# Judge Bud Arnot To Seek **Election To Chief Justice Post**

Judge Bud Arnot of the Eastland Court of Appeals has announced that he is filing for the office of Chief Justice of his court. Arnot, completing 7 years as a judge on the court, said, "I am the only candidate with appellate experience that can provide the leadership necessary to maintain the continuity of the court." The chief justice is responsible for the daily operations of the court. "Judging, especially on the appellate level, is a learned craft. A new judge, whoever he or she may be, should not be burdened by the additional responsibilities of the daily operations of the court while making this adjustment." Arnot said that he made this decision only after having discussed it with the other members of the court, Chief Justice Austin McCloud, who is not seeking re-election after 24 years on the court, and justice Bob Dickenson. Arnot said, "Justice Dickenson and Justice McCloud both have encouraged me to run for this position."

"It does seem strange that the chief justice position is something that you must run for as opposed to being appointed or based on seniority," Arnot stated. "Being elevated to this position from within the court is becoming standard," Arnot observed, using the Amarillo, Austin, Corpus Christi, Fort Worth, Houston San Antonio, Texarkana, and El Paso courts as an example. "In over half of the courts of appeals the chief justice was first a member of the court."

"I have dedicated myself and my career to this court," said Arnot. Arnot, a graduate of Baylor Law School, has received a Masters of Law Degree from the University of Virginia and is currently a candidate for a degree of Humanities and Judging offered by the American Academy of Judicial Education. Arnot is currently the president of the appellate section of the State Bar of Texas and last year was in charge of the education program for all appellate judges in Texas. Arnot is a member of the State Bar College, an organization of Lawyers who voluntarily exceed the minimum requirements of continuing legal education, the State Bar Foundation, and a committee member of the Center for the Judiciary. "One of the strongest attributes of this court has been its stability," Arnot noted. I have been encouraged to seek this position by my fellow judges, members of the bar, and friends. My willingness to assume the additional responsibilities is consistent with my dedication to the court.

Justice McCloud will continue to serve the court as a "senior judge," as Judge Raleigh Brown now does. "We have had preliminary informal conversations with Eastland County about expansion and refurbishing our court facilities to make room for an additional senior judge." Arnot stated, "The County's willingness to help is just the latest example of their continued support for the court."





# **Jana Ables Named Teen Sportsgirl Of The Year**



In her first two years at the high school level, Jana Ables has been nothing short of phenominal regardless of the level at which she is competing. 


