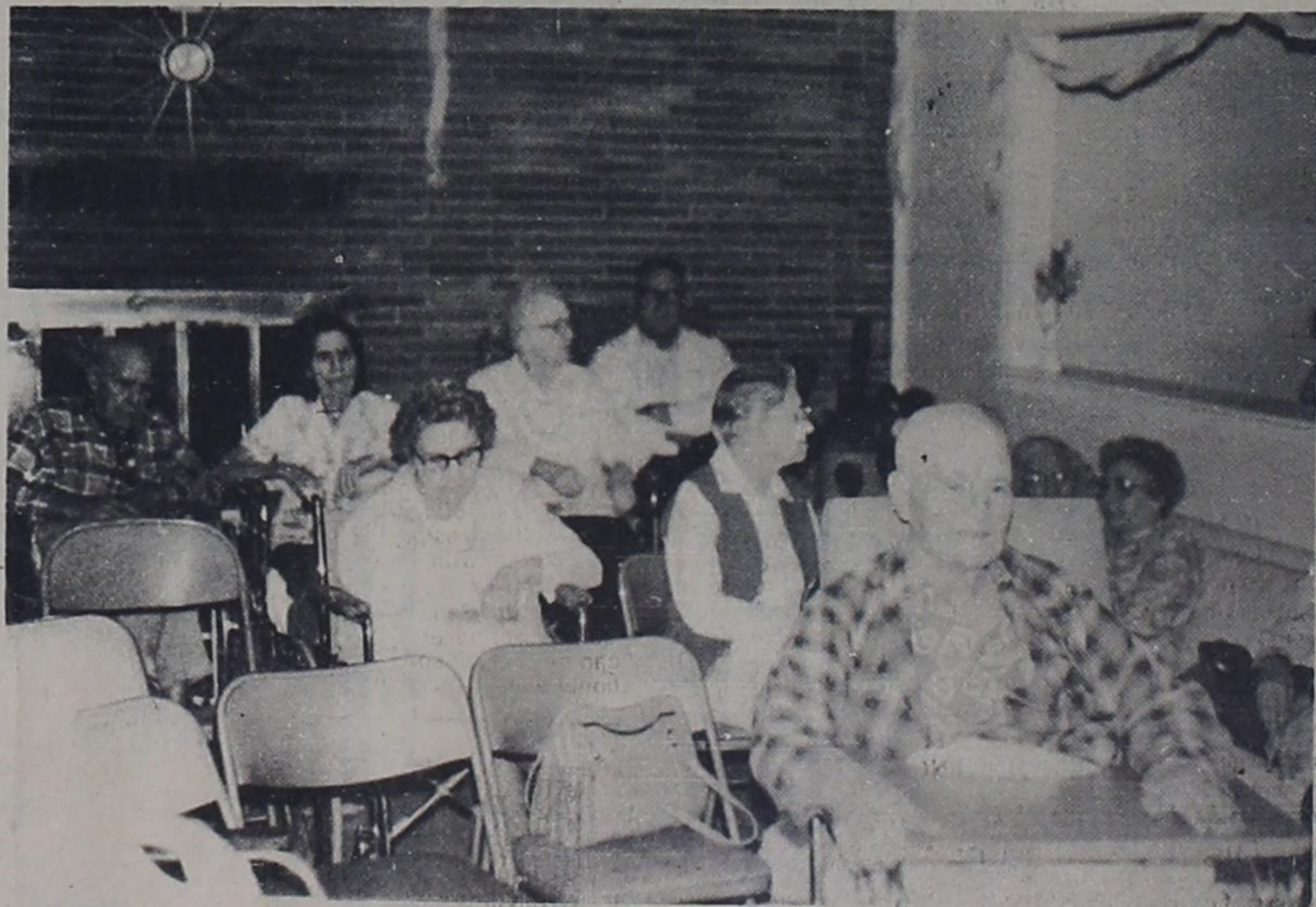
