The wet weather only delayed the harvest of mature peanuts and caused a good mber of them to "fall off" he digging process. Most of the peanut crop has been cut very short by the hot, dry weather duiring the time that they needed moisture the most. The majority of farmers will leave their peanuts in the ground until the largest number of peanuts are mature. There is a move now to put peanuts in storage to help farmers get a higher price as peanuts will be scarce this year. More about this elsewhere in this issue.

According to D. B. Warren, Southwestern President, Peanut Growers Association, Gorman, Texas.

The U.S. peanut crop in 1980 was estimated by USDA on September 1 at 1,569,000 tons. That projection, if correct, would mean a reduction of 421,000 tons from the U.S. production in 1979. To further compound the problem, there appears to be every indication that a sizable tonage of segregation 2 and 3 peanuts, perhaps a total reaching 150,000 tons, will be included in the 1,569,000 ton total thus reducing further the volume of edible and seed stocks. There is also the distinct possibility that the peanut crop estimate may be reduced when the October revision is made.

Approximately 1,300,000 tons from the 1979 crop were required for domestic edible and seed use. Assuming only a 4 percent increase in 1980, about 1,350,000 tons will be required to fill the domestic demand for the 1980-81 year out of a total supply of some 1,420,000 tons of segregation 1 peanuts. In this calculation no consideration is given to export market demand which has been totaling about 400,000 tons in recent years.

The current supply-demand outlook is resulting in dramatic escalations in market levels of shelled peanuts. Based on information receiv-

ed at press time from a number of sources, price quoted for Runner Jumbos, U.S. No. 1's and U.S. Splits ranged from 60 percent to about 75 percent over prices for those grades a year ago. Prices per pound quoted at press time by peanut brokers for Runners were Jumbos from 60 cents to 68 cents, U.S. No. 1's 49 cents to 56 cents and U.S. Splits 57 cents to 60 cents and for Spanish Jumbos 65 cents to 75 cents, U.S. No. 1's 50 cents to 55 cents and U. S. Splits 55 cents to 60 cents. Spanish prices were averaging about 64 percent over those prevailing a year ago. It is reported that shelled prices are extremely difficult to quote at this time and are somewhat erratic since offerings are light and very little trading is occurring. The shelled export market is reported very strong at present with prices ranging as high or higher than domestic

markets. Per capita consumption of peanut products at 7.1 lbs. was at a record high in the marketing year ending July 31, 1980. This is a substantial increase over the 6.6 pounds per capita consumed for the previous year. Observers will be interested in the effect of the current year high shelled peanut prices on domestic consumption, provided of course, production of edible quality peanuts is sufficient

to meet the total demand.

## GA SUPPORT LOANS AVAILABLE - PEANUT

According to D. B. Warren, President, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, Gorman, Texas.

Peanut price support storage facilities will be availabe at marketing points throughout the Southwest peanut producing areas to handle the 1980 crop. Warehouses will be available for the storage of both quota and. additional peanuts.

The Association loan program serves growers who by their own choice wish to utilize it. The loan is also available for growers who may produce additional peanuts in excess of the total amount contracted to shellers as well as to growers who plant only the quota fraction of their allotments but produce additional peanuts due to larger than anticipated yeilds. Association officials, however, continue to advise growers not to place additional peanuts in the area type pools if other satisfactory alternatives are available. The leasing of quota pounds at harvest time has provided beneficial to many growers in the marketing of such peanuts.

providing loan availability through the peanut price. support program, however, is to establish a floor under the farmers stock market at a level of at least the USDA support rate. All growers are entitled to receive not less that the curent support level for their peanuts. The stabilizing influence of the price support program continues to be an effective factor in providing such assurance to growers. However, no problems should be encountered this year in maintaining a "support level floor" under the crop due to an extremely short crop and the urgent need by shellers and end users of shelled and cleaned in-shell peanuts to acquire sufficient quantities of peanuts to meet their

obligations. The September 1, USDA Crop Estimate calls for a total national production of only 1,569,000 tons of farmers stock peanuts, a

reduction of 421,000 tons from the 1979 crop total of 1,990,000 tons. No doubt a considerable tonnage of segregation 2 and 3 peanuts will be produced throughout the peanut belt. Grower and sheller association officials in the Virginia-Carolina area believe that the 1980 crop there will produce the first substantial tonnage of segregation 3 peanuts ever in that area. Drought conditions

in Georgia and Alabama have caused high percentages of segregation 3 peanuts in some sections of these states. The whole projection at press time points toward an extremely tight supply situation for 1980,81 for U. S. processors in both the do-

mestic and export edible markets. The present outlook has already caused dramatic market reactions with record prices quoted for most edible grade shelled peanuts. This situation could intensify if the October 1, USDA Peanut Crop Estimate is reduced at the time the estimate is announced on October 10 or

#### City Working To **Secure Block Grant**

For some time now, we have had people asking why we could not secure a Block Grant like De Leon and Dublin had received. I have been checking on this for some time and have now reached the point where I can tell you that we have the possibility available. On Wednesday afternoon,

September 1. Mr. Gary Smith from WCTCOG met with me and talked over some possibilities that we might have for such a grant. He pointed out the various things that they would grade us on such as low income, sub-standard housing, the number of people to be served by such projects, and what parts of town in which we need such projects. For some time we have been

concerned about the southeastern part of town having no water mains for adequate pressure and large enough for fire plugs for safety. You may not be aware of the fact that we have only 2 inch lines in that part of town and no fire plugs at all. Mr. Smith drove all over town with me and after talking with Robert about the water lines and viewing the part of town involved, he felt that we have a very good chance of securing a grant up to the amount of \$300,000 for such a project if needed. He also stated that along with the water, we might qualify for some streets, if so the amount would be much greater. If we can qualify, this is a 100% HUD Grant which would require no cost to the City.

The first thing we must do is have a Public Hearing on this matter and get some

input from the citizens. As you will see in a special notice in this edition, we are having this hearing on Monday, October 20 at 7:30 P.M. in the City Hall. We will move to other quarters if the crowd is too large for City Hall. Be sure to come and help us decide what we want and what we can afford. Mr. Smith will meet with us and will be able to answer any questions that you have. Show your interest by attending. We will have a second hearing on the matter at our first meeting in November 10, 1980 at 9:00 A.M. -GP-

Our sympathy goes out to the family of Bill Knight, a War II Vet. I have known Bill most of his life.

The U.S. would be a thing of past History. He opposed the Neutron bomb, strategic weapons of all kinds and including planes, subs and getting people in the service that cannot or do not care how they do the jobs. America awake. The next morning we followed behind a snow plow to Topeka. The wind was high. We found us a place to stay and went to AAA office. There was a call from Wiley, he was head of Castoe Bean threshing. I told him about the weather. He said take it easy. So we went and bought some western books and stayed in side.

We had to go to State Capitol Building and see the secretary about thrashing the beans. The Secretary said "No you cannot thrash them." I said "We are, here is our orders"

He asked me how were liked that Caw River Valley? I told him it was the finest land in had ever seen. Tho I would not live there. I told hime I was raised too far South to want my daughter to sit by or next to a colored person. He said "when you live in Rome" I stopped hime there and said "I am not going to live in Rome or next to a Dam Yankee". We understood each other.

I told him I served in the 35th Division in War I for eight months.

It was about 40 miles to Manhattan, Kan. I phoned there to see about beans there. Jus tone acre. So we went up and got them in pick up. One ton. graded 80% used same scales and paid same price as peanuts then. They were white Caster Beans. As white as butter beans. They were experimentng with them.


