GORDON SPOT

Soil Stewardship Week May 11-18, focuses on the theme, "The Judgement of Nature." The observance is sponsored by the National Association of Conservation Districts. This year's theme is especially appropriate as the United States considers the current condition of its soil, water and related resources. Through nature, we are linked with the past and committed to the future.

Nature is the continuing system of life created by God. It is neither fixed nor static; it is a continuing process and inherently dynamic. It rewards care and constructive attention, even as it penalizes negligence and deliberate damage. Loss of some three million acres of productive agricultural land each year, through urbanization and other uses, decline in productivity of topsoil as the result of destructive erosion and continuing pollution of the nations' water are serious causes for everyone's concern. Participation in Soil Stewardship Week activities offers an opportunity to reflect on the nation's natural resource problems and to consider actions to resolve them or reduce their impact.

How to fertilize summer grasses, such as coastal bermudagrass, for hay production may be a difficult decision this year for Eastland County farmers. If you have hay left from last year, you must determine additional needs and fertilize accordingly.

If estimated hay requirements are less than normal and do not require production from all available acres, you may only want to fertilize for one or two cuttings and then graze the remainder of

the year. Or you could rotate fertilization for hay and grazing.

For example, graze some acres first; then fertilize for hay while other acres are fertilized for hay followed by grazing. This provides an opportunity to produce good quality hay while using the residual fertilizer to produce good quality grass for grazing. Where fertilizing to meet grazing requirements, consider fertilizing part of the pasture acreage in the spring, another part in the summer and another part in the fall. In this way all grass will get some fertilizer without producing more grazing in the spring than can be used especially if less hay is needed this year.

The idea that all fields must be fertilized in the spring cannot be supported by grazing requirements, maintenance of quality grazing, and profitable use of the increased growth from fertilization.

How much fertilizer to use will vary from field to field. A soil test is the best guide for determining amounts of phosphorus and potassium needed. However, consider applying 80 to 90 pounds of nitrogen per acre for hay and 50 to 60 pounds for grazing.

In making plans to fertilize summer grasses for hay and grazing, remember that increased production from fertilization must be used efficiently if fertilization is to be profitable. Whatever system is to be used, be sure to include management practices necessary to meet forage use as well as production requirements.

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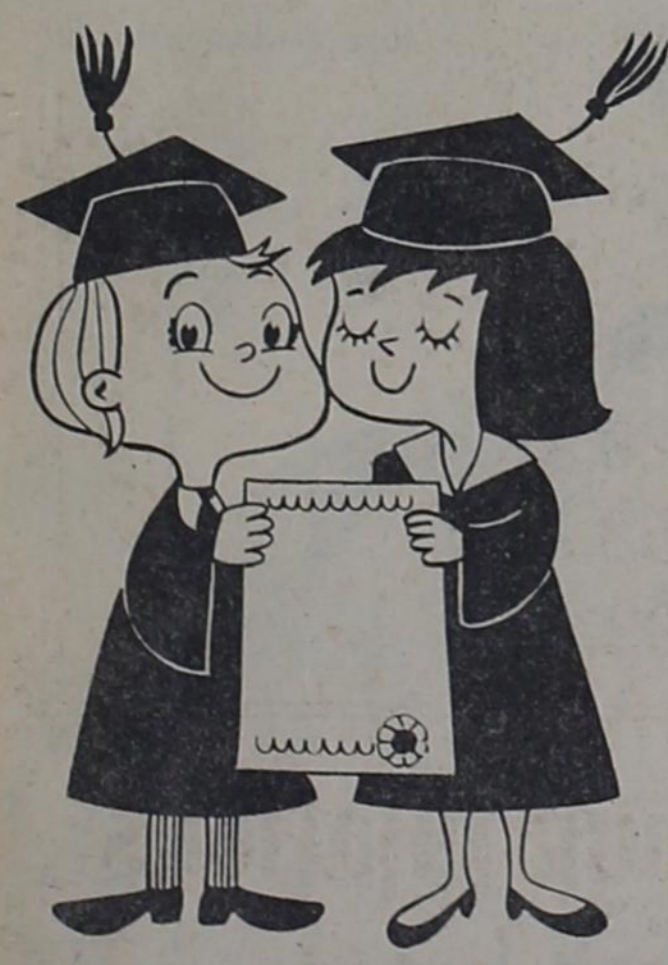

LABOR-SAVER BREADS

Growth to the convenience food industry is an indication that time and labor-saving meals have considerable appeal for modern cooks. And the sales of small appliances, such as food processors, appear to confirm it. How much time and work new products save is actually up to the user. Savvy cooks may not be tempted to change their ways, but adventurous cooks seem to welcome innovations. One of the recent ones is making yeast bread in a food processor.

Most food processors make a single loaf of bread, which is fine for small households. The accompanying recipe, for Sour Cream Herb Ring is an example of how little effort it takes to prepare distinctive yeast rolls and bread. Today, measuring of ingredients takes more time than mixing and kneading. In less than two minutes of mixing the dough is kneaded and ready to put aside to rise.

Unlike the making of cakes, cookies and casserole dishes that take time to prepare and bake, yeast bread doesn't require constant attention from the cook. Once it's mixed and kneaded, it does its own thing. It can be quickly

shaped after one rising so the cook is free to perform other kitchen tasks. The aromatic blend of herb and sour cream flavor makes the following recipe a superb accompaniment for soups and salads and summer meals.

HERB SOUR CREAM RING
Makes 1 loaf

- 2-3/4 cups unsifted flour
- 5 tablespoons Fleischmann's® Margarine
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon dried marjoram leaves
- 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme leaves
- 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano leaves

With metal blade in place combine flour, 3 tablespoons margarine, sugar, marjoram, thyme and oregano in bowl; process 5-10 seconds to combine. Dissolve yeast in warm water; pour through feed tube. Add sour cream and begin processing. Pour milk through feed tube in a



fast stream until ball forms, about 10-15 seconds. Continue processing for 60 seconds to knead dough.

Carefully remove dough from processor bowl. Shape into a ball and place in a greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover; let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Punch dough down.

Divide into 10 pieces and shape each into a ball. Arrange balls in a circle in a greased 6-1/2 cup ring mold. Cover; let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour, 10 minutes.

Melt remaining margarine; pour over dough. Bake at 375° F. for 20 to 25 minutes, or until done. Remove from pan and cool on wire rack.

You did it!

UPS application to provide intrastate service to the people of Texas. The meeting will be held in Stephenville on Tuesday, May 20 at 7 p.m. in the City Hall at 354 N. Belknap.

At this time, Texas and Oklahoma are the only remaining states that do not receive the benefit of intrastate deliveries by UPS. In 1970, UPS began operation in Texas interstate. By 1972 their service had been made available to all addresses within Texas, still handling packages which come from other states only. In 1978, UPS made its second application to the Texas Railroad Commission to serve all of Texas intrastate. (The first application was made in 1966.)

The Railroad Commission claimed through a technicality that they did not have jurisdiction to hear the case. Bills that would have paved the way for such a hearing were introduced in the 1979 legislative session but never came up. However, in 1979, a Texas court ruled that the Railroad Commission does

have jurisdiction to hear the UPS application for intrastate authority. Currently the Railroad Commission is appealing that 1979 court ruling.

The state of Oklahoma has granted a hearing on a like request. That hearing is projected to be held in August of this year.
