

Eastland Tests Slated

European Southwest Co. of Houston will drill No. 1 Clark as a proposed 3,500-foot wildcat in Eastland County.

Location is eight miles north of Gorman on a 155-acre lease.

It spots 330 feet from the north and 3,891 feet from the west lines of Theresa Tyler Survey 5, A-491.

Another wildcat will be drilled seven miles west of Cisco as Cochran & Harris, Hamilton, No. 4 Agnue.

The planned 500-foot test is located on a 110-acre lease. Drillsite is 750 feet from the south and 150 feet from the west lines of Section 4, Block 2 (E), BBB&C Survey, A-994.

MHW Inc. of Dallas will drill No. 3 Downie in the Lee Ray (Lake) Field 12 miles northwest of Cisco.

The proposed 4,5000-foot project is located on an 80-acre lease.
