The specialists are dedicated to maintaining the first class status of the state 4-H Center, thereby enhancing the image of the Extension Service, the director added.

The unit award, Pfannstiel said, is presented for their team efforts toward making facilities of the 4-H Center available to the maximum number of people and also ensuring that each person's stay at the facility is both profitable and enjoyable.

Crouch and Gilbert have planned and conducted4-H youth camps, retreats and conferences in lving more than 15,580 youth at the Center. They have also made possible the training of more than 5,000 adult and teen volunteers during the past five years. Additionally, another 11,298 youth and adults have had an opportunity to use the facilities, thus returning revenues which allow for lower rates for 4-14 members.

The 4-H Center generates more than \$200,000 in revenues annually, of which 83 percent reinvested in the Brownwood community.

Crouch, a Brown County native, has been with the Extension Service since 1954. He served as an assistant county agent in Bexar County for four years before joining the 4-H staff at College Station as assistant state 4-H leader. In 1965, Crouch took an assignment as Extension advisor with the Texas A&M University Office of International Programs at Chott Maria Agrigultural College in Sousse, Tunisia and served for five years. He returned to the state 4-H staff in 1970, and four years later began serving in his present role at Brownwood.

Crouch holds B. S. and M. S. degrees from Texas A&M University.

Gilbert is a native of Gorman and has been employed by the Extension Service for 13 years. She served as assistant county agent in Taylor county for two years and as associate county agent in Wichita County for two years. She was county Extension Agent in Brown County from 1972 until 1976, when she assumed her present role with the Texas 4-H Center.

She has a B.S. degree from Abilene Christian College and the M.Ed. degree from Tarleton State University.