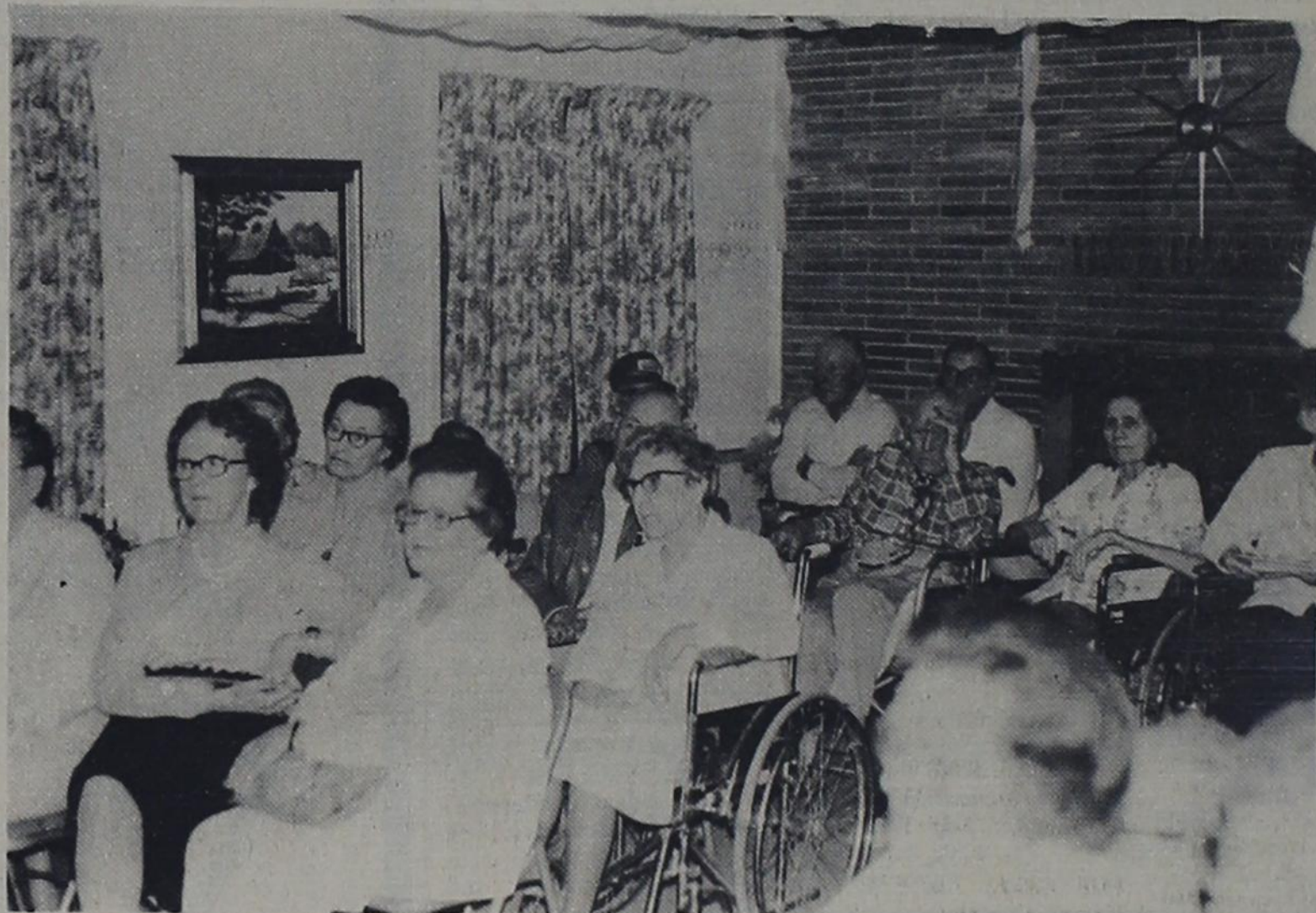

