


CONGRESSMAN STENHOLM RECEIVES TREASURY AWARD

WASHINGTON, D. C. -Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has been named to receive the National As-Businessmens' sociated (NAB) "Watchdog of the Treasury Award" for voting against unnecessary federal spending during the 96th Congress.

Stenholm scored 100 percent on NAB's "Economy Voting Record'' (EVR), an index of congressional attitudes toward economy in government.

Thirty-five Senators and 179 Representatives (41 percent) qualified for the award, with only 62 Representatives scoring 100 percent.
