Wasn't that a hail of a rain we had on Tuesday afternoon when small hail started to fall just after a rain shower hit. Then a few minutes later the hail really hit in Gorman as il measuring up to 21/2 hes hit especially hard in town. There was a great deal of damage to trees, gardens and also to some vehicles. We did, however, receive some badly needed moisture and measurements were up to 11/2 inch. Several folks reported damage to fruit trees and leaves were numerous on the ground after the hail storm.

We thank the Good Lord for the fine moisture even though we also got the hail. The rain will mean a lot in preparation for the planting season.

The turnout in the local election box was very good as more than 400 votes were cast. There will be a run-off in the Sheriff's race but the rest of the races were decided in the primary. The 91st District Judge race was won by the incumbent, Mr. Jim Wright who had a majority over three other opponents in the race. Dewey Keesee won the Constable race in Precinct 5 by a margin of only 3 votes. In the Gorman box Keesee held a lead of 230 to 191. However in the Carbon box Ingram received 86 votes to 50 for Keesee and the total was 280 for Keesee and 277 for Ingram.

President Carter had a very large majority in the presidential preference balloting.



Last weekend in Austin, Gorman High School was well represented at the State University Interscholastic League Literary meet held at the University of Texas campus. Two of Rowena Wilson's senior shorthand students captured the top places in the contest.

Paulette Baze, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Graydon Baze, brought home a huge gold medal for herself and a first place plaque for the school.

Carla (Mrs. Gary) Jackson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Good, placed second and rec received a silver medal. Both girls finished their transcription at the same time with just three errors difference between them.

Bill Townley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Townley, a sophomore, also competed on the state level in the Editorial Writing contest. Although Bill did not place among the top three, the journalism contestants were told that only the top 1 percent of competing students were able to advance to the Austin contests.

Including this year Gorman High School has been represented a number of times in the state literary and academic UIL contests: thrity times in typing or shorthand, nine times in journalism or ready writing, four times in speech contests, three times in spelling and one time in number sense.




