SHERIFF'S OFFICE TO HOLD

PUBLIC AUCTION The Eastland County Sheriff's Office will hold an unusual public auction of three horses on Monday, August 11, 1980, at 10:00 a.m. in Ranger, Texas. The sale is the result of complaints made to the Sheriff's Office about the three horses belonging to a Mr. William S. Hines of Ranger who reportedly had left the horses without food and water. After investigation the matter, Sheriff Johnnie W. Morren filed an application with Justice of the Peace M.C. Underwood of Ranger to seize cruelly treated animals. Judge Underwood ordered the horses seized by the Sheriff and set a hearing on the matter. At the hearing, Mr. Hines did not appear and the testimony showed that the horses had gone for some time without food and water except what was furnished by neighbors. After hearing the evidence presented, Judge Underwood ordered the horses to be sold at a public auction. The sale
