



PARASITE SHORT COURSE SET MONDAY



Gordon invites all the cattlemen to attend the meeting. There are not charges for the course.





The City Commission met at 8:00 a. m. on January 17

We had two major items on the agenda. One was the Public Hearing on the Federal Grant for sewer improvement. Mr. Hays and Mr. Messenger from Austin met with us to bring us up to date on progress on the application for this grant. They informed us that the ground work had been laid and that if we wished to proceed with a request for the grant that we must pass a resolution to that effect. After much discussion on the increased cost of the project and the possibility of paying if off, we did adopt such a resolution so that proper application

could be filed. We were informed that it would possibly take sixty days for the final decision on the grant and at that time we could accept or reject it if it were approved. We decided that we would make a study during this time and decide what we wanted to do or what we could do. At the estimated cost to the City of some \$60,000 it could be paid off in twenty years at less than an additional \$1.00 sewer charge on each connection. We would like to have more input from the citizens as to what would be best for the future of Gorman in getting some lift stations built and some lines replaced and bring our sewer plant up to top quality.

We are faced with another problem in the City. There is a requirement by the Texas Insurance Board that when a pumper truck becomes 30 years old that it must be replaced or the city will get a big key rate increase. Within the next two years our pumper will have reached that age, which means that it will have to be replaced. If we were to place an order today for such a truck it would cost not less than \$40,000 plus the cost of any equipment such as hose, extinguishers, and other equiment which would possibly put the price at nest \$45,000 and we are told that

we could not expect delivery under one year. The representatives from the Fire Department presented us with a plan where we might be able to purchase a completely rebuilt 1968 model truck that would be certified by the state for at least 18 vears of certified service and possibly more at a cost of around \$17,000. We have in the reserve Fire Truck Fund that has been paid with the 50 cent voluntary payment on water bills, \$11,268 that would be used on this purchase. We are to look at the truck on February 7 and make a decision on what we should do. It appears that this is our best bet on replacement because this amount is in reach while

\$45,000 may not be. The Fire Department reported to us that they are having trouble with spectators when we have a fire in town. People come out to see what is burning and are hampering the fire-fighters. During the recent fire at Browns Feed Store they have several problems with trying to keep people out of the block where the fire was in progress. Some even got so close that they had trouble getting people out of the way to go refill the tank truck.