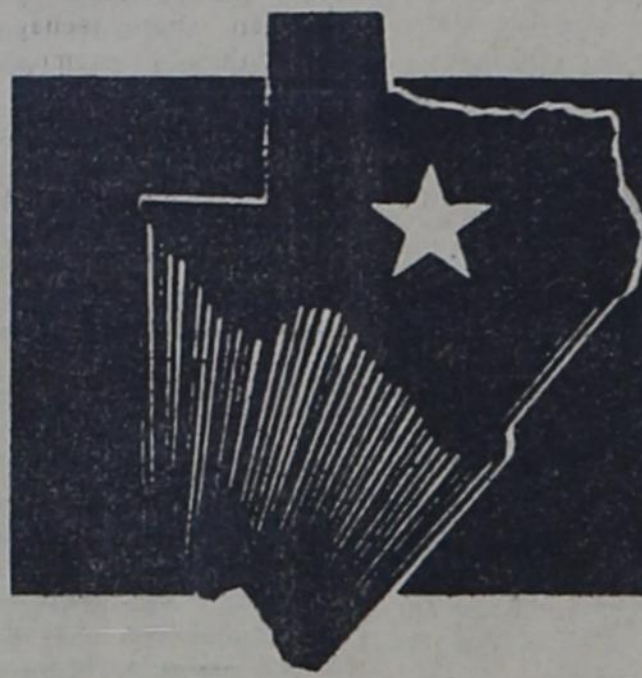

BAND STUDENTS TO ATTEND CJC BAND FESTIVAL

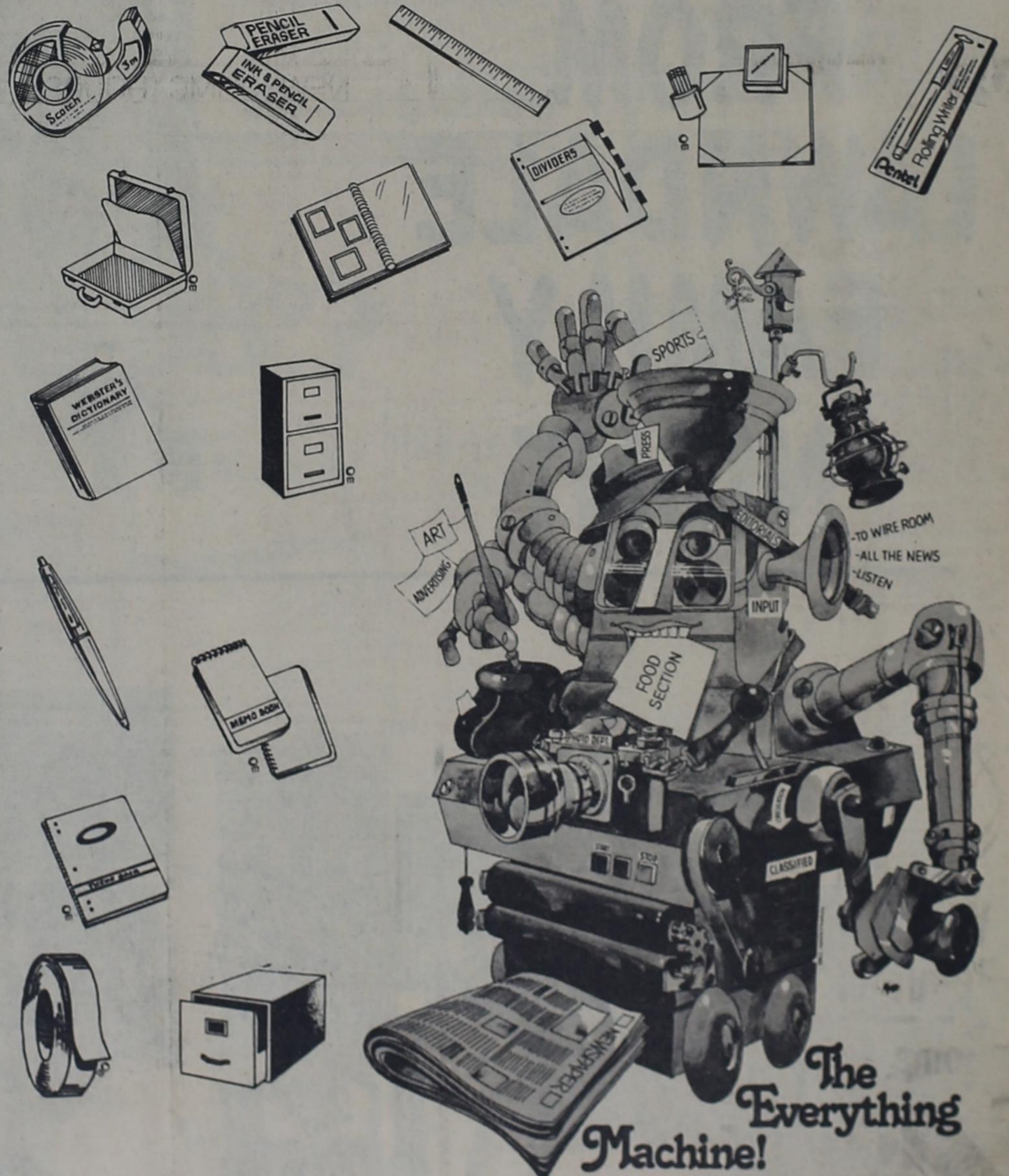

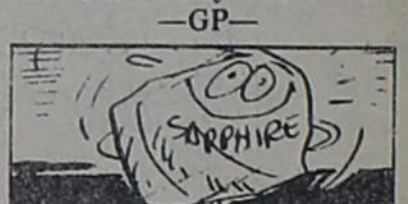

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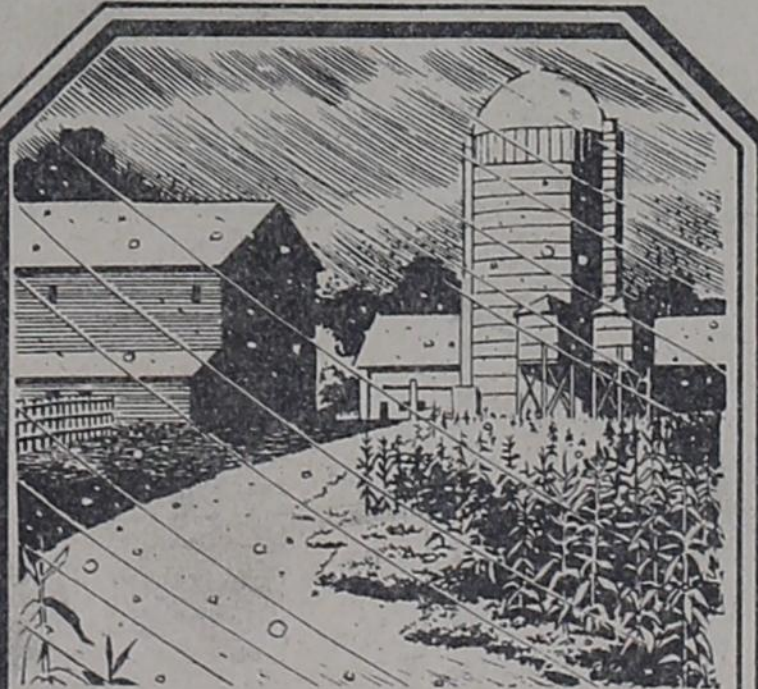
